

#### **TRUSTEES**

Jeffery Savage, President of the Trustees, reported on the following:

- Signs have been placed in washrooms to make sure water is turned off when not in use.
- The irrigation contractor has been changed to Rainmakers for this year.
- Matt's Landscaping contract was accepted for lawn mowing and fertilizing with some changes.
- Christian Science Society has asked about using a room in our building for services and a monthly meeting.
- The holes in the sanctuary have been plugged up as we have had bird visitors in our church building.
- The sign in the parking lot has been replaced.
- Other items to be explored include looking into the other outdoor signs and replacement of the sanctuary main doors.
- Garden plans Plans are being made for seasonal garden work this year.
- Re-painting of the lines in parking lot is being planned.

#### **DEACONS**

- Prayer List: Current list was updated.
- Sunshine Bags: Have been prepared and delivered to several in our congregation.
- Prayer Shawl Ministry: Two new Prayer Shawls were blessed and ready for gifting.
- Blessing Box: Deacons continue to check and stock the box daily for perishable and outdated items.
- Glady's Table: Krissy LaFlech's High School Students prepared Gladys' Meal on March 15th with Deacon's delivering. Eleven meals were delivered for the month of February.
- Sackurday: Kiwanis prepared and handed out 48 bag lunches for the month of February. Kelly LaFlech prepared lunches on March 22<sup>nd</sup>
- Smock Grant: Pastor Tyler shared that The Smock Foundation has approved the replenishing of our Grant with \$10,000. Pastor Tyler Orem and Pam Porter will continue to disburse funds to parishioners in need. Thank you will be sent to the Smock Foundation for their monetary generosity.
- Directory: The Deacons are contacting members of their clusters to make sure the directory information is correct.



#### **SESSION**

#### Easter and Lent Plans:

- Palms have been ordered. Easter flowers will be tulips, lilies, and hyacinths for \$10.
- Easter Cantata 3/30
- Maundy Thursday Worship and Communion 4/17 at 7:00 pm
- Resurrection Sunday Worship 4/20

<u>Fundraising</u>: Fundraising ideas were generated. Soup sales raised \$116 on March 16. Salad sales will begin in July. Got Sneakers is an ongoing fundraiser. Looking ahead, we are possibly doing a coffee sale in the fall and a fundraising dinner.

Endowment Fund Guideline Changes: Session discussed changes to the Endowment Fund Guidelines which would allow us to be more flexible in the percentage for the allotment each year to help with the general fund and decrease the deficit. A congregational meeting will be held in April to vote on specific changes.

<u>Presbyterian Foundation Workshop:</u> On May 18<sup>th</sup> after worship, a workshop on planned giving will be presented by Sherry Finke, a representative from the Presbyterian Foundation. Other churches will be invited to attend.

Concrete steps to reduce the deficit: In addition to fundraising, Session discussed other ideas to raise money, which included having each ministry downsize their budgets, looking for possible assets we can sell that are no longer needed, renting parts of the building, offering cooking classes or other programs where members have an expertise, and having an organ or other music concert. We also reread ideas from the congregation. If anyone has an idea that they would like to try, please let us know. We welcome people from the congregation who would like to organize an event.

#### Reflecting God's Goodness in All You Do

People have been created by God's goodness, as a reflection of God's goodness, to do good. Being created in the image of God means that people have intrinsic value and worth. They have free will. They have been given the job of caring for God's good world. They have the capacity to grow in Christlikeness, becoming more and more like Jesus, so that they, too, display godly attributes such as love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control (Galatians 5:22-23). Action flows out of being, thus when people become loving, joyful, peaceful and kind humans, they behave in ways that are loving, joyful, peaceful and kind. As they do this, they reflect God's goodness to the world.

People are created to do good (Ephesians 2:10) and their good works reflect God's goodness to a broken world. When people selflessly give in a way that helps better someone else's condition, they share God's goodness. When they choose forgiveness and restoration over bitterness and resentment, they inhabit God's goodness. Try it this week. Do something that benefits someone else without expecting anything in return, choose to strengthen and improve life for those around you just as God has done for you.

#### SHARING CALENDAR FOR LENT


This year's Lent devotional is a calendar instead of a booklet. "A Sharing Calendar for Lent 2025" is part of the One Great Hour of Sharing special offering that is associated with Lent each year. Beginning with Ash Wednesday (March 5) and going through Easter Sunday (April 20), there is a suggested prayer, reflection or activity you can do each day except on Saturdays. The reflections and activities are related to the areas of hunger, disaster assistance and self-development of people – the three focus areas of the One Great Hour of Sharing offering. As you make your way through this calendar devotional, you might find yourself inspired to try something new, or to pray and reflect in a different way. This Lent calendar devotional is available in worship beginning March 2, and mailed to those who don't have email. If you would prefer to have an electronic copy of the calendar emailed to you, contact Heather Casiano (hcasiano@fpchighland.org).

This calendar was designed for use along with the annual "fish banks" that we hand out. Some of the activities suggest placing an amount of coins or dollars in your fish bank. You may choose to do this in any way that is appropriate for you – add a certain amount of money with each activity; keep a tally throughout Lent and make one deposit into your fish bank at the end of Lent; or you may choose to participate in the activities and reflections without a financial offering. The fish banks with any financial offerings can be returned to the church on Easter Sunday or the week after.



#### • PRAYER ACTIVITY STATIONS

Instead of having a spirituality center set up in one room, as we have in the past, this year we will have a variety of prayer stations set up around the building for you to engage with (most will be located in the Narthex and Sanctuary). One new prayer station will be added each week of Lent. There is also be a walkable labyrinth in the Fellowship Room for anyone to use. The prayer stations are appropriate for all ages, so you are encouraged to share this space with children, youth and adults in your life. *The prayer stations are available on Sundays before and after worship, and during regular church office hours* (Mon. –Thurs., 8 am to noon). 


### ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING SPECIAL OFFERINGS

Please do not donate homemade or perishable items.


