



The National Council of Negro Women (NCNW) is an "organization of organizations." Comprised of over 350 campus and community-based sections and 37 national women's organizations that enlightens, inspires, and connects more than 2 million women and men. Its mission is to lead, advocate for, and empower women of African descent, their families and communities. It was founded in 1935 by Dr. Mary McLeod Bethune, an influential educator and activist, and for forty years, the iconic Dr. Dorothy Height was president of NCNW.

Today, the NCNW programs are grounded on a foundation of critical concerns that are now "NCNW Priorities." Our organization promotes education; encourages entrepreneurship, financial literacy, and economic stability; educates women about health and promotes healthcare access, and promotes civic engagement and advocates for sound public policy and social justice.

The local component of NCNW was named for Minnie H. Goodlow Page, a devoted Christian woman. She is best remembered for her deep faith in God, love of people and strong conviction regarding the importance of Prayer in daily life.

Rev. Shavon Arline-Bradley is the president and chief executive officer for National Council of Negro Women (NCNW). Dr. A. Lois Keith serves as the national chair for NCNW, and has dedicated much of her life to NCNW's mission.

Ms. Betty Cannon is a member of Pilgrim Rest Missionary Baptist Church in Dallas, Texas where she serves as the teacher of the Children's New Membership/Sunday School class and is active in various church ministries. Ms. Cannon is also the President of Dallas City Wide Mission where she gives leadership in serving the community. Some of the outreach community projects include monthly assistance in feeding the homeless at the Austin Street Center, supplying food assistance to families during the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays, and supplying socks and t-shirts to two adopted nursing homes.

During her childhood, she had a desire to accompany her mother to various nursing homes around the age of six. As she grew older, she found herself role modeling the same mission works she had watched her mother do as a child. As she grew in faith and became knowledgeable of her purpose in life, she came to understand the Lord was preparing her, during those childhood years, to do a special work unto Him. Today, Ms. Cannon is actively involved in doing mission work in her church, the local community, and internationally in Belize Central America. In December 2025, she plans to travel back to Belize to fellowship with the Belizean sister churches, teach bible study to the Belize children, and assist in food and clothes distribution to the Belize needed families. Ms. Cannon looks forward to traveling to Belize twice yearly where she experiences the joy of teaching and serving others, feeling humble and grateful, and engaging in true Christian fellowship with another culture of baptized believers.

With the favor of God, Ms. Cannon feels privileged to have visited the Holy Land in Israel on two different trips. She gained a greater spiritual relationship with Jesus as she was baptized in the River of Jordan, visited the birthplace of Jesus, walked up the Hill of Golgotha where Jesus was crucified, and most importantly, entered into the place where Jesus was buried and witnessed an empty tomb. During her second Holy Land trip, she revisited several Holy Land sites in Israel and then continued her travels into Egypt to Mount Sinai where Moses received the ten commandments. Ms. Cannon is the recipient of three earned University degrees including Bachelor of Science in Business Administration, Bachelor of Arts in Psychology, and Master of Arts in Counseling. She is currently in private practice as a psychotherapist where she incorporates her Christian principles and beliefs, Christian lifestyle, and ethical practices in her God gifted profession. Her national affiliations include Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, National Council of Negro Women, and NAACP.

Ms. Cannon's personal enjoyments include nature walks, personal meditation times, elegant dining, art museums, symphonies, musical plays, and shopping. Member with The Prayer Lady Ministries International, Member with The City-Wide Mission Ministry and volunteer monthly service at the Austin Street Center



She continues to serve as a **Volunteer Deputy Registrar**, helping ensure every eligible resident can vote.

The proud mother and grandmother of her greatest joys Brian and Jordan, and life partner Jesse Gordon, Ison-Newsome's commitment to service, to community and children, and serving is legendary.
