

SUMMER PRAYER WALL

This summer we have a prayer station located inside door D (by the church office) for everyone to participate in. This "Prayer Ribbon Wall" uses different colors of ribbons to represent our prayers.

A piece of chicken wire hangs on the wall, and there are multiple colors of ribbons on a table each representing a type of prayer. Choose one or more ribbons that represent the type of prayer you want to lift up at the time, and then tie the ribbon (s) onto the chicken wire. There is nothing to write down, and all prayers remain anonymous except to our God, who knows our needs even before we do!

Over time, the ribbons will fill in the wire and become a beautiful piece of prayer art. Everyone is invited to say a prayer for all the ribbons already tied on and the needs they represent, regardless of whether you add your own ribbons or not. ** If you are not able to come to the church but would like to participate, you can create a prayer ribbon station in your home. Gather some different colored strings, ribbons, strips of old fabric, or cut strips from colored plastic table cloths. When you have a prayer need or praise for yourself or others, choose a "prayer ribbon" from



your collection. Tie it somewhere you'll see it, like on a cupboard knob or drawer pull, on a fence or flag pole outdoors, or another space you have available. After adding your ribbon, say a prayer. You can add as many ribbons as often as you feel the need to pray. Every time you see the ribbons, you can be reminded of God's faithfulness to you and those you care about.
