⁷Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. ⁸ Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. ⁹ God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. ¹⁰ In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. ¹¹ Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. ¹² No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.

¹³ By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. ¹⁴ And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. ¹⁵ God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. ¹⁶ So we have known and believe the love that God has for us.

God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. ¹⁷ Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. ¹⁸ There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. ¹⁹ We love because he first loved us. ²⁰ Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. ²¹ The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.

John 15:1-8

15 "I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinegrower. ² He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. ³ You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you. ⁴ Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. ⁵ I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. ⁶ Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and

burned. ⁷ If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. ⁸ My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples.

With Us at the Table

Joel 2:21-27; Psalm 22; 1 John 4:7-21; John 15:1-8

Jesus Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Hallelujah! Hallelujah!

When Jesus appears with his beloved ones after the Resurrection, there is a dynamic, living theme that starts to grow. He appears with Mary Magdalene in the garden, where the vines would have been planted and cultivated, where the grapes would have been harvested. He appears with the two on the road to Emmaus on their journey through the countryside and ends up being welcomed into their home, where Cleopas and his friend share their food and wine with him. He appears with the disciples in the upper room, the very room where he had shared a life-transforming meal with them right before his Passion, where he had made the profound claim that the bread was his body and the wine his blood. And he appears with the fisher-followers on the beach by the Sea of Galilee, preparing the meal himself, sharing of the bread and fish and wine that he has prepared for them.

That which was planted in the garden outside of the tomb grew and grew. Branches branched out from the vine and bore sweet fruits. The sweet fruits were harvested and taken on the journey of transformation into rich wine. The rich wine was poured and shared in fellowship, in family, in community, in communion. The blood which was poured out was now living again, coursing through the veins...or may I say vines?...branching out through the capillaries of the risen Lord! Just as he had been throughout his life and ministry, Jesus was with them at the table in the resurrected flesh—from a garden of vines and fruits outside an empty tomb to a personal home as a stranger turned invited guest, to an upper room that held so much memory, to a seaside picnic table, he was there! And he is here with *us* at the table! Can you feel him? In your homes, in this sanctuary, he is with us!

Back before those miraculous communions of food and wine after the resurrection, back before his blood would be poured out by the imperial executioners, Jesus was with his beloved disciples in that same upper room that would come to be a headquarters of memories and a movement. He sat with them at the table, he washed their feet, he broke bread with them, and he poured wine for them—all as we observed with such grave remembrance on Maundy Thursday. That night of fellowship and family, that night of community and communion was also the night of Jesus' farewell address, his magnum opus of Wisdom teachings for those who would carry the Kingdom forward. He foretold for them what was about to happen to him. He taught them how to be servant leaders. He promised to them the coming of the Holy Spirit. He spoke to them the world-changing words: "I am the way, and the truth, and the life." He passed them the peace that surpasses all understanding. He revealed to them the reality of the coming Resurrection. And he defined for them the true nature of their relationship, the truth of who they really were to him and to each other and to God.

And of all the images he could have painted in their imaginations for the relationship they shared together, he chose the image of the true vine, the heart of the plant that bore the fruit that formed the drink that forged the communion that they shared at the table. "I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinegrower... Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit." God the Creator is the vinegrower, the farmer, the cultivator. Jesus the Son is the vine, the heart of the plant that grows from the root in the fertile soil and climbs and winds its way ever upward. Nourished by the Holy Spirit, we are the branches, rooted in the vine and reaching outward toward the light of the sun to produce the fruit. Together we are a single ecosystem. Together we are a single organism.

Wow! The nutrients of the soil and water course through the core of the vine, spreading out to the branches. The vine forms the foundation, the solid structure on which the branches can thrive. The vine is strong. The vine is flexible. The vine is dynamic. The branches bear the blooms, the flowers, and the leaves. The branches soak in the sun and catalyze the miracle of photosynthesis that in turn strengthens the vine. The branches produce the fruit. We are the branches. We are entrusted with such great responsibility! We are empowered as co-creators, as producers of fruit! But disconnected from the vine, we no longer have our life source. Disconnected from the vine we wither and can no longer create.

The image of the vine, branches, and fruit is the image of living, thriving oneness in multiple-ness. It is the image of interdependence, of different parts working together contributing their role to the whole. It is the image of a shared core, a shared heart. In short, in so many ways it is the quintessential image of *communion*. "Com" is the prefix meaning "with." It implies the togetherness of more than one. "Union" is the root word, meaning "one" or "becoming one." *Communion* is thus the action, the coming together to become one. *Community* is the result. "I am the vine, you are the branches." In speaking those words during the Holy Supper when he was at his most vulnerable with the weight of the world upon his shoulders, Jesus created community at the table. In having communion with his beloved followers after his death and resurrection when his joy was complete and he shone with the light of new life, he made it clear that they would still be a community no matter what—through life, through death, and through new life. The wine would be the manifestation of the vine—the fruit of the fruit—the evidence of the creative power of the farmer and the vine and branches working together as one. But the communion would be more than just the food and the drink. The communion would be the sharing, the warmth, the pleasure, the joy, the connection—humanity with humanity, humanity with divinity, humanity *in* divinity, divinity *in* humanity.

If we go back to the beginning of the gospel of *John*, we witness Jesus' very first miracle at a wedding celebration in the village of Cana. At the brilliant urging of his blessed mother, he turned water into wine—and not just any wine, the very best wine. His first miracle was thus the miracle of communion, the act of community. He brought people together and celebrated with them. He went on to share wine and food and fellowship, the experience of family, throughout his life and ministry—in the intimate settings of people's homes and in crowds of thousands. This is how he created community. This is how he created the Kingdom. With communion. As the true vine he spread out across the countryside and stretched across the plains, with branches growing, with branches being grafted on. As the true vine he climbed mountains, with his branches joining him in reaching toward the sun. As the true vine, he was raised upon an accursed piece of dead wood as his branches splintered and broke away and watched in fear and horror. But while the wood of the cross would be dead forever, the true vine would live again. The blood that flowed out would flow through living veins once again. The true vine would gather his branches together again and breathe life and nourishment back into them.

Jesus sat at the table in the upper room before his death and resurrection, and after presenting the image of the true vine, he told his beloved ones exactly how they could enact communion, how they could create community, how they could create the Kingdom: "

"As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete. This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. You are my friends if you do what I command you. I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father. You did not choose me but I chose you. And I appointed you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last, so that the Father will give you whatever you ask him in my name. I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another."

No hierarchies of power. No masters and servants. No classification of strangers. Only welcome. Only blessed friendship. Only love.

Beloved, this has been a hard week in a hard season in a hard year. Another good and faithful child of God and mother of this family, a branch so deeply rooted to the true vine, a branch who bore fruits beyond any of us can imagine, has joined the Resurrection. It seems like we can't catch a breath in the world right now with loss after loss and heartbreak after heartbreak. That's just it, though! That's what the true vine was teaching us by showing up and sharing wine after he had died and risen again. Our community is not limited to those in our midst physically. The love that calls us to the table, the love demanded of us at the table, is not limited to those whom we can see and touch. Our communion is with the true vine that persisted in life even when experiencing death, and so our communion is with all the branches everywhere in this blessed, beautiful, broken world, and our communion is with all of the branches that have ever lived. As he was in the garden, as he was in a house in Emmaus, as he was in the upper room, as he was on the beach, the risen Lord is with us at the table—calling us to love with the courage to lay our lives down for our friends. Calling us to open ourselves up to being loved with that same courage. Calling us to sharing in each other's pain and sorrow. Calling us to share in each other's joy. And so calling us to abide in him. And so calling us to bear fruit that will last. Cheers! Amen.


