#### Isaiah 65:17-25

says the Lord.

<sup>17</sup> For I am about to create new heavens and a new earth; the former things shall not be remembered or come to mind. <sup>18</sup> But be glad and rejoice forever in what I am creating, for I am about to create Jerusalem as a joy and its people as a delight. <sup>19</sup> I will rejoice in Jerusalem and delight in my people; no more shall the sound of weeping be heard in it or the cry of distress. <sup>20</sup> No more shall there be in it an infant who lives but a few days or an old person who does not live out a lifetime. for one who dies at a hundred years will be considered a youth, and one who falls short of a hundred will be considered accursed. <sup>21</sup> They shall build houses and inhabit them; they shall plant vineyards and eat their fruit. <sup>22</sup> They shall not build and another inhabit; they shall not plant and another eat, for like the days of a tree shall the days of my people be, and my chosen shall long enjoy the work of their hands. <sup>23</sup> They shall not labor in vain or bear children for calamity, for they shall be offspring blessed by the Lord and their descendants as well. <sup>24</sup> Before they call I will answer, while they are yet speaking I will hear. <sup>25</sup> The wolf and the lamb shall feed together; the lion shall eat straw like the ox, but the serpent—its food shall be dust! They shall not hurt or destroy on all my holy mountain,

#### Romans 12:1-8

12 I appeal to you therefore, brothers and sisters, on the basis of God's mercy, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your reasonable act of worship. <sup>2</sup> Do not be conformed to this age, but be transformed by the renewing of the mind, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect.

<sup>3</sup> For by the grace given to me I say to everyone among you not to think of yourself more highly than you ought to think but to think with sober judgment, each according to the measure of faith that God has assigned. <sup>4</sup> For as in one body we have many members and not all the members have the same function, <sup>5</sup> so we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another. <sup>6</sup> We have gifts that differ according to the grace given to us: prophecy, in proportion to faith; <sup>7</sup> ministry, in ministering; the teacher, in teaching; <sup>8</sup> the encourager, in encouragement; the giver, in sincerity; the leader, in diligence; the compassionate, in cheerfulness.

#### Acts 28:23-31

<sup>23</sup> After they had set a day to meet with him, they came to him at his lodgings in great numbers. From morning until evening he explained the matter to them, testifying to the kingdom of God and trying to convince them about Jesus both from the law of Moses and from the prophets. <sup>24</sup> Some were convinced by what he had said, while others refused to believe. <sup>25</sup> So they disagreed with each other, and as they were leaving Paul made one further statement: "The Holy Spirit was right in saying to your ancestors through the prophet Isaiah,

<sup>26</sup> 'Go to this people and say,
You will indeed listen but never understand, and you will indeed look but never perceive.
<sup>27</sup> For this people's heart has grown dull, and their ears are hard of hearing, and they have shut their eyes; otherwise they might look with their eyes and listen with their ears

## **Beautiful Belonging**

Isaiah 65:17-25; Romans 12:1-8; Acts 28:23-31

When last we met, Paul and the Gospel writer called Luke along with their centurion guards had boarded a ship after three months of being shipwrecked on the island of Malta. Their ship was heavy, fit to bursting with all of the provisions given by the locals who had saved them. Now listen to the words of Luke:

"We set sail on a ship that had wintered at the island, an Alexandrian ship with the Twin Brothers as its figurehead. We put in at Syracuse and stayed there for three days; then we weighed anchor and came to Rhegium. After one day there a south wind sprang up, and on the second day we came to Puteoli. There we found believers and were invited to stay with them for seven days. And so we came to Rome. The believers from there, when they heard of us, came as far as the Forum of Appius and Three Taverns to meet us. On seeing them, Paul thanked God and took courage. When we came into Rome, Paul was allowed to live by himself, with the soldier who was guarding him."

Finally, after years and years of journeying for Paul and weeks and weeks of us journeying alongside of Paul, he made it to Rome. Rome, the home of the church to which he wrote his most sophisticated and influential theological treatise. Rome, the center of the Empire that was still persecuting the Movement of the Way of Jesus of Nazareth and that had executed Jesus of Nazareth. Rome, the city where the Apostle Paul who once was Saul would live out the rest of his days and then be executed on the orders of the emperor Nero himself.

Wait a minute! What?! I thought he was going there to appeal for his freedom, not to lose his life! What happened?

"When Paul got there he called together the local leaders of the Jews. When they had assembled, he said to them, 'Brothers, though I had done nothing against our people or the customs of our ancestors, yet I was arrested in Jerusalem and handed over to the Romans. When they had examined me, the Romans wanted to release me, because there was no reason for the death penalty in my case. But when the Jews objected, I was compelled to appeal to the emperor—even though I had no charge to bring against my nation. For this reason therefore I have asked to see you and speak with you, since it is for the sake of the hope of Israel that I am bound with this chain.' They replied, 'We have received no letters from Judea about you, and none of the brothers coming here has reported or spoken anything evil about you. But we would like to hear from you what you think, for with regard to this sect we know that everywhere it is spoken against.'"

The plot thickens. He was originally accused by the temple leaders in Jerusalem. But religious leaders in Rome have no knowledge of this. They are simply curious. So, it wasn't Paul's religious brothers and sisters who ultimately led the charge for execution. It was without question the Roman elites, all the way up to the emperor himself, who would lead that charge. The emperor who was supposed to help him. Again, what happened!?

Today's reading from *Acts* is the final passage in the entire book. Hmm. I feel a pang of sadness that our sojourn in this often forgotten book is coming to an end. Our time spent in it has been beautiful and fruitful—the ascension of Jesus, the inbreathing of the Holy Spirit, the birth of the Church, the catching of fire, the spreading of the movement of the Way of Jesus of Nazareth, the raising of the deacons and deaconesses, the persecutions, the conversion of Paul, the disagreements, the leadership struggles, the reconciliations, the journeys, the miracles, the transformed hearts and minds, the relationships of mutuality and love between different religious and racial and language groups, the sharing of resources and meals in community. And now here we are. These final words of *Acts* are a perfect encapsulation of everything.

After all of his journeying, Paul finally had his own home. I hope he rested for awhile, but I doubt it. Our passage tells us that his home quickly became a gathering place, a hub of community. "They came to him at his lodgings in great numbers. From morning until evening he explained the matter to them, testifying to the kingdom of God and trying to convince them about Jesus both from the law of Moses and from the prophets. Some were convinced by what he had said, while others refused to believe. So they disagreed with each other."

Great numbers of people gathered together. Paul preached the good news. They disagreed. They argued. Sounds like the beginnings of the Church indeed!

"And as they were leaving, Paul made one further statement: 'The Holy Spirit was right in saying to your ancestors through the prophet Isaiah:
'Go to this people and say,
You will indeed listen, but never understand,
and you will indeed look, but never perceive.
For this people's heart has grown dull,
and their ears are hard of hearing,
and they have shut their eyes;
so that they might not look with their eyes,
and listen with their ears,
and understand with their heart and turn.'"

Of course, Paul always has to get his digs in, his little jabs at the community that raised him and therefore presented the biggest challenge to him. But the quotation from Isaiah doesn't end there. It ends like this:

"And I would heal them." I would heal them.

After the digs and jabs, after the self righteousness and indignation, there is grace. There is healing. Those ears would be healed to hear, those eyes healed to see, those hearts healed to understand. No matter how far Paul tried to run in the other direction, it was always necessary that he return to his own people, that he minister to his own people, that he show the love and grace that saved him to his own people.

And then of course Paul reminds them that the saving love and grace of God are not limited to the tribes of Israel. They are limitless in their depth, and they are limitless in their breadth. And so he says, "Let it be known to you then that this salvation of God has been sent to the Gentiles." Paul's unique vocation was to expand the reach of the good news to include all people, regardless of where they came from or what religion they practiced.

Finally, our author called Luke gives us his closing narration: "He lived there two whole years at his own expense and welcomed all who came to him, proclaiming the kingdom of God and teaching about the Lord Jesus Christ with all boldness and without hindrance."

That, my friends is the heart of the book of *Acts*. Indeed it is the heart of the Gospel. EVERYONE BELONGS HERE. Everyone belongs in the community of the followers of the Way of Jesus of Nazareth. Everyone belongs in the house of worship. Everyone at the shared table. Everyone belongs in fellowship and debate and disagreement and the mutual sharpening of iron that that entails. Everyone belongs in the miracle of healing. Everyone belongs in the love and grace of God.

In the fullness of self and identity, everyone belongs. Male, female, intersex, transgender, and gender queer. Everyone belongs. Middle Eastern, European, African, Asian. Everyone belongs. Persecuted, prosecuted, imprisoned, free. Everyone belongs. Poor, middle class, rich. Everyone belongs. Gay, lesbian, bisexual, pansexual, asexual, straight. Everyone belongs. Child, adolescent, young adult, middle aged, old, very old. Everyone belongs. Disabled, sick, able. Everyone belongs. Street smart, book smart, emotionally smart. Everyone belongs. Demon possessed, substance addicted, depressed, anxious, hallucinating, functioning. Everyone belongs. Widowed, divorced, single, married. Everyone belongs. Orphaned, parented, adopted, fostered. Everyone belongs. Undocumented, documented, citizen, non-citizen. Everyone belongs. Sinners, saints, sinners who are saints. Everyone belongs.

After all, this is the Church of the Beautiful Community that formed when the Holy Spirit blew through a group of people from different continents, languages, and races. This is the Church of the man with a mobility disability who begged at the Beautiful Gate outside of the temple and then leapt for joy upon learning that he belonged inside. This is the Church of Stephen the protomartyr deacon who spoke truth to power with such Beautiful Boldness and Bravery. This is the Church of the Ethiopian eunuch who practiced Beautiful Communication. This is the Church of Lydia, the dealer of Beautiful Purple Cloth. This is the Church of Lydia's entire family, including the infants and children. This is the Church of refugees Priscilla and Aquila and their Beautiful Tentmaking Evangelism. This is the Church of Dorcas, Damaris, Euodia, Syntyche, and the other Preparers of the Beautiful Way. This is the Church of that unexpected community of 12 of John the Baptist's disciples who were doing the work of the Beautiful Body of Christ and spreading the good news long before anyone else. This is the Church of all the saints who faced persecution, punishment, and death all for the sake of their Beautiful Faith. This is the Church of Peter the denier who was so deeply flawed and who so deeply loved his Lord and best friend Jesus. This is the Church of James who was so deeply stubborn and rigid in race and religion and who so deeply loved his brother Jesus. This is the Church of Paul who was Saul who was once the cruelest of all but who then heard the Beautiful Voice and opened the Beautiful Eyes of his Heart and thus experienced that Beautiful Transformation. This is the Church in which all these vastly different people with their vastly different ways of being and believing and doing managed to work as a team to make the Beautiful Dreamwork. All of these sinners who were also saints from the book of Acts found belonging—that most precious of phenomena—all of us sinful saints find belonging in this Beautiful Community called the Church because this is the Church of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, O that Beautiful Name, God in the flesh, lover of all, savior of all—outcast, denied, persecuted, prosecuted, imprisoned and crucified.

Aha! This is why Paul would be executed by that same empire. His house was dangerous. His Church was dangerous. To declare that everyone belonged was to defy every system of division and oppression so meticulously built by the powers and principalities of this world. To ensure that everyone belonged was to subvert an economy of scarcity. To set a table where everyone belonged was to invert hierarchies of power. To build a community in which everyone belonged was to build a Kingdom that stood in opposition to a world built on foundations of hatred and violence and death.

Paul wrote to the church in Rome: "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect."

First Presbyterian Church of Highland, what is good and acceptable and perfect is exactly this—to ensure that everyone knows that they belong to the love and grace of God. Yes, Beautiful Belonging. This is our highest calling. This is our purpose as the heart, hands, and feet of Jesus Christ. This is why we exist. This is why we serve. This is why we keep our doors open. This is why we commit our resources. This is why we commit ourselves. For we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another. One body. All bound together. All part of one another. This is the Way of Jesus of Nazareth. This is the way of God.


I close with words that Paul wrote to his loved ones in Rome, words that tell us exactly how to create a community of Beautiful Belonging. May we learn them well. May we live them well.

Let love be genuine; hate what is evil; hold fast to what is good; love one another with mutual affection; outdo one another in showing honor. Do not lag in zeal; be ardent in spirit; serve the Lord. Rejoice in hope; be patient in affliction; persevere in prayer. Contribute to the needs of the saints; pursue hospitality to strangers.

Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse them. Rejoice with those who rejoice; weep with those who weep. Live in harmony with one another; do not be arrogant, but associate with the lowly; do not claim to be wiser than you are. Do not repay anyone evil for evil, but take thought for what is noble in the sight of all. If it is possible, so far as it depends on you, live in peace with all. Amen!


