Dear friends.

As of this writing, it has been 345 days since the first positively tested case of Covid-19 in Springfield, and a global pandemic appeared at our doorstep. It would be another few weeks before Cass County saw its first positively tested case. I have wondered frequently if "where were you when things came to a halt?" would be this generation's equivalent to "where were you when Kennedy was assassinated?". Certainly, our world has changed and been thrown upside-down in these last 11 months. Life as we knew it may not return for a long time, if ever. As we begin to see, if ever so slightly, what we hope is the light at the end of the tunnel, I've been thinking about some of the realities that have been revealed through or have come out of these days. I have come up with five realities for us, as a church, that I think are fairly plain. Perhaps you can think of a few more.


Reality #1 We <u>NEED</u> one another — Of all the things that we could learn from this pandemic, I hope and pray the most important thing we've learned is the value of one another and of human interaction. The stories are both numerous and heartbreaking of loved ones who have not physically seen or touched one another in nearly a year: grandparents who haven't been able to hug their grandchildren, spouses and children who have only seen their loved one through the nursing home window, those who have limited or no contact with "the outside world"...I could go on and on, but you get the picture. You have lived this nightmare in gut-wrenching ways. Oh sure...modern technology allows us to "see" one another digitally, but, speaking for myself, I'm Zoomed-out by now. If I don't have a Zoom call or video-conference for another six months, I wouldn't complain! The reality we have seen is that, regardless of how much of an introvert we might be and regardless of how much other people might get on our nerves, we need each other. It's how we were created. God wired us to crave companionship with one another. I pray that as we inch closer to the end of these days, we might never again take one another for granted. We are critical to one another's well-being!

Reality #2 "Hybrid" worship is here to stay — As large gatherings began to be discouraged, if not outright banned, and "stay at home" orders went into effect, the Church began to scramble. How in the world do we continue to worship and bring people together? The answer was "digitally". I'm proud to say we were ahead of the game on this one. We had been livestreaming our Sunday message for nearly three years prior to Covid. The shutdown only had to nudge us to stream our entire service. As we move forward, digital worship is here to stay—much like TV

worship was here to stay because of the likes of Charles Stanley, Joel Osteen, and Robert Schueller. I believe that from now on, there will always be a digital attendance at worship. Even now as things begin to loosen there will be, at least for the near future, those who are not comfortable being in large-group settings. I understand this completely. Digital worship presents us with an opportunity and a temptation, though. The opportunity is to be able to worship with our congregation, either live or after-the-fact, in those instances where we are not able to be physically present (weather, illness, etc.). The temptation, though, is to solely worship online and forego being physically present. See reality #1 above—we need one another! So, while digital worship is here to stay...if you are at all able and comfortable, I want to HIGHLY encourage you to be physically present for worship. I promise...you won't regret it!

Reality #3 "Cultural Christianity" is dying or is al**ready dead** — Many of us have known for a while that our society and culture is moving further and further away from Christian principles and is becoming less and less shy about it. I believe the days of people professing Christianity simply because "that's what you do" are almost past. The days of people coming to worship, whether they believed or not, simply because it was expected are over. Nominal Christianity is fading. No longer do people have to "pretend" to be Christian because it makes them look "respectable". The down side to this is the post-pandemic church will appear to have shrunk, both in numbers and in assets. The up-side is what will be left will be those who are committed not solely to the Church, but to Christ. I know what you might be thinking...those last few sentences sound a bit harsh, even condemning. I do not intend that, rather, my contention is that the death of "cultural Christianity" just might be God's best gift to the church in these days. It reveals where the church has glossed over so much in recent generations, and both challenges and encourages the church to be the church. Take heart, though; there's good news! That takes me to...

Reality #4 An Awakening is Underway — There is a movement of the Holy Spirit abreast that is unlike anything many of us have ever seen. God is wooing people back to Himself and is doing something amazing within them. This movement isn't happening "out there", though (that is, in the community at-large). No...this movement is starting IN THE CHURCH. The Holy Spirit is working to show the Church where we have been complacent, where we have lost our first love, and where we might have fallen away from communion with God. It is in the Church that, through the Holy Spirit, Jesus is calling again "follow me";




<u>Daylight</u> <u>Savings Time</u>
