Isaiah 60:1-6

- 60 Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the LORD has risen upon you.
- ² For darkness shall cover the earth, and thick darkness the peoples; but the LORD will arise upon you, and his glory will appear over you.
- ³ Nations shall come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn.
- ⁴ Lift up your eyes and look around; they all gather together, they come to you; your sons shall come from far away, and your daughters shall be carried on their nurses' arms.
- ⁵ Then you shall see and be radiant; your heart shall thrill and rejoice, because the abundance of the sea shall be brought to you, the wealth of the nations shall come to you.
- ⁶ A multitude of camels shall cover you, the young camels of Midian and Ephah; all those from Sheba shall come.
 They shall bring gold and frankincense, and shall proclaim the praise of the LORD.

Ephesians 3:1-12

3 This is the reason that I Paul am a prisoner for Christ Jesus for the sake of you Gentiles—² for surely you have already heard of the commission of God's grace that was given me for you, ³ and how the mystery was made known to me by revelation, as I wrote above in a few words, ⁴ a reading of which will enable you to perceive my understanding of the mystery of Christ. ⁵ In former generations this mystery was not made known to humankind, as it has now been revealed to his holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit: ⁶ that is, the Gentiles have become fellow heirs, members of the same body, and sharers in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel.

⁷ Of this gospel I have become a servant according to the gift of God's grace that was given me by the working of his power. ⁸ Although I am the very least of all the saints, this grace was given to me to bring to the Gentiles the news of the boundless riches of Christ, ⁹ and to make everyone see what is the plan of the mystery hidden for ages in God who created all things; ¹⁰ so that through the church the wisdom of God in its rich variety might now be made known to the rulers and authorities in the heavenly places. ¹¹ This was in accordance with the eternal purpose that he has carried out in Christ Jesus our Lord, ¹² in whom we have access to God in boldness and confidence through faith in him.

Matthew 2:1-12

2 After Jesus was born in Bethlehem in the territory of Judea during the rule of King Herod, magi came from the east to Jerusalem. ² They asked, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We've seen his star in the east, and we've come to honor him."

³ When King Herod heard this, he was troubled, and everyone in Jerusalem was troubled with him. ⁴ He gathered all the chief priests and the legal experts and asked them where the Christ was to be born. ⁵ They said, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for this is what the prophet wrote:

⁶ You, Bethlehem, land of Judah, by no means are you least among the rulers of Judah,

because from you will come one who governs,
who will shepherd my people Israel."

⁷ Then Herod secretly called for the magi and found out from them the time when the star had first appeared. ⁸ He sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search carefully for the child. When you've found him, report to me so that I too may go and honor him." ⁹ When they heard the king, they went; and look, the star they had seen in the east went ahead of them until it stood over the place where the child was. ¹⁰ When they saw the star, they were filled with joy. ¹¹ They entered the house and saw the child with Mary his mother. Falling to their knees, they honored him. Then they opened their treasure chests and presented him with gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. ¹² Because they were warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they went back to their own country by another route.

Stargazing

Isaiah 60:1-6; Psalm 72; Ephesians 3:1-12; Matthew 2:1-12

I love stargazing. I always have, and I always will. Many of my fondest memories from childhood and adolescence involve marveling up at the vast expanse of the night sky. On nice summer nights my whole family would drag out these giant body pillows that we had and every blanket we could find and lay them out on the basketball court for some of the best seats in God's good Creation for the show of lights that surrounded us. For meteor showers we would even have friends come over. I'm sure we goofed around some and had fun with it, but inevitably we would quiet down as the gravity of the majesty of outer space overtook our awareness. You see. I had the great joy of growing up out in the country, and until the neighbors catty-corner from us across the street put a security floodlight up on the telephone pole in front of their house (alright, I'm just a little bitter about it still!), I had the great joy of growing up without light pollution.

Well, at least I thought we didn't have light pollution until we went on a high school mission trip to New Mexico and pulled over on the side of the road in White Sands National Park at night. If I were not wearing this mask, you might see my jaw hit the floor even in remembering that sky! Now THAT was the absence of light pollution! We could see the stars beyond the stars, more than any of us ever could have imagined. I remember wondering how it could still be so dark outside with so much light in the sky. I was having one of those moments when the magnificence of Creation leaves you gobsmacked and transforms the horizon of perspective. Look at how big the universe is, and that's just what we can see from the naked eye! And there are other universes and planes of existence beyond human conception. How small are we in the midst of all that?! That telescoping of perspective then makes one ask, "Who are we and what have we done to deserve something so miraculously beautiful, the gift of this life, the gift of this creation?" Now, those awe and wonder questions often turn to questions of the mechanics of things. How does it all work? What is it all made of? That, my friends, makes me think of one of the most insightful philosophical and scientific conversations on record.

From the authoritative collection of Wisdom known as *The Lion King*:

Pumbaa: Hey, Timon, ever wonder what those sparkly dots are up there?

Timon: Pumbaa, I don't wonder, I know.

Pumbaa: Oh. What are they?

Timon: They're fireflies. Fireflies that, uh... got stuck up on that big bluish-black thing.

Pumbaa: Oh, gee. I always thought they were balls of gas burning billions of miles away.

Timon: Pumbaa, with you, everything's gas.

The truth is, I've always been drawn to the responses of both Timon and Pumbaa. An important part of my childhood stargazing and universe wondering took place at Loper Elementary School, where once a year they would bring in this glorious thing called Starlab. It was an inflatable dome that we would crawl inside of, and lo and behold stars would be projected all around us. We would learn a bit about the science of things—the gas burning billions of miles away—and we would learn a bit about how we humans have always tried to make sense of the stars and planets and to find meaning in them through stories—perhaps more like the fireflies stuck up in the big bluish-black thing. I'm fascinated by both—the way things actually work, and the way that we make meaning regardless of how they actually work. Now, I have it on good authority that some of the teachers who led those Starlab lessons made up some of the stories about constellations and planet alignments, but that investigation is outside of my jurisdiction!

The truth is that we humans have found meaning in these most magnificent phenomena of Creation throughout history. In every context in every time, people have looked up, had their perspective transformed, asked the big questions, come up with scientific theories, and developed meaning-making stories. And that, loved ones, is what gets me the most when I gaze up at the heavens. We are all connected to the night sky through time and space. Thousands of years ago, people looked up and had the same awe and wonder and asked the same questions. And people everywhere on God's good earth—on every continent, in every type of landscape, within every type of setting, speaking every language, practicing every religion, representing every

ethnicity—look up and have the same awe and wonder and ask the same questions. We may exist at different times and in different places. We may have different ways of understanding God and Creation. But we share the experience of being gobsmacked by the stars.

Some of the best stargazing scientists and meaning makers in history were known as the magi. "Magi" was the term used to describe devotees of Zoroastrianism, one of the world's other ancient monotheistic religions, which, by the way, is still a living religion. Around two thousand years ago the magi were famous throughout the world for their sophisticated astrology. They were masters of observing the sky and charting the patterns and movements of the stars, planets, and moons. And they tied their scientific mapping to theological belief. One of those beliefs was that the alignment of the planets in Aries portended the birth of a powerful leader. Further, the presence of Saturn spoke to a superlative, most powerful leader, one like a messiah. Even further, the specific formation would have been thought to indicate that the powerful leader would die at a specific time. Hmmm....so an exceedingly important and powerful messiah whose mission would include his death.

And it just so happened...well perhaps it was made to happen!...that a child was born to Mary at the auspicious time of the planetary and star alignment sought after by the magi. After all, as we discussed on Christmas Eve, it was the creator of all the heavenly bodies who was being born as a human child. It makes sense that all creation would thus be involved in the process. So, the celestial bodies moved and aligned at the time of the indwelling of God, and they did so for a very specific reason—to call out to the Zoroastrian devotee astrologers of the Persian empire—the magi.

We Christians often get hung up on thinking that God was exclusively the God of the Jews and that God is now exclusively the God of the Judeo-Christian world after our adoption into the chosenness of the Jewish people. We go back to the covenant with Abraham, which was decidedly a covenant for a certain lineage (and how could I not point out that within that covenant, God had Abraham look at the stars to understand how numerous his descendants would be?!). When stop our historical exploration at Abraham's covenant, though, we forget the covenant with Noah, which was undeniably a covenant with all of the peoples on the planet. I never want us to limit our imagination of the possibilities of God and God's reach. I think that God speaks to all the people of the earth in ways that they can understand—through their languages, through their cultures and rituals, and yes even through religions. I believe that God speaks to everybody out of the fullness of God's love.

And in this greatest of events in the history of creation—the incarnation—God wanted those outside of the Jewish world to know. Even further, God wanted them to be part of the story! So, in the most spectacular of ways, God spoke to the magi, aligning the very sun, moon, and planets to say, "Behold! I am here! Come!"

And so the magi came. We know very little about them. We make the assumption that they were three because there were three gifts, but it could have been more. To this day some orthodox traditions still claim that they were twelve, matching the tribes of Israel and the disciples of Christ. We often call them kings because our readings from Isaiah and Psalms prophecy about kings coming to the foretold child bearing gifts and paying homage, but Matthew doesn't name them as such. And in the wonderful way of legends, whole mythologies and hagiographies have been developed around them. The most popular legends name them Melchior, Gaspar, and Balthazar, or some variation thereof. One is often depicted as Central Asian, one as South Asian, and one as African. One is sometimes older, one middle aged, and one younger. Similar legends exist across contexts in Latin America, Africa, Europe, and Asia. And it truly is a remarkable thing that this legend of multi-racial, multicultural, multigenerational journeying-together made its way into so many ancient traditions across the world.

As with all legends, there was certainly a kernel of truth in the possibilities. Persia, known as the Parthian Empire at the time, was an eastern counterweight to the Roman Empire. It would have included modern day Iran, Iraq, Turkey, Syria, Lebanon, and parts of Saudi Arabia, the UAE, and Yemen. The Silk Road went right through it, so it would have had people passing through and joining it from China, India, Europe and parts of Africa. And it operated as a vassalage system, so there could have been many different kings under the emperor. So, who knows? There very well could have been magi kings of different races, cultures, and ages

who looked up into the sky, saw a sign in the alignment of the celestial bodies, and followed the prophecy of Zoroaster that an exceedingly powerful messiah had been born and would have a world-changing death.

In the fullness of their belief in God's way of speaking to them, they journeyed to Jerusalem and unwittingly asked a Roman client king where to find the newborn King of the Jews. They were directed to Bethlehem. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Gold a gift for a king. Frankincense an offering to a God. Myrrh an oil for the embalming of the dead. Oh yes, these multi-racial, multicultural, multigenerational Zoroastrian magi from the East got it.

Why do we need to go so in depth with this lovely story that is only mentioned in one gospel account? Why can't we just take it at face value and let it grace our nativity scenes with its innocuousness? Why go into all of this science and history? Because it truly matters that God speaks to all people in ways that they can understand, and it truly matters that God called people from across the world, both Jewish and non-Jewish, to be part of the greatest event that ever happened—the incarnation.

In our reading from *Ephesians* today, Paul speaks of gentiles, meaning people who are not Jewish, as also being included in God's promise, in God's family. Paul wasn't the first one to speak to the gentiles, though. Paul was just carrying the torch set alight by the life of Jesus Christ. You see, God had always been speaking to the gentiles. God had always done so. God continues to do so. God will always do so. Because all the people who ever were and ever will be are the children of God, made in God's own image. And God decisively made people both within and outside of the Jewish lineage part of the incarnation, part of this story of this Palestinian Jewish mother and her Palestinian Jewish son.

I think we all have a bit of astrology in our innate belief systems. And that's not a bad thing. Who can help but look at the stars, ponder the magnitude of the universe, and search for signs from God? As we look to the heavens, to the celestial bodies, may we remember that so, too, do people across the world, from every race, culture, and generation. May we approach each other with grace and humility, acknowledging that we have our truth and we live by our truth and that others have their truth and are living by their truth. And may we understand that God is speaking to all of us. Imagine how the world would change if this were the starting point of all our interactions!

Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the LORD has risen upon you.

For darkness shall cover the earth, and thick darkness the peoples; but the LORD will arise upon you, and his glory will appear over you.

Nations shall come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn.


Lift up your eyes and look around; they all gather together, they come to you; your sons shall come from far away, and your daughters shall be carried on their nurses' arms.
