LET'S TAKE A LOOK BACK

Financials

The Clermont County Mental Health and Recovery Board's (CCMHRB) budget for Fiscal Year 2025 was approximately \$8.7 million. The breakdown of revenue sources was: 38% local levy, 35% state, 16% grants and other funding, and 11% federal monies. The Board actively pursues grants for unfunded needs in collaboration with its contract agencies and/or other local partners.

The CCMHRB finalized construction plans and bid proposals for the construction of the new Crisis Receiving Center which is expected to open in 2027. Perkins/Carmack Construction was chosen as the Contractor, and construction is scheduled to start in February 2026. The Center will serve as a "drop off" crisis facility where individuals who are experiencing a behavioral health crisis can be stabilized in a less restrictive setting. During construction, staff will relocate to 4357 FERGUSON DRIVE, SUITE 270, CINCINNATI, OHIO 45245.

Mental Health Levy Passed by 58%!

CCMHRB funding now provides access to two new services:

- Housing for adults with SPMI at A Perfect Stay
- Crisis Stabilization Services at Transitional Living SW Ohio (TLSO)

The CCMHRB was awarded a \$1 million capital grant from the Department of Behavioral Health for permanent supportive housing for adults with severe and persistent mental illness (SPMI).

The housing will be located in Felicity.

Clermont County now has 493 Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) trained First Responders who now have new skills to manage individuals experiencing mental health crises.

CCMHRB CONTRACTED SERVICES IN 2025

The Mental Health and Recovery Board contracted with Child Focus, Greater Cincinnati Behavioral Health Services/Clermont Recovery Center, Hope Community Center, and NAMI SW Ohio in 2025 for behavioral health services for Clermont County residents

GCBHS served over 4,000 Clermont County residents, both adults and youth, through mental health, substance use, and early intervention educational programming



Hope Community Center empowers individuals with mental health and substance use challenges in their recovery journey through peer support. Members have the opportunity to participate in groups and build social connections that nurture personal growth in a safe, supportive, and accepting space. In 2025, the center was open 5 days per week. An average of 12 individuals were served daily, with an attendance of 232 monthly.



- 915 Individuals with mental illness supported through NAMI Connections Support Groups
- 66 Family members supported through NAMI Family Support Groups
- 44 Individuals received valuable information, resources, and coping skills through the Peer-to-Peer course
- 67 Family members found community, resources, education, and hope in the NAMI Family-to-Family course
- 838 students learned about mental health signs and symptoms and suicide prevention in schools across Clermont County
