2 Kings 2:1-12

- 2 Now when the Lord was about to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. 2 Elijah said to Elisha, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me as far as Bethel." But Elisha said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they went down to Bethel. 3 The company of prophets who were in Bethel came out to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?" And he said, "Yes, I know; keep silent."
- 4 Elijah said to him, "Elisha, stay here; for the Lord has sent me to Jericho." But he said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they came to Jericho. 5 The company of prophets who were at Jericho drew near to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?" And he answered, "Yes, I know; be silent."
- 6 Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me to the Jordan." But he said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So the two of them went on. 7 Fifty men of the company of prophets also went, and stood at some distance from them, as they both were standing by the Jordan. 8 Then Elijah took his mantle and rolled it up, and struck the water; the water was parted to the one side and to the other, until the two of them crossed on dry ground.
- 9 When they had crossed, Elijah said to Elisha, "Tell me what I may do for you, before I am taken from you." Elisha said, "Please let me inherit a double share of your spirit." 10 He responded, "You have asked a hard thing; yet, if you see me as I am being taken from you, it will be granted you; if not, it will not." 11 As they continued walking and talking, a chariot of fire and horses of fire separated the two of them, and Elijah ascended in a whirlwind into heaven. 12 Elisha kept watching and crying out, "Father, father! The chariots of Israel and its horsemen!" But when he could no longer see him, he grasped his own clothes and tore them in two pieces.

2 Corinthians 4:3-6

³ And even if our gospel is veiled, it is veiled to those who are perishing. ⁴ In their case the god of this world has blinded the minds of the unbelievers, to keep them from seeing clearly the light of the gospel of the glory of Christ, who is the image of God. ⁵ For we do not proclaim ourselves; we proclaim Jesus Christ as Lord and ourselves as your slaves for Jesus's sake. ⁶ For it is the God who said, "Light will shine out of darkness," who has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Christ.

Mark 9:2-9

- 2 Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, 3 and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. 4 And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus. 5 Then Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." 6 He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. 7 Then a cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice, "This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!" 8 Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them any more, but only Jesus.
- 9 As they were coming down the mountain, he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead.

Uninhibited and Unveiled

2 Kings 2:1-12; Exodus 34:29-35; Psalm 99; Mark 9:2-9

Jesus and the disciples continued to go around Galilee for most of their public ministry. As we have been hearing about over the past several weeks, they performed healings, cast out demons, and preached the good news of new creation and new life. There were breathtaking miracles that defied the natural order of things, like multiplying food to feed thousands, calming a storm, and walking on water. There were challenging but important interactions with people of different contexts and different belief systems, inspiring growth in their understanding of what it truly meant to love all and serve all. And of course, everywhere they went so went the large crowds of people—pressing in and all around, thirsty for the water of life that was being offered by this Jesus of Nazareth. Jesus loved them and took compassion upon them, offering the fullness of his good news with word and action—offering wholeness by sharing Wisdom, sharing meals, sharing fellowship, and sharing health. As we learned last week, in the midst of all of this Jesus sometimes needed to get away. He needed to go out into the wild spaces in order to care for himself and experience the renewal necessary to keep going. Perhaps we can think of the Transfiguration as the ultimate experience of seeking healing and finding renewal out in the wild spaces!

According to the narrative leading up to today's gospel passage, Jesus had had a particularly heavy conversation with his followers. It was THE conversation about how he would undergo great suffering, be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed. It was THE conversation in which Simon Peter, desperate in his anticipatory grief, tried to talk Jesus out of taking the path that would lead to all that terrible pain...and in which Jesus, heartbroken at his beloved disciple's grief, snapped on him with those infamous words: "Get behind me, Satan!" He had then stood before the large crowd and let them know that following him would mean that they themselves would also have to take up crosses, would also have to risk losing their lives for his sake and for the sake of the gospel. So high were the stakes of creating a new Kingdom that would stand in opposition to the oppressive violence of the Roman empire and the other powers and principalities of the planet! For, the new Kingdom was near, and so the forces that would seek to prevent that Kingdom were going to be active like never before—those demons and legions and rulers with hearts of stone. Indeed, Jesus had closed that heavy, urgent conversation by saying, "Truly I tell you, there are some standing here [today] who will not taste death until they see that the kingdom of God has come with power!"

That heavy, heavy conversation weighed on him for six whole days, during which it must have replayed over and over again. He must have ruminated on it and its implications for all of these beloved human beings who were now committed to him. And so, after six days, he decided that it was time to go back out into the wild spaces, this time up a mountain. Perhaps recognizing that some of his disciples might need some healing as well, he took James, John, and, significantly, Simon Peter, with him. And this time something truly astonishing happened. "He was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus."

I am always fascinated beyond measure by the Transfiguration. It is one of those moments when the spaces between the planes of existence become thin—when time and space and the spiritual and the physical lose their definition and boundaries, blurring into a single reality. Really, I think of it as a glimpse into heaven—where generations of ancestors from a variety of contexts can come together and commune seamlessly, as though epochs and geography were not barriers. I wonder how Jesus himself would have comprehended this event, let alone the disciples who were with him! What did it mean that in the midst of his sacred spiritual practice of self-care to recover from that heaviest of conversations, he was met by the two greatest heroes the Israelites had ever known—Moses the great liberator and Elijah the great prophet? Why were they there? How were they there? Well, to answer both of those questions, I am convinced that this was one of those moments when the great God of all the cosmos, the one whom Jesus called "Father," reached out and touched the physical world, directly intervening in the course of history. After all, we hear a voice coming out of the clouds at the end of this encounter speaking the same words that were spoken at his baptism: "This is my Son, the Beloved"...but I get ahead of myself! Let me not jump to the end!

I think that God directly intervened because God understood that this was one of those moments when that beloved son was most in need of uninhibited, unveiled expression of love and encouragement. You see, not only had he just come face to face with the anticipatory grief of his beloved disciples, but I think doing so had unleashed his own anticipatory grief. I think that having that heavy conversation had brought everything into focus for him, had made concrete just exactly what was going to happen in the very near future. I think that although he was putting a brave face on for his followers, he was probably scared and sad—scared of the suffering he would have to endure, scared of the suffering that this might unleash upon his beloved followers, sad that the world was in such a state that such horrific suffering was even a reality, and sad that very soon he would be leaving the people in the world whom he loved so deeply. And God knew just what to do.

God sent Moses, who had stood up to an empire and liberated his people in the face of horrible suffering so long ago. And God sent Elijah, who had stood up to the leaders of his own people who would cause horrible suffering in defiance of God's will. For, Jesus himself was about to stand up to an empire and to the leaders of his own people—to Caesar and Herod, to the legionnaires and the Sadducees. God sent Moses and Elijah, who had both had to go through the process of preparing their followers to live without them, to carry on the mission without them. God sent Moses and Elijah, who had both had their own moments of brokenness and desperation, fearing for themselves and their loved ones and grieving in anticipation of what might happen. God sent Moses and Elijah, who had both had their own moments upon mountaintops with God directly intervening to show them uninhibited, unveiled love and encouragement—upon Sinai and Horeb with a presence that would cause faces to shine with pure light and a voice that would whisper in the stillness after the storm. These two heroes of old would understand more than anyone else in all of time and space what Jesus was already going through and what Jesus was about to go through. They would know what to say to encourage him and inspire him. They would know how to listen to him so that he knew he was being heard.

What I wouldn't give to know the contents of that conversation between Jesus, Moses, and Elijah! What a conversation it must have been—the liberator of Israel, the troubler of Israel, and the savior of the world all talking with honesty and vulnerability about fear and grief, giving each other genuine words of love and encouragement, and listening to each other! It was mystical. It was powerful. It was effective. Afterwards, Jesus had the strength to keep going, to begin his steady march to yet another mountaintop, a mountaintop called Calvary in Jerusalem.

But that's not all, because they were not all who were up there! Let's not forget that James, John, and Simon Peter were also there witnessing the whole thing. That was no accident or coincidence! As the ones closest to Jesus, they were also afraid and grieving. They also needed to be inspired. They also needed to experience God's direct action. They also needed to feel God's uninhibited, unveiled love and encouragement. AND, they needed to observe and learn how to give Jesus the support he needed moving forward. They needed to observe and learn from the way Moses and Elijah and Jesus were honest and vulnerable with each other. For, in the days to come they would need to be there for Jesus, and they would need to be there for each other. Perhaps this is why that voice from the clouds gave such a clear command: "Listen to him!" Listen to him because he needs loving hearts and attentive ears to share in his hopes and fears! Listen to him because he has so much to say that you need to hear! Listen to him because when all is said and done the mission is yours to carry on!

Friends, as we approach the season of Lent, starting on Ash Wednesday this very week, let us take the time to reflect on how we, also, live with fear and anticipatory grief. As we begin to mark the season of Jesus' march to Calvary, let us ponder how much power these two forces have over us—over the ways that we view the world, the ways that we act in the world, and the ways that we allow the world to act in us. Most importantly, let us seek to understand the truth that at every moment of every day God is reaching out to us in the midst of our fear and grief to offer us uninhibited, unveiled love and encouragement. The thing is, though, that we have to be willing to climb the mountain to meet God there. We have to open our eyes to the dazzling light of God's constant, glorious presence. We have to open our ears to the still, small voice. We have to open our imaginations to the creative ways that God is meeting us and encouraging us and loving us—in moments of breathtaking natural beauty, in honest and vulnerable conversations, in the support of loved ones, in the

mystical miracles of everyday life, no matter how hard everyday life might be. And the more we access God's uninhibited, unveiled love and encouragement, the more that we ourselves will shine. And the more that we shine, the more that others will see the light and feel the warmth of God's love and encouragement. And that light and warmth will pass from person to person, lighting up the world in ways that we cannot even imagine! Perhaps this is how the Kingdom comes—through transfiguration. Listen! Can you hear that voice coming from the clouds? "This is my Son, the Beloved. Listen to him!" Amen
