

Club. The late Sidna Pricket was elected as the first woman president in 1996. In 1999, Rotary Breakfast Club was formed. It served the area until 2018 when it ceased operations and some of its members joined the lunch club.


to help end Polio.

Foundation with all its scholarship and exchange programs.

- In 1962, the Club built the Peace Garden in Bridgeton Park, donated a sailboat to the YMCA for its summer program, purchased trash cans for the city, and collected 110,000 books for Uganda.
- In the City of Bridgeton's Tricentennial Year, 1986, Rotarians took the lead with the year-long celebration with Rotary directly contributing more than \$5,000 and the cost of the time capsule that was placed at the riverfront to be opened in 2086.



### A Remarkable History ... A Bright Future

Bridgeton Rotary Club

- The first Club organized by the new and energetic Vineland Club was the Bridgeton Club.
- In May 1921, the Bridgeton Rotary Club began meeting as a provisional club.
- On Sept. 1, 1921, the Club celebrated its Charter meeting as it became an official club of Rotary International.



- The club was headquartered in the brand-new Cumberland Hotel on Commerce & Pearl Streets, on the site of the present Senior Citizen High Rise Apartment building. This remained the meeting place for the next 44 years until the Hotel closed its doors in 1965.
- Bridgeton Rotary was an immediate force for the good of the community. In the early 1920s, the club rescued the local Boy Scouts organization from financial difficulty by raising \$9000.00, a significant amount for that time.
- Over the years, such projects as convincing the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to dredge the Cohansey River and then maintain it, establishing crossing guards for the schools on local intersections long before it became law, spearheading the campaign to create municipal trash collection and numerous other city improvements.
- Rotary continued through the depression and World War .
- II.
- The club reached more than 100 in membership from the late 1950s through the late 1960s, and was a major supporter of the Rotary International programs and the Rotary
