Proverbs 1:20-33

- ²⁰ Wisdom cries out in the street; in the squares she raises her voice.
- ²¹ At the busiest corner she cries out; at the entrance of the city gates she speaks:
- ²² "How long, O simple ones, will you love being simple?

How long will scoffers delight in their scoffing and fools hate knowledge?

²³ Give heed to my reproof;

I will pour out my thoughts to you; I will make my words known to you.

²⁴ Because I have called and you refused, have stretched out my hand and no one heeded,

²⁵ and because you have ignored all my counsel and would have none of my reproof,

²⁶ I also will laugh at your calamity; I will mock when panic strikes you,

3 Not many of you should become teachers, my brothers and sisters, for you know that we who teach will face stricter judgment. ² For all of us make many mistakes. Anyone who makes no mistakes in speaking is mature, able to keep the whole body in check with a bridle. ³ If we put bits into the mouths of horses to make them obey us, we guide their whole bodies. ⁴ Or look at ships: though they are so large and are driven by strong winds, yet they are guided by a very small rudder wherever the will of the pilot directs. ⁵ So also the tongue is a small member, yet it boasts of great exploits.

How great a forest is set ablaze by a such a small fire! ⁶ And the tongue is a fire. The tongue is placed among our members as a world of iniquity; it stains the whole body, sets on fire the cycle of life, and is itself set on fire by hell. ⁷ For every species of beast and bird, of reptile and sea creature, can be tamed and has been tamed by the human species, ⁸ but no one can tame the tongue—a restless evil, full of deadly poison. ⁹ With it we bless the Lord and Father, and with it we curse people, made in the likeness of God. ¹⁰ From the same mouth comes a blessing and a curse. My brothers and sisters, this ought not to be so. ¹¹ Does a spring pour forth from the same opening both fresh and brackish water? ¹² Can a fig tree, my brothers and sisters, yield olives or a grapevine figs? No more can salt water yield fresh.

¹³ Who is wise and knowledgeable among you? Show by your good life that your works are done with gentleness born of wisdom. ¹⁴ But if you have bitter envy and selfish ambition in your hearts, do not be arrogant and lie about the truth. ¹⁵ This is not wisdom that comes down from above but is earthly, unspiritual, devilish. ¹⁶ For where there is envy and selfish ambition, there will also be disorder and wickedness of every kind. ¹⁷ But the wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, willing to yield, full of mercy and good fruits, without a trace of partiality or hypocrisy. ¹⁸ And the fruit of righteousness is sown in peace by those who make peace.

Wisdom in the Water

Proverbs 1:20-33; James 3:1-18; Matthew 10:40-42

What a voyage we have been on throughout the month of September, dear ones! Upon our voyaging vessel the book of *James*, we have made our way through the living waters of wadis, springs, rivers, and saliva. We have witnessed those living waters flowing through the lives of Hagar the Egyptian, Ishmael her son, Isaac his brother, Abraham their father, Elijah the Tishbite, the widow of Zarephath, John the Baptist, Jesus of Nazareth, the Syrophoenician woman, a man who had a hearing impairment and a speech impediment, and a man who had a vision impairment. The water has quenched, cleansed, healed, and saved. As we have sailed upon it, we have learned about endurance, true religion, faith, and works. And all of that, at last, brings us to our destination: Wisdom. Our scriptures are overflowing with water, and our scriptures exist for the purpose of leading us to Wisdom. And so, of course, there is Wisdom in the water!

We have talked before about how Wisdom is an aspect of the divine, and of course, she is feminine. She is named Hochma in Hebrew and Sophia in Greek. She cries out to us in the street and town square, saying, "I will pour out my thoughts to you; I will make my words known to you." Today she speaks to us through the words of James, in the third chapter of his epistle. And my, what powerful words they are! He starts with the wise reminder that teaching is a vocation that requires specific, remarkable giftedness. I know that several of you have embodied that giftedness and are not recognized nearly enough. So, to those of you who are or have been teachers, thank you! He then gives us a wise lesson on the power of our tongues, using some of the most vivid imagery to be found anywhere in the scriptures. It is the bit in the mouths of horses that controls their movements. It is the small flame that can set the whole forest ablaze. And, intersecting with our theme of water, it is the small rudder that has the power to steer even the largest of ships through the strongest of winds. Oh yes, the tongue is powerful indeed!

He is using the tongue as a metonymic stand in for our speech, of course, and in doing so makes one of those profoundly significant statements that I have somehow never paid attention to before: "With it we bless the Lord and Father, and with it we curse people, made in the likeness of God." Aha! Perhaps the beginning of Wisdom is to remember that all of us humans bear the image and likeness of God! So how dare we be arrogant and hypocritical to think that we can bless God and then use the same mouth to curse those who bear God's image! "Does a spring pour forth from the same opening both fresh and brackish water? Can a fig tree, my brothers and sisters, yield olives or a grapevine figs? No more can salt water yield fresh."

Our blessing is no longer a blessing if we are cursing God's children—if we are insulting, belittling, and discouraging—if we are making people to feel unworthy, unwanted, and unwelcome. So, if we want our blessing of God to be true, we must treat each other with the same love, kindness, and respect that we would show to God. Aha! I see the rivers of living water flowing forth from the same source! And there is Wisdom in that water! In the words of *Matthew* 25: "And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did it to me." In the words of *James* 3, "Show by your good life that your works are done with gentleness born of wisdom," and, "The wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, willing to yield, full of mercy and good fruits, without a trace of partiality or hypocrisy. And the fruit of righteousness is sown in peace by those who make peace."

It all seems so clear and simple! Wisdom is crying out to us. Wisdom is making herself obvious to us! See God in the children of God and thus treat the children of God with the same love, kindness, and respect that we would show God. If we would only do that, we would make peace. If we would only do that, we would be whole.

So how is it that we end up being so darned foolish?! Why is it that when Wisdom calls out to us we refuse her? Why is it that when Wisdom reaches her hand out to us we do not heed her? Why is it that when Wisdom counsels us we ignore her?

James steers us in the right direction to answer this as well! "But if you have bitter envy and selfish ambition in your hearts, do not be arrogant and lie about the truth. This is not wisdom that comes down from above but is earthly, unspiritual, devilish. For where there is envy and selfish ambition, there will also be

disorder and wickedness of every kind." Earthly wisdom, which I think we can safely call "foolishness," is the antithetical enemy of divine Wisdom in us, and it is defined by arrogance, envy, and selfish ambition. I am struck by how clear this all is! James is a worthy teacher indeed! For, arrogance, envy, and selfish ambition characterize exactly the foolishness that defines the politics of power that plague our world.

This is the foolishness that deludes a nation of people to believe that it is somehow ok to murder children of God as a means of "justice." The wickedness is made all the more apparent in a case like that of Marcellus Williams, for whom there was clear evidence of innocence, but the wickedness is there with any state-sponsored killing. For, it is utter hypocrisy to claim to follow God in the flesh who was murdered by capital punishment and then to murder others by capital punishment. This is the foolishness that has led a modern nation state bearing the sacred name of *Israel* to become the slaughterer of innocents, killing more than 13,000 actual children in an area of land a full 100 square miles smaller than Chicago in less than one year. This is the foolishness that has led us to pay the taxes that fund that slaughter. This is the foolishness that tells us to seek power over rather than power with, to segregate rather than liberate, to choose wealth of resources over wealth of relationships. Wisdom is crying out to us, so why do we so often respond to the calls of foolishness?

This week I was having a conversation with one of the wisest people I have ever had the blessing to know—my grandma, Nanny Janet Orem. She is one of those teachers by vocation who truly has that specific, remarkable giftedness James alludes to. And, of course, she is a woman. Wise, indeed! As often happens, she and I were trying to solve the problems of the world and not getting very far. In the midst of our striving, she reminded me that hatred is something that is taught, not something that is inborn. In other words, foolishness is something that we learn from those who do *not* have the specific, remarkable giftedness of wise teachers. It is something we learn from those who choose the path of arrogance, envy, and selfish ambition. What would happen, then, if instead we started listening to the actual teachers?

My wise Nanny and I concluded that the wisest teacher of all teaches us exactly how to embody Wisdom throughout the gospels. So let us turn to him for the final word. He summoned his *disciples*, that old, old word for *students*, and said, "Whoever welcomes you welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me. Whoever welcomes a prophet in the name of a prophet will receive a prophet's reward, and whoever welcomes a righteous person in the name of a righteous person will receive the reward of the righteous." This is the easiest to understand formulation yet of, "How you treat your fellow human beings is how you treat God." And then he gets to the Wisdom in the water. He says, "And whoever gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones in the name of a disciple—truly I tell you, none of these will lose their reward."

That, dear ones, is the very beating heart of Wisdom. It is the source from which all other waters flow. It is uncomplicated. It is easy to grasp. It is easy to do. And it is the most profoundly powerful thing in the world. When a child is thirsty, give them a cup of cold water. Do this as you would to a disciple of the Lord. Do this as you would to the Lord himself. Do this as you would to God. What we do to children, we do to God.


What will we choose? Will it be lords to make our children feel unworthy, unwanted, and unwelcome? Will it be walls and weapons and wars and slaughter? Or will it be a cup of cold water?

Wisdom cries out from the street and the town square, and "On the last day of the festival, the great day, while Jesus was standing there, he cried out, 'Let anyone who is thirsty come to me, and let the one who believes in me drink. As the scripture has said, 'Out of the believer's heart shall flow rivers of living water.'" Amen!
