'Determined to defeat Hamas': A quarter million flee Gaza City as IDF expands strikes Airstrikes continue in Gaza City as military hits another tower and urges residents to evacuate south ahead of expanded ground operations; Gaza residents report widespread air raids and mounting displacement Einav Halabi, Yoav Zitun, Raanan Ben-Zur 11:15

As Israel prepares for a possible ground operation in Gaza City under the ongoing Operation Gideon's Chariots, more than 250,000 residents have fled the city in recent days, IDF Arabic-language spokesperson Lt. Col. Avichay Adraee said on Saturday, citing military estimates.

In an X post, Adraee urged civilians to evacuate via al-Rashid Street to designated humanitarian zones in the al-Mawasi area and the built-up refugee camps in the enclave's central region. He emphasized that those areas offer significantly better humanitarian conditions, including medical services.

"The IDF is determined to defeat Hamas in Gaza City and is expanding its strikes to that end," Adraee wrote. "Hamas's attempts to spread falsehoods and prevent your evacuation reflect its willingness to risk your lives for its survival. For your safety, leave now and report any roadblocks set up by Hamas terrorists."

Adraee later issued a second warning, specifically calling on residents of several Gaza City neighborhoods — including those in and around the al-Nour Tower on Safed Street — to evacuate ahead of an Israeli strike. The IDF later confirmed it had struck the building, which it said housed Hamas military infrastructure used for planning and carrying out attacks on Israeli forces. The military said steps were taken to minimize civilian casualties, including advance warnings, aerial surveillance, use of precision munitions and real-time intelligence.

Palestinian media also reported strikes across Gaza City. Hamas-run radio said Israeli forces shelled homes near the Sheikh Radwan pool in central Gaza City and that an Apache helicopter fired a missile at the area. Heavy gunfire was reported near the Netzarim Corridor, and Hamas's al-Aqsa channel said Israeli airstrikes hit the Shati refugee camp and the Tel al-Hawa neighborhood.

Meanwhile, displaced Gaza City residents were seen pitching tents in the Hamad neighborhood of Khan Younis in the south — an area from which Israeli forces recently withdrew. On Thursday, the IDF announced that the 36th Division had completed operations in Khan Younis and was preparing for new missions.

In Israel, dozens of protesters demanding the return of hostages demonstrated outside the home of Education Minister Yoav Kisch in Hod Hasharon. The protest, part of a weeks-long campaign, called for a

negotiated end to the war and the release of all hostages, with activists reading the names of captives through loudspeakers.







IDF Chief of Staff Lt. Gen. Eyal Zamir said Wednesday the military is entering the next phase of its mission to topple Hamas's rule. Speaking at a Southern Command officers' conference, he said, "We are going to dismantle this regime, and nothing will stop us. We have two objectives: the release of the hostages — a top moral priority — and the collapse of Hamas. These are the defining missions of our generation."

On the same day, Defense Minister Israel Katz visited Israeli troops inside Gaza. "Hamas cannot and will not change," he told soldiers and commanders. "If they had the opportunity, they would attack our towns, overrun our posts and take more hostages. They haven't changed — and that's why we cannot allow them to remain in power in Gaza. We are continuing the campaign, and the only thing that can stop it is Hamas surrendering: returning the hostages and laying down their weapons."

The IDF struck a high-rise building used by Hamas in Gaza City, the military announced on Saturday morning.

"Within the building, Hamas established military infrastructure used to advance and execute terrorist attacks against IDF troops in the area," the military said.

Earlier, IDF Spokesperson in Arabic Avichay Adraee

issued an evacuation order for Gaza City residents to move southward. More than 280,000 Gazans have already left the city, KAN reported, citing assessments by security officials.

Defense Minister Israel Katz on Saturday evening posted a video of the strike on X/Twitter. "The hurricane continues to strike Gaza. The Burj al-Noor terror tower has been destroyed, and Gaza residents are required to evacuate and head south."

"Efforts to thwart surveillance and terror infrastructures continue, paving the way for the maneuvering forces - until Hamas is defeated and all hostages are freed," the defense minister wrote.

Last Tuesday, the military issued its <u>largest evacuation order for Gaza City</u> yet. Past orders were localized in specific areas or used wording suggesting that an invasion was coming soon, but was less imminent.

Additionally, the military has increasingly struck high-rise buildings in the Gaza City Area.

IDF destroys several high-rise buildings in Gaza City area

In early September, the military destroyed three buildings after the IDF had warned residents to evacuate the area surrounding each of them.

Although the IDF has said that Hamas or other terror groups are using the buildings as lookout posts to follow the movements of its forces and to potentially plan or direct ambushes, it seems that the military is also destroying buildings to increase the stream of evacuees southward from Gaza City.

Qatar rallies international support after Israeli strike in Doha

World leaders converge on Doha to back Qatar and denounce Israel following airstrike targeting Hamas officials; US expresses unease as Qatar considers shifting its mediator role in region Lior Ben Ari|10:15

Since an Israeli strike in Doha this week aimed at senior Hamas figures — who are widely believed to have survived and reportedly were not present at the targeted site — many world leaders have traveled to Qatar to express solidarity with the Gulf country and to condemn Israel.


Qatari Emir Tamim bin Hamad Al Thani said on Saturday that in the past 24 hours he met with Pakistan's Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif; Indonesian President Prabowo Subianto; Rwandan President Paul Kagame; and Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orban, who is generally seen as

friendly toward Israel and opposed to many European Union measures against it.


Qatari Emir Tamim bin Hamad Al Thani (right) and Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orban in Doha (Photo: from X)

"I welcome Prime Minister Viktor Orbán, and we appreciate his visit and Hungary's support for the sovereignty of our country following the treacherous Israeli attack that threatens the stability and security of the region, and undermines the international efforts aimed at achieving peace and regional and global stability through dialogue and respect for international law," the emir wrote on X alongside a photo with Orbán.

Majed Al-Ansari, a spokesman for the Qatari Foreign Ministry, said an Arab-Islamic "emergency summit" will be held in Doha on Monday in response to the Israeli strike. Ahead of that summit, Arab foreign ministers will meet in preparatory talks.

Al-Ansari said the summit has "special significance, as it reflects the broad Arab and Islamic solidarity with Qatar in confronting the cowardly Israeli aggression, which targeted the residential building of some Hamas leaders, and also the firm rejection by these states of the 'state terrorism' carried out by Israel."

Saudi newspaper Asharq Al-Awsat reported that Iran's President Masoud Pezeshkian has confirmed he will attend the summit, as will Iraqi Prime Minister Mohammed Shia' al-Sudani. The office of Turkish President Recep

Tayyip Erdoğan said he also plans to travel to Doha on Monday.

Overnight, <u>Qatar's Prime Minister Mohammed Al Thani met in New York with U.S. President Donald Trump</u> and senior officials in his administration. Al Thani emphasized in conversations that Qatar would "take all necessary measures to protect the security of the state and preserve sovereignty in light of the blatant Israeli strike." Trump's Middle East special envoy, Steve Witkoff, was present at the meeting.

According to Reuters, Trump said he was displeased with the strike in Doha, describing it as one that "does not advance U.S. and Israeli interests."

Earlier, AI Thani met with U.S. Vice President JD Vance and Secretary of State Marco Rubio. The Qatari Foreign Ministry said discussions centered on bilateral relations, and that the vice president expressed solidarity with Qatar, calling it a strategic ally of the U.S.

Reuters quoted a source familiar with the meeting saying that the discussions also involved Qatar's future role as a mediator in the region, along with possible

security cooperation in light of the Doha strike.

In a United Nations Security Council session two days ago on the Israeli strike, the Qatari prime minister sharply criticized Israel. "Attacking our territories while we were busy with negotiations has uncovered the intention of Israel. It is trying to undermine any prospect of peace. It is trying to perpetuate the suffering of the Palestinian people," he said. "It also shows that extremists that rule Israel today do not care about the hostages. This is not a priority."

He added that Qatar will continue its humanitarian efforts to prevent bloodshed, but will not tolerate violations of its sovereignty and security.

Before the council debate, all 15 members issued a joint statement condemning the attack in Doha — though without naming Israel. The statement expressed "deep regret at the loss of civilian life" and called for deescalation and solidarity with Qatar. It reaffirmed support for Qatar's sovereignty and territorial integrity in line with UN principles. The statement also noted "vital role that Qatar continues to play in mediation efforts in the region, and alongside Egypt and the United States."

In an earlier in-depth interview with CNN, Qatar's prime minister harshly criticized Israel and Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, accusing him of leading the Middle East toward chaos.

He warned that "the entire Gulf is in danger," and said Doha is "rethinking" its role as mediator, and about Hamas's presence in its territory. He also said Netanyahu should be brought to justice, characterized Israel's attack as a "state terror," and said Doha is weighing its possible response to the strike.

Trump and Witkoff dine with Qatari PM in NY, days after Israeli strike on Hamas in Doha

Qatar says it was a 'great dinner,' with no further details; Doha says Vance, Rubio praised Qatar's mediation efforts in earlier meeting, called Doha a 'reliable strategic ally'

NEW YORK — **US President Donald Trump held** dinner with the Qatari prime minister in New York on Friday, days after US ally Israel attacked Hamas leaders in Doha.

Israel attempted to kill the leaders of the terror group with an attack in Qatar on Tuesday, a strike that risked derailing US-backed efforts to broker a truce in Gaza and end the nearly two-year-old conflict. The attack was widely

condemned in the Middle East and beyond as an act that could escalate tensions in a region already on edge.

Trump reportedly expressed annoyance about the strike in a phone call with Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, as well as in public, and sought to assure the Qataris that such attacks would not happen again.




"Great dinner with POTUS. Just ended," Qatar's deputy chief of mission, Hamad Al-Muftah, said on X. The White House confirmed the dinner had taken place but offered no details.

The session followed an hour-long meeting that al-Thani had at the White House on Friday with Vice President JD Vance and US Secretary of State Marco Rubio.



Qatar's Foreign Ministry said in a statement that Vance and Rubio expressed their appreciation for Qatar's "tireless mediation efforts and its effective role in bringing peace to the region," and said that Doha is a "reliable strategic ally of the United States of America."

Thani "affirmed that the State of Qatar will take all measures to protect its security and safeguard its sovereignty in the face of the blatant Israeli attack," the statement read.

Trump has said he is unhappy with Israel's strike, which he described as a unilateral action that did not advance US or Israeli interests.

Nevertheless, Rubio is set to leave for a visit to Israel on Saturday, where he will speak to Israeli leaders about "our commitment to fight anti-Israel actions including unilateral recognition of a Palestinian state that rewards Hamas terrorism," US State Department spokesman Tommy Pigott said in a statement on Friday.

Washington counts Qatar as a strong Gulf ally. Doha has been a main mediator in long-running negotiations for a ceasefire between Israel and the Palestinian terror group Hamas in Gaza, for the release of Israeli hostages held in Gaza, and for a post-conflict plan for the territory.

Al-Thani blamed Israel on Tuesday for trying to sabotage chances for peace but said Qatar would not be deterred from its role as mediator.

Israel's security establishment now increasingly believes it failed to kill any of Hamas's top brass who were gathered at the site of Tuesday's strike in Doha.

Hamas identified the dead as Jihad Labad, head of the office of top Hamas official Khalil al-Hayya; al-Hayya's son Hammam al-Hayya; and three others described as "associates" — either advisers or bodyguards: Abdallah Abd al-Wahid, Muamen Hassouna and Ahmad Abd al-Malek. In addition, a Qatari security officer, Lance Corporal Badr Saad Mohammed al-Humaidi al-Dosari, was killed.

How Israel's mysterious air-launched ballistic missile reached Qatar via space

Only a few militaries possess air-launched ballistic missiles; Israel has never admitted to having them, but the Wall Street Journal reports such weapons were used in strike on Hamas leaders in Doha, spotlighting Israel's combat-proven system

For days, analysts puzzled over how Israel managed to bypass Qatar's advanced air defenses in Tuesday's strike on a villa in Doha. A report Friday in The Wall Street Journal offered what may be

at least a partial answer: Israeli warplanes fired ballistic missiles into space over Saudi Arabia before hitting their target.

According to the report, 12 Israeli Air Force jets — eight F-15s and four F-35s — carried out the strike. No senior Hamas leaders are believed to have been killed, but the sophistication of the attack has drawn worldwide attention alongside the diplomatic fallout for Israel.

It remains unclear which type of ballistic missile was used. U.S. officials cited by the Journal said the weapons likely traveled about 1,500 kilometers (930 miles) from the Red Sea, across Saudi airspace, before striking the villa in Doha.

Israel has never publicly acknowledged deploying such missiles, but defense publications have long reported that it possesses multiple models

capable of air launch. Among them are the Anchor missile, originally developed by Rafael as a test target for the Arrow missile defense system; the Rampage, produced by Elbit Systems and Israel Aerospace Industries; and Rocks, another Rafael system reportedly derived from the Anchor.

Unlike cruise missiles, which are slower but maneuverable, ballistic missiles are typically launched on fixed trajectories and are far harder for dense air defense networks to intercept. Airlaunched ballistic missiles, however, offer additional advantages: they avoid the vulnerability of known ground launch sites and can strike with extreme speed.

Past reports have suggested the Rampage could be launched from fighter jets at ranges of about 150 kilometers (95 miles), complicating detection and interception. If the missiles in Tuesday's



strike were fired from as far as the Red Sea, as the Journal reported, they may have belonged to the Anchor family — whose full range has not been publicly disclosed but has been referenced in connection with Arrow system tests.

According to Ynet war correspondent Ron Ben-Yishai, due to their velocity, such weapons can cause massive damage even without explosive warheads, relying instead on the sheer

kinetic impact.

"The main advantage of an [air-launched ballistic missiles] over an [air-launched cruise missiles] is speed to penetrate defenses," Jeffrey Lewis, director of the East Asia Nonproliferation Program at the James Martin Centre for Nonproliferation Studies at the Middlebury Institute of International Studies in California, told Reuters in November 2024. "The downside — accuracy — looks to have been largely solved."

Exceptional weapons

Ground-based ballistic missile systems are widely deployed by militaries around the world, and even by terrorist groups such as Yemen's Houthi rebels. Cruise missiles are also common. But ballistic missiles launched from aircraft remain rare — reportedly fielded by only a handful of militaries, including Russia, China and Israel.

Air-launched ballistic missiles (ALBMs) are carried by fighter jets or bombers, giving them flexibility to be launched from unpredictable positions. "They can come from any direction and make defense much harder," Uzi Rubin, a twice-recipient of Israel's Defense Prize and the founding head of the Arrow missile defense program, has said in the past.

The United States tested such a weapon, the AGM-183 hypersonic missile, but the project lost funding in the 2025 defense budget and was effectively canceled. With a large arsenal of long-range cruise missiles and other strike systems, Washington has shown little appetite to invest in air-launched ballistic technology. A U.S. Air Force official told Reuters that the system was never operationally deployed.

Still, defense industry experts note that many countries with advanced precision-guided weapons could adapt existing technologies to produce such missiles. "It's a smart way of combining guidance, warheads and rocket motors to create a new weapon that offers far greater

capabilities — and at a reasonable cost," one senior industry figure told Reuters.

The Pentagon leak

Hints of Israeli interest in the field surfaced in 2024, before the war with Iran. Pentagon documents leaked that year suggested Israel was working with two systems: one dubbed Golden Horizon, never before publicly mentioned, and Rocks, a Rafael-made missile believed to be derived from the earlier Anchor model.

Rafael unveiled the Rocks missile in 2019, describing
it as an air-to-surface weapon launched from
"extended standoff ranges," supersonic trajectory to the
target. The company says the design minimizes exposure of

success rates.

According to Rafael, the Rocks can hit high-value fixed or relocatable targets, even in heavily defended environments where electronic countermeasures are in play. The company adds that it is "combat-proven," suggesting it has already been used operationally. The missile is advertised as capable of destroying both surface

The British, French, and German foreign ministers condemned Israel's September 9 air strikes on Doha on Friday, saying that the bombing, which targeted Hamas leadership, violated Qatar's sovereignty and risked further escalation.

"Such action poses a serious risk to achieving a negotiated deal," they wrote in the statement, three days after the strikes. "We express our <u>solidarity with Qatar</u> and

fully support the vital role it continues to play in mediation efforts between Israel and Hamas."

Ministers urge Israel to focus on reaching a ceasefire in Gaza

"We further underscore that the focus must remain on reaching a permanent ceasefire, the release of all remaining hostages and flooding Gaza with aid to stop the famine," the statement continued. The three ministers called for an immediate halt to military operations in Gaza City.



They added that they condemned the "heinous crimes committed by Hamas," which they defined as a "terrorist movement that must immediately and unconditionally release the hostages it is holding, be disarmed, and be permanently excluded from governing the Gaza Strip."

Hostage families expressed dismay with Netanyahu over the strike in Doha, accusing the prime minister of torpedoing a deal to release their loved ones

Einav Zangauker, Itzik Horn, and other family members of hostages still in captivity led Saturday evening protests calling for an immediate hostage deal to free their loved ones.

"[Prime Minister Benjamin] Netanyahu did not try to bomb the leaders of Hamas, but our chance of getting our loved ones back," said Zangauker. "He will bomb everything that leads to the end of the war, including the hostages themselves." Itzik Horn, the father of Eitan Horn, who is still held captive, also addressed Netanyahu in his speech, saying, "Those who want to bring the hostage children home do not blow up the Hamas negotiating team while they are discussing the release of the remaining hostages."

"Prime minister, I call on you, let's sit down alone, father to father, and answer me just one question: If your children were among the hostages, would they also languish in the tunnels for 700 days?! So why are our children?"

Nofar Buchshtab, sister of Yagev Buchshtab, who was killed in July of 2024 remains were returned from <u>Gaza</u>, said: "The army bombed the compound where he was held along with the other hostages, and his captors took them out and executed them. Was he killed or murdered? Unequivocally murdered. This wouldn't have happened if the military pressure hadn't reached their door."

Tens of thousands join pro-Palestinian rally in Auckland, call for Israel's elimination Protesters chant 'We don't want no two states, we want all the '48'; organizers say march is New Zealand's largest since war began; police say no arrests

Tens of thousands took part in a pro-Palestinian, anti-Israel march in Auckland, New Zealand's biggest city, on Saturday, in what organizers said was the largest rally of its kind since the war in Gaza began between Israel and the Palestinian Islamist terror group Hamas.

Some 50,000 attended the March for Humanity rally in central Auckland on Saturday morning, the Aotearoa for Palestine group said. New Zealand police estimated the attendance at 20,000.

Aotearoa for Palestine spokesperson Arama Rata said it was New Zealand's largest march in support of Palestinians since the conflict broke out in Gaza with the Hamas-led cross-border massacre in which terrorists killed about 1,200 people in southern Israel and kidnapped 251 hostages on October 7, 2023.

The Hamas-run Health Ministry has said that more than 64,000 people have been killed in the conflict in Gaza — though the toll cannot be verified and does not differentiate between civilians and fighters — while humanitarian organizations say a shortage of food is leading to widespread starvation. Israel has denied

accusations that it caused a humanitarian crisis in the Strip. Israel says it has killed over 22,000 combatants in battle as of August and another 1,600 terrorists inside Israel during the October 7 onslaught. Israel's toll in the ground offensive against Hamas in Gaza and in military operations along the border with the Strip stands at 465.

Many in Saturday's protest crowd carried Palestinian flags and banners with slogans including "Don't normalize genocide" and "Grow a spine; stand with Palestine," public broadcaster Radio New Zealand reported.

Protesters chanted, "We don't want no two states, we want all the '48," a call for the elimination of Israel and its replacement with a Palestinian state.

Organizers, motivated by a march that shut down Sydney's iconic Harbor Bridge in August, wanted to close a major city bridge with Saturday's rally, Rata said, but were forced to abandon those plans on Friday due to strong winds.

Police said there were no arrests at the march and that roads along the route were being reopened.


Aotearoa for Palestine said it wanted New Zealand's center-right coalition government to impose sanctions on Israel.

New Zealand's Prime Minister Christopher Luxon, in August, described recent Israeli actions in Gaza, including a lack of humanitarian assistance, as "utterly appalling," and New Zealand has been weighing up whether to recognize a Palestinian state.

London police nab man suspected of smearing feces on synagogues, other Jewish sites

Police say seven Jewish premises, including four synagogues, targeted in 'revolting and appalling acts' By <u>AFP</u> and <u>Tol Staff</u> Today, 3:01 pm

LONDON — UK police said Friday that officers investigating a series of antisemitic incidents in north London had arrested a 37-year-old man.

The man was arrested in the Hendon area of north London on suspicion of religiously motivated criminal damage in connection with seven offenses and remains in custody, the Metropolitan Police said.

"This is a significant development in our investigation following substantial CCTV enquiries by officers," said

Detective Luke Williams.

The force said Thursday that seven Jewish premises, including four synagogues, had been targeted in separate incidents over recent weeks.

The synagogues and a private residence in Golders Green had feces smeared on them, while urine was thrown toward a school and over a car in two other instances.

"These are revolting and appalling acts," Detective Superintendent Katie Harber, who is leading the investigation, said in a statement Thursday before the arrest.

"We are very aware of how distressing these offenses have been for those who have been targeted. We will not tolerate this kind of behavior," she added.

Shomrim North West London, a neighborhood watch group for the Jewish community, thanked police for their work.

"This arrest is a testament to the strength of partnership between the community, Shomrim, and the police. We will continue to support those affected and ensure our community feels safe and reassured," it wrote on X.

The UK has seen an increased number of antisemitic incidents in recent years, with a spike since the

October 7, 2023, massacre by Hamas in Israel, and the resulting war in Gaza.

The Community Security Trust (CST), a Jewish charity, recorded 1,521 antisemitic incidents in the first six months of the year, down from a record high of 2,019 incidents in the first half of 2024.

Spain's Vuelta disrupted again by anti-Israel protesters ahead of race's last leg Authorities to deploy 1,500 police to guard Sunday's finale in Madrid, after pro-Palestinian demonstrators repeatedly disrupt cycling competition with Spanish government's tacit support

Saturday's stage of the 2025 Vuelta a España, which has seen numerous disruptions caused by anti-Israel demonstrators, did not escape entirely without more protests, with riders having to bypass a large group of protesters on the road with 18 kilometers remaining.

During stage five's team time trial, protesters waving Palestinian flags halted an Israeli-owned team.

Protests targeting the Israel-Premier Tech riders have repeatedly seized the limelight at the Vuelta, Spain's version of the Tour de France, in which over 180 cyclists pedal 3,100 kilometers (1,900 miles) through rural Spain's sleepy back-roads. Six of the last 10 days of racing have been either cut short or interrupted, with over 20 people detained by police.

Stage 11 in Bilbao, Spain, was stopped with three kilometers to go due to protesters blocking the road, while stage 16's finish line was changed mid-race to the 8 kilometers-to-go banner.



Spanish authorities have deployed extraordinary security measures for Sunday's final stage into the capital, in the hope that the Vuelta can come to its scheduled finish.

The 23-month war in Gaza, which started with Hamas's murder of 1,200 and kidnapping of 251 during the October 7, 2023, terror onslaught in southern Israel, had already enraged many Spaniards, including the outspoken left-wing government.

The protests on the sidelines of the Vuelta have

earned the government's tacit endorsement and catalyzed nudging it toward staking out one of the strongest positions against Israel of any European nation.

"The protests were born from the idea that our only chance to defend human rights regarding Israel is the Spanish Vuelta," Rosana Prieto, 48, told The Associated Press by phone. "It is an international spotlight for us to say that we are against what Israel is doing."

Israel has defended its military actions in Gaza and accused Spain of standing with Hamas.

The Hamas-run Gaza health ministry says more than 64,000 people in the Strip have been killed or are presumed dead in the fighting so far, though the toll cannot be verified and does not differentiate between civilians and fighters. Israel says it has killed over 22,000 combatants in battle as of August and another 1,600 terrorists inside Israel during the October 7 onslaught.

Spain pressures for Israeli team's exclusion

Spanish Prime Minister Pedro Sánchez joined Ireland and Norway in recognizing a Palestinian state last year, and Spain became the first European

country to ask a UN court for permission to join South Africa's case accusing Israel of genocide.

The Vuelta protesters argue that if Russian teams have been banned from international sporting events for the war in Ukraine, then Israeli teams should likewise be punished.

Spain's government agrees.

Foreign Minister José Manuel Albares said he would <u>support</u> the Israeli-owned team's expulsion from the race, while government spokesperson Pilar Alegría, who is also minister of sports and education, said neutrality is

no longer possible in the face of the death and destruction in Gaza.

"What we are seeing at the protests, in my opinion, is logical," Alegría told Cadena Ser radio on September 11. "Sports cannot be isolated from the world that surrounds them."

For the Vuelta's security detail, it was logistically impossible to lock down the entire route through its twisting roads, much of which is lined by forest. Large groups have gathered in towns

and protesters have jumped out of cover to block the path of riders, causing two athletes to crash, although it's unclear if that was the protesters' intention.

Neither of the riders who crashed was on the Israeli team. The cyclists participating in the race voted Wednesday that they would quit if their safety was again put at risk.

The team under fire, Israel-Premier Tech — which only has one Israeli rider at the Vuelta — issued a statement saying that quitting the race is out of the question, as it would "set a dangerous precedent."

But Israel-Premier Tech has been endeavoring to keep a low profile. Riders have avoided speaking to the media and it took the step mid-race of removing its team name from its riding uniforms.

The team is owned by Israeli-Canadian businessman Sylvan Adams, who emigrated to Israel in 2016, and has played a key role in promoting Israel via sports. He helped arrange Israel's hosting of the start of Giro d'Italia, cycling's third Grand Tour race, in 2018.

"Great job to Sylvan and Israel's cycling team for not giving in to hate and intimidation," Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu posted to social media platform X on September 5. "You make Israel proud!"

'A little scared'

There have been occasional confrontations between police, security personnel, and protesters. Prieto said that she needed medical treatment for abrasions and knocks after a police officer dragged her across the ground. She said she and her cohorts behaved peacefully, and is waiting to see whether she faces charges.

Cycling teams have decried some protester actions. Joxean Fernández Matxin, the team boss of UAE Emirates, said that some of them hit riders with flag poles and tossed tacks in their path.

"Everyone has a right to protest, but it's a shame that it has to happen here and in this way and that we can't finish the race," race leader Jonas Vingegaard, a two-time Tour de France winner, said after Wednesday's stage finish was shortened.

Reigning Tour champion Tadej Pogačar skipped the Vuelta. Yet cycling's biggest star was worried that the protests could spread to other races.

"I think all the riders are a little scared of what could happen," Pogačar told reporters in Quebec Thursday. "When we see what's going on at the Vuelta, we talk about it and we think it could happen here or in other races between now and the end of the season."

The next day, a few dozen protesters gathered in the Canadian city of <u>Quebec</u> during a one-day race Pogačar participated in.

As the protests disrupted the Vuelta, a fleet of activists' ships loaded with humanitarian aid set sail from Barcelona, aiming to break Israel's naval blockade of the Gaza Strip.

Spain's prime minister chose this week to denounce Israel's operations in Gaza as "genocide" as he <u>announced</u> an arms embargo and partial import ban over Israel's wartime conduct in Gaza.

The move inflamed a diplomatic dispute that resulted in the ban of ministers from both countries.

Netanyahu on Thursday accused his Spanish counterpart of issuing a "blatant genocidal threat" against Israel after Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez lamented not being able to use nuclear weapons against the Jewish state.

If the protests gain strength, they could become a concern for Israel, which has long prided itself on its close relations with the European Union. The European Commission's president, <u>Ursula von der Leyen, this week called</u> for partially suspending trade ties with Israel, and the <u>Netherlands said</u> it would boycott the popular Eurovision song contest next year if Israel is allowed to participate, following Spain and Ireland.

For analyst Oriol Bartomeus, professor of political science at the Autonomous University of Barcelona, Sánchez's long campaign against Israel's war with Hamas is both benefiting from and fueling the grassroots protest movement at the cycling race.

"What is happening at the Vuelta is a symptom of the anger of the left over this issue," Bartomeus told the AP. "This is poised to be a major point of cohesion of Spanish society. Sánchez is not stupid, and he has gotten right in there."

Protesters aim to take action again on Sunday, when the race concludes in Madrid. Authorities will deploy 1,500 police for the final stage, adding to the 130 officers already traveling with the race.

LONDON — Over 100,000 protesters marched through central London on Saturday, carrying flags of England and Britain, for a demonstration organized by the firebrand anti-immigrant and anti-Islam activist Tommy Robinson.

Police have said they will have a huge presence in the British capital. A "Stand Up to Racism" counter protest is also due to meet nearby, following a highly charged summer in Britain that has seen protests over immigration and free speech.

By midday, tens of thousands of protesters were packed into the streets south of the River Thames, before heading toward Westminster, seat of the UK parliament.

Demonstrators carried the Union flag of Britain and the red and white St George's Cross of England, while others brought American and Israeli flags and wore the MAGA hats of US President Donald Trump.

They chanted slogans critical of Prime Minister Keir Starmer and carried placards, including some saying "send them home." Some attendees brought children.

"We believe the number of people in attendance at the 'Unite the Kingdom' demonstration is around

110,000," London's Metropolitan Police said, noting it used a combination of CCTV and police helicopter footage for its estimate.

'We believe in Tommy'

Robinson has billed the Unite the Kingdom march as a celebration of free speech. Protesters also chanted slogans mourning Charlie Kirk, the American conservative activist shot dead on Wednesday.

"Hundreds of thousands already pack the streets of central London as we Unite as one for our freedoms," Robinson said on X.

"Bring your smiles, flags, and patriotic pride. No masks, open alcohol, or violence," he added in another message.

Robinson, a far-right firebrand, boasts a string of criminal convictions and a big online following after years of spearheading a fervent anti-Muslim and anti-immigrant movement.

The 42-year-old — whose real name is Stephen Yaxley-Lennon — has long been a familiar sight at far-right rallies in England, but his influence was thought to be waning after various legal and other woes.

He describes himself as a journalist exposing state wrongdoing and counts US billionaire Elon Musk among his supporters. Britain's biggest anti-immigrant political party, Reform UK, which has topped opinion polls in recent months, has kept its distance from Robinson, seemingly due to his criminal convictions.

"We want our country back, we want our free speech back on track," said Sandra Mitchell, a supporter attending the rally.

"They need to stop illegal migration into this country," she said. "We believe in Tommy."

Speakers included French politician Eric Zemmour and Petr Bystron of the Alternative for Germany (AfD) party. Far-right commentator Katie Hopkins and controversial Canadian psychologist Jordan Peterson also featured.

The event came just over a year after anti-immigration riots

swept several cities, which Robinson was accused of helping to fuel with incendiary online posts.

There have been months of rising tension around asylum seekers coming to Britain on small boats across the Channel, as well as growing accusationsthat Britain is becoming hostile to free speech.

London's Metropolitan Police has said it will have more than 1,600 officers deployed across London on Saturday, including 500 brought in from other forces. In addition to policing the two demonstrations, the force is stretched by high-profile soccer matches and concerts.

"We will approach them as we do any other protests, policing without fear or favor, ensuring people can exercise their lawful rights, but being robust in dealing with incidents or offences should they occur," said Commander Clair Haynes, who is leading the policing operation.

Haynes said police were aware of a record of "anti-Muslim rhetoric and incidents of offensive chanting by a minority" at previous protests,

but said London's communities should not feel like they have to stay at home.

Last Saturday, nearly 900 people were arrested at a London demonstration against a ban on the protest group Palestine Action.

Immigration has become the dominant political issue in Britain, eclipsing concerns over a faltering economy, as the country faces a record number of asylum claims. More than 28,000 migrants have arrived in small boats across the Channel so far this year.

Red and white English flags have proliferated along streets and been painted on roads. The Lebanese army is set to carry out the fourth stage of disarming Palestinian camps in the country on Saturday, according to Asharq Al-Awsat.

The military reportedly plans to start by disarming camps in Beddawi in northern Lebanon. After spending three days working to remove weapons there, the military then plans to move to Ain al-Hilweh camp in the south.

Hezbollah-affiliated network Al-Mayadeen reported that five trucks loaded with weapons for the PLO, including missiles, were <u>transferred to the Lebanese army</u> from Ain al-Hilweh. Three trucks with weapons were transferred from the Al-Baddawi camp.

Ambassador Ramez Dimechkie, head of the Lebanese-Palestinian Dialogue Committee, said the decision is "clear and firm in asserting the authority of the state over all Lebanese territories. The camps are not outside this framework."

This comes after the Pentagon approved a <u>security assistance package</u> for Lebanon with an estimated value of \$14.2 million.

LAF start disarming Palestinians camps

The Presidential Drawdown Authority package would build the Lebanese Armed Forces' capability and capacity to dismantle weapons caches and military infrastructure of non-state groups, including Hezbollah, the Pentagon said.

Discussions regarding disarmament began in May

when Lebanese President Joseph Aoun announced his intentions to disarm foreign-backed and non-state groups in a meeting with Iranian officials.

The Jerusalem Post previously reported that <u>Lebanon's disarmament</u> of Palestinians could help pave the way to disarm Hezbollah and Hamas. Lebanon is now a test case for the region.

"The competent Palestinian authorities in Lebanon handed over the second batch of PLO weapons located in the Palestinian camps in Lebanon, namely the Rashidieh, Al-Bass, and Burj al-Shamali camps, to the Lebanese army as a trust, on Thursday," the report quoted Palestinian Authority presidential spokesman Nabil Abu Rudeineh as saying. Trump pledges investigation into Soros

The billionaire investor paid "professional agitators" to organize "riots" in the US, the president has alleged 12 Sep, 2025 19:43

US President Donald Trump has said that his administration will be probing George Soros over his alleged funding of mass "riots" in the US.

The Hungarian-American billionaire investor and NGOs funded by his Open Society Foundations (OSF) have long been linked to various

protest movements, both in the US and abroad.

"They have professional agitators... They get paid for their profession from Soros and other people," Trump said in an interview with Fox & Friends on Friday.

"We're going to look into Soros because I think it's a RICO case against him and other people," he added.

"This is more than protests: This is real agitation. This is riots on the street, and we're gonna look into that," Trump said.

The US federal RICO (Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations Act 1970) law has historically targeted organized crime, and is used to prosecute offenses committed as part of a criminal enterprise, though more recently it has seen broader use.

Last month, the US president called for the Hungarian-American investor and his son to face charges under the statute, accusing them of supporting "violent protests, and much more, all throughout the United States."

"We're not going to allow these lunatics to rip apart America any more," he said in a Truth Social post.

In the months prior, anti-immigration protests shook the US, with the most violent cases in Los Angeles escalating into clashes with the police, looting, and arson.

Soros was also linked to the 2016 Russiagate hoax, according to declassified documents published by the Senate Judiciary Committee in July.

The documents alleged the investor's OSF network had ties to the Hillary Clinton campaign's debunked attempts to accuse Trump of collusion with Russia in order to undermine his 2016 election victory – accusations Moscow has long dismissed. https://www.rt.com/news/624587-trump-pledges-investigation-soros/

Let people decide whether they want to be ruled by 'disciples of Bandera' – Roger Waters

Referendums should be held in Ukraine and the new Russian regions to settle all territorial disputes, the legendary musician has said

Ukrainians should be allowed to decide whether they still want to be ruled over by Kiev, now that it glorifies Nazi collaborators, Pink Floyd frontman and human rights activist Roger Waters has said. New referendums should be held in various parts of Ukraine, as well as in the new Russian regions to settle all territorial disputes, the legendary musician believes.

"Let the local people decide whether they want to stay part of Ukraine ruled by the disciples of Stepan Bandera," the rock legend told a massive anti-war rally in Berlin on Saturday via a video link.

He was referring to the leader of the Organization of Ukrainian Nationalists (OUN) – a World War II-era organization that collaborated with Nazi Germany. Its armed wing, the Ukrainian Insurgent Army (UPA), waged a mass killing campaign in regions of Volhynia and Eastern Galicia between 1943 and 1945 against Poles and Jews, in which more than 100,000 people perished.

Modern Ukraine treats Bandera and his followers as national heroes. Such policies have drawn the ire of Moscow and even poisoned Kiev's relations with one of its active Western backers – Poland.

According to Waters, Ukraine is "a deeply divided country," with its Western parts being "more anti-Russian" and the eastern regions speaking Russian and favoring close ties with Moscow. "Stop the war

immediately and hold new referendums in... disputed [regions]," the musician stated in his address.

Four former Ukrainian territories – the Donetsk and Lugansk People's Republics, as well as Kherson and Zaporozhye Regions – officially joined Russia in autumn 2022 following a series of referendums. Kiev never recognized the results and continues to lay claim to the four regions, as well as Crimea, which joined Russia in 2014 following another referendum.

Moscow has repeatedly stated that it is ready for peace negotiations with Kiev as long as the reality on the ground is taken into account. It also said it was ready for an immediate ceasefire once Kiev either withdraws its troops from the new Russian regions or halts mobilization and Western arms deliveries.

Foreign data centers: U.S. security systems are compromised by China

Home and business security systems are supposed to keep Americans safe. Yet very often our cameras, routers, drones, smart locks, and more are compromised, opening the door to surveillance and security

risks—often without consumers being any the wiser.

The biggest security threat comes from China. Millions of U.S. homes and businesses rely on electronics and security systems manufactured by companies with direct ties to the Chinese Communist Party (CCP). Many of these products are cheap, widely available, and deeply integrated into our daily lives. But the cost we save at checkout comes due later when our personal information and national infrastructure are at risk.

Take Hikvision and Dahua, two Chinese surveillance giants blacklisted by the U.S. government. Their products—used in schools, homes, and even municipal buildings—are capable of sending video data to foreign servers. DJI drones, popular with hobbyists and law enforcement alike, have been flagged by the Department of Defense for transmitting user data back to China. Meanwhile, Wi-Fi routers from Huawei and TP-Link have documented firmware vulnerabilities that make it easy for hackers to steal data, monitor activity, or disable

connected security systems.

These vulnerabilities risk more than privacy—they're a threat to national security. China's "military-civil fusion" strategy explicitly encourages companies to aid the state in acquiring foreign technology and intelligence. Meanwhile, security systems installed in government offices, power grids, and defense facilities could be exploited to surveil sensitive operations or disrupt vital systems. As 5G and Internet of Things (IoT) devices proliferate, the scope of this threat only grows. Firms like Huawei, ZTE, and DJI don't just make gadgets—they serve the geopolitical interests of an adversarial regime.

Compounding these risks is the inadequacy of domestic American data storage. You wouldn't keep your car unlocked on a busy street. Nor would you leave your wallet on a counter in an airport. But Americans regularly—and often unknowingly—have their data housed in less secure overseas facilities unprotected by U.S. oversight.

Like the proliferation of Chinese drones, security systems, and internet products, the rise in overseas data storage is largely driven by cost. Data centers consume a massive amount of energy, and U.S. electricity isn't cheap. This forces companies to move their data centers to locations with lower energy costs.

To protect Americans from this silent invasion of insecure goods and the risks of overreliance on overseas data centers, the U.S. needs to act—now. First, we must establish a Privacy Gold Star Certification, a national standard that helps consumers and institutions identify products that meet strict security guidelines. Only systems that use U.S.-developed software, store data on American servers, and are free from foreign ownership or control would be certified. End-to-end encryption and explicit opt-in requirements for data sharing would be mandatory.

Second, we should ban foreign-controlled security systems from critical infrastructure altogether. American businesses, schools, and families deserve confidence that the tools they use to protect themselves aren't secretly compromised.

Third, we should require all surveillance footage and related data to be stored within U.S. borders and governed by U.S. privacy laws. It's unacceptable that personal and institutional data could end up in the hands of foreign adversaries simply because a cheaper device was more convenient at the time of purchase.

Fourth and finally, we should unlock the power of every available electron by optimizing energy efficiency and embracing energy generation from every power source available—whether it's natural gas, nuclear, wind, solar, or something else. Government shouldn't pick winners and losers but rather put every energy source on the table in order to drive down costs and incentivize building data centers in America instead of abroad.

We've already seen what happens when we delay action. The same companies that helped build China's surveillance state are now embedded in our neighborhoods. If we don't draw a clear line between privacy and foreign intrusion, we will pay the price in lost freedoms, compromised infrastructure, and weakened national security.

For America to be secure, we must end foreign surveillance on our soil.

The Authoritarian Quartet, China, Russia, North Korea, and Iran: A New World Order in the Making?

What truly defined China's recent elaborate military parade was not the weaponry rolling across Tiananmen Square, but the rare gathering of leaders who stood shoulder to shoulder. Xi Jinping hosted Vladimir Putin and Kim Jong Un, with Iran regime's President Masoud Pezeshkian also in attendance -- all creating a tableau that symbolized far more than a military tradition.

'The spectacle that unfolded in Beijing recently was unlike any other military parade the world has seen. China, to mark the 80th anniversary of the end of World War II, staged its most elaborate display of military might, showcasing hypersonic missiles, advanced drones, cyberwarfare divisions, and an arsenal that left no doubt about its ambitions to be seen as a global military superpower.

What truly defined this moment, however, was not the weaponry rolling across Tiananmen Square, but the rare gathering of leaders who stood shoulder to shoulder. Xi Jinping hosted Vladimir Putin and Kim Jong Un, with Iran regime's President Masoud Pezeshkian also in attendance -- all creating a tableau that symbolized far more than a military tradition. This was not simply an anniversary parade; it was a declaration of intent by a coalition of states that reject the Western-led order and seek to replace it with an authoritarian alternative.

The symbolism could not have been more striking. Three nuclear-armed states—China, Russia, and North Korea—stood together, while Iran, long seeking nuclear capabilities, joined them on the same platform, demonstrating a shared message to the world: that they are building an alliance strong enough to challenge the United States, Europe, and their allies. Each nation has its own motivations—Russia's war of aggression in Ukraine, China's determination to push back against American influence in Asia, North Korea's pursuit of legitimacy and resources, and Iran regime's ideological mission to spread Islamic governance and authoritarian control across the world. When seen together, the gathering represented the closest thing yet to the formation of a new bloc: one that might aim to construct an entirely new world order defined not by democracy, but by coercion, censorship, and force.

The timing and context made the event even more significant; The parade <u>followed</u> the Shanghai Cooperation Organization summit in Tianjin, where these same leaders had already met to promote their vision of the world. In both settings, their words and actions underlined a consistent theme: the Western-led international system has had its time, and now must give way to a new era where authoritarian powers set the rules. Xi Jinping <u>used</u> his platform to <u>insist</u> that "The great rejuvenation of the Chinese nation is <u>unstoppable</u>," and that no "bully"— a barely veiled reference to the United States and its allies -- could slow its progress. The rhetoric echoed decades of grievances but, placed in the setting of this vast military display, it sounded more like the proclamation of a strategy.

For Russia, the parade offered much-needed solidarity at a time when its war in Ukraine remains a grinding and costly campaign. Putin stood proudly next to Xi and Kim, as if trying to show the world that, despite international sanctions and condemnation, more than a million killed in the war and a tenuous economy, Moscow is far from isolated. North Korea has already been a supplier of ammunition and manpower to aid Russia's military, openly casting aside the international restrictions placed on it. In return, Moscow provides Pyongyang with diplomatic recognition and avenues to bypass economic isolation. China plays a crucial role in this triangle by buying its oil and helping Russia secure access to technology and markets, giving both Moscow and Pyongyang room to maneuver. Iran's presence added yet another layer. While Iran's regime does not yet possess nuclear weapons, its government has openly supported Russia's war in Ukraine with drones and military cooperation, while Iran's ideology remains focused on exporting Islamist authoritarianism across the Middle East and beyond. The inclusion of Tehran in this Beijing spectacle seemed intended to show showed that this emerging alliance is not merely about military support, but also about aligning authoritarian models of totalitarian governance against democratic norms.

For decades, authoritarian regimes such as Russia, China, and North Korea sought to secure themselves individually; now, they appear to be converging in an open and public manner. Their leaders are showcasing their confederation at grand international events. By marching together, they are sending a message that they are capable of forming an enduring alliance, one that combines military strength, economic interdependence, and ideological alignment. U.S. President Donald Trump responded to the parade with a cutting remark on social media: "Please give my warmest regards to Vladimir Putin and Kim Jong Un as you conspire against the United States of America." His words, though sarcastic, captured the essence of what many in Washington might have been trying to deny: that these leaders were, indeed, conspiring to weaken the West, undermine its alliances, and gradually construct an alternative system of global governance.

The underlying question now is whether this emerging authoritarian alliance will continue as a symbolic partnership or evolve into a coordinated strategy with lasting global impact. Dismissing these events as mere theater would be irresponsible. Russia's ongoing invasion of Ukraine is a direct challenge to the stability of Europe –a challenge that that Iran and North Korea materially support. China, meanwhile, has been expanding its military

footprint throughout the South China Sea and <u>accelerating</u> preparations for the possibility of a future confrontation with Taiwan. Together, these powers are testing the limits of Western resolve. They are also watching closely to see whether the United States, Europe, and their allies respond with hesitation or with strength.

History provides a sobering lesson: appeasement in the face of authoritarian aggression rarely prevents conflict. Israel's recent refusal to submit to Iranian-backed Hamas aggression shows what strength and resilience can achieve. The Iranian regime miscalculated in expecting that fear and diplomacy would paralyze its target. Instead, the regime faced a determined resistance that disrupted its plans, as well as demolishing "trillions of dollars" of investments in nuclear weapons plants.

On the wider international stage, if the West chooses weakness or endless "table meetings" that go nowhere, it emboldens those who openly seek to undermine the global order. If, however, the West adopts a strategy of "peace through strength"—and imposes strict secondary sanctions, military deterrence, and clear lines of defense -- the chances of deterring this authoritarian axis increase significantly.

China, Russia, North Korea, and Iran are no longer operating as distant or disconnected powers with coincidental interests. They are aligning publicly, celebrating their unity, and preparing to test the strength of the current international system. They appear fully aware of what they are doing and why they are doing it: namely, to reshape the world into one where their authority dictates the rules, freedom is suppressed, and sickly, hesitating democracies are dismantled as they deserve to be.

The world has entered the hour of choice: Will Western nations deter this authoritarian quartet with unity and strength, or will they fall back on illusions that "diplomacy" – talking long enough -- can contain belligerent ambitions?

The parade in Beijing offered a warning: against determined authoritarian powers, only resolve will suffice. Shoes: Amount Needed: 100 NIS for 150 children = 15,000 NIS

\$35 for 150 children = \$5,250.

Eye Exam/Eyeglasses: Amount Needed: 200 NIS for 50 children = 10,000 NIS \$60 for 50 children = \$3,030

We have three weeks to be in the position to provide the shoes, eye exams/eyeglasses to those children on our list, which gets longer with time.
