Dear First UMC family,

The past 13(!!) weeks have been some of the most difficult weeks many of us have faced. We have experienced a wide range of emotions; from caution and concern to frustration and feeling "over it". I have shared these emotions with you. I have longed to be with you, to gather in worship, to have some sense of "normalcy". I have missed you! I have missed worshipping with you and sharing with you. I have missed seeing you, not only at church but in the community as well. But as much as I don't like these days in which we are living, and as much as I REALLY don't like not worshipping together — I get it. I get why we have been asked to take the precautions we have. I get the need to protect one another and look out for each other. I know you get these things, as well.

As time has worn on, the frustration has mounted, and we have longed to "return to normal". As we have seen other congregations return to in-person worship, we, too, have longed to do the same. Over the past few months, our Bishop has developed a phased reopening plan for churches in our conference. This reopening plan follows along the guidelines set forth by the Department of Public Health's "Restore Illinois" plan. As we continue to minister with and serve our communities during the COVID-19 global pandemic, we are seeing our churches transform and adapt in amazing ways. www.igrc.org

Here are a few key points:

- We are currently in Phase 3; only gatherings of 10 or fewer are permitted
- Phase 4 allows for gatherings of 50 or fewer. The earliest we could move into Phase 4 is June 26th.
- Phases 1-4 do not allow for congregational singing or responses, socially-distanced seating, a recommendation of face coverings, and limited interpersonal contact On June 8th, our Executive Team met to discuss these

guidelines and to discuss the question: What is best for Beardstown First UMC? After much conversation, our Executive Team has decided that we will resume in-person worship the Sunday after we are officially in Phase 4 (the EARLIEST date for this is June 28th). The wisdom of the Executive Team is that it is better to be together, albeit with restrictions, than to remain apart and continue the suspension of in-person worship.

As we come back together, here is what you can expect, until we move into Phase 5:

• BIG CHANGE! WORSHIP WILL BEGIN AT <u>9:30</u> <u>A.M.</u>

- Face coverings will be recommended. We are working to procure disposable masks and hand sanitizer for each entrance to the building.
- We will have socially-distanced seating. Pews and seating areas will be clearly marked (translation: It's possible you might not be able to sit in "your spot"!)
- We will have limited interpersonal contact. Regarding worship services:
- There will be NO congregational singing. We will have a soloist who will provide music for worship (if you are interested in being a part of a rotation for leading music, please let Pastor Jarrett or Andrea know).
- We will have no bulletins or other handouts.
- We will not be passing the microphone or the offering plate.
- We will forgo the sacrament of Communion.
- We WILL pray together and hear the Word of God together.
- Sunday School will remain suspended for the time being.
- We will be recording who is present.
- There are contingency plans to accommodate more than 50 persons in a socially-distanced way.
- After each service, the sanctuary will be thoroughly cleaned.

We will continue to stream our worship service in its entirety on our church Facebook Page (Beardstown First UMC). We are also exploring options that might allow us to share or broadcast our service on other online platforms, for example, YouTube.

Friends, I understand this is a lot to take in. I do understand there are those who might view things differently, especially as we see other congregations returning to "normal". Please do not hesitate to contact me with any questions or concerns you might have. Remember this, dear ones: This is but a season. This season will pass, and will return...and we will celebrate. Through all this, Jesus is STILL on the throne and God is good!

I can't wait to see you and worship with you again!

Zach Watson ~ son of Jim & Kim Watson


MURRAY STATE


Avery Quigley ~ son of Rob & Michele Quigley


