SESSION

- Session authorized the transfer of \$12,000 from Endowment Fund to the General Fund to help with expenses this year.
- Fundraisers were discussed. The craft sales made over \$550 so far this year and there are 3 more scheduled sales after worship on November 30th, December 7th and December 14th.
- Session approved Shannon Crittendon's request to be received into membership by reaffirmation of faith at an upcoming Sunday service. Welcome, Shannon!
- Heather Casiano had attended the Presbytery meeting as our commissioner on 11/18 and reported that both Heather and Pastor Tyler have been approved as commissioners from Presbytery to the General Assembly in Milwaukee in 2026. Heather was also nominated and approved to be on the Committee on Ministry (COM) for the Presbytery. Congratulations to both Heather and Tyler!
- Session approved the use of our parking lot this coming Saturday, 11/22, at 3 pm to distribute food to the community. The group organizing this is called "NWI Neighbors Helping Neighbors" and began with three individuals collecting food and supplies to hand out to others less fortunate.
- Elder Carol Callaway reported that the choir chairs have all been reupholstered. Donations are still being taken to cover the balance that is due. Please consider contributing to this worthy cause.
- Session approved Heather Casiano's 2026 contract as Faith Development Coordinator.
- Session discussed the administrative assistant's compensation package and the Pastor's Terms of Call.
- The Advent calendar was reviewed:

 - December 21st Congregational meeting to elect officers & approve Pastor's Terms of Call

TRUSTEES

Jeffery Savage, President of the Trustees reported on the following:

- Rainmakers Irrigation winterized the sprinkler system.
- Bren-Mark is scheduled to clean all gutters between Nov. 15 and 20.
- The 2026 budget proposal has been reviewed and submitted to the Stewardship and Finance Ministry.
- The Trustees are looking at ways to winterize the louvers on the kitchen exhaust fan and the outside fans in the sanctuary.
- A current conditioner to protect our electronic equipment during power outages is being considered.
- Solutions to the main sanctuary door that was sticking on Sunday were discussed.
- Other projects of lesser priority are ongoing.



DEACONS

- Joys and concerns of the congregation were shared.
- Prayer Shawls and Sunshine Bags continue to be given out to individuals.
- Blessing Box is checked daily by the Deacons. Needed supplies include paper towels, soups, little shampoos, feminine hygiene products, toothbrushes and toothpaste.
- Krissy LaFlech and her High School students prepared Glady's Table Meals on November 15th. The Deacons delivered 12 meals on October 18th.
- Sharon's Caring Ministry received a generous monetary donation which will be used for Sackurdays and Gladys' Table meals.
- Kelly LaFlech prepared and served 45 Sackurday bag lunches on Oct 25th. Kiwanis will prepare and serve lunches on November 29th.
- Pastor Tyler Orem and Pam Porter will continue to disperse funds from the Smock Grant to parishioners in need.


Tax Update as the New Year Approaches

ONLINE ADVENT DEVOTIONS

In addition to the "Draw Near" devotional booklet, the Faith Development team has compiled a list of several other free Advent devotionals. Advent begins on Nov. 30th this year and continues through Dec. 24th. For the online devotionals, you can bookmark the one(s) you like on your device and read from it daily, or print a copy. Choose whichever options make your Advent experience meaningful.

- There are 24 chapters in the gospel according to Luke. Start on Dec. 1st and read one chapter a day to get you through Christmas Eve. The author of Luke's gospel gives us a pretty thorough view of Jesus' life and ministry from birth to death-resurrection-ascension.
- D365 offers a short daily advent devotional through their <u>"Following the Star"</u> series, Dec. 1-24. You can follow along on the D365 app or website, <u>www.d365.org</u>.
- <u>Pittsburgh Theological Seminary</u> offers a free Advent devotional each year, which can be found online at https://www.pts.edu/devotional_1. You can download a PDF of the devotion, visit the webpage each day, or subscribe to get the devotions in your email. There are also audio recordings for each day's Scripture reading and devotion that you can listen to.
- <u>Presbyterians for Earth Care</u> has a free Advent devotional to download in both English and Spanish: https://presbyearthcare.org/devotional-and-worship-aids/
- UKirk Collegiate Ministries, part of the PCUSA Office of Christian Formation, offers "Words for Waiting", a free online Advent devotional. This year's theme is "Woven Together", and runs from Nov. 30 to Jan. 6 (Epiphany): https://ukirkadvent.org/
- <u>"Trans Advent"</u> is offered by the Unbound: The Intersections of Faith and Justice website here: https://justiceunbound.org/transadvent/. Unbound is a ministry of the PCUSA, exploring the intersections of faith and justice.

• "BYOB" (Bring Your Own Bible) discussion group meets on Wednesday evenings from 7-8 pm online using Zoom. There will be NO BYOB on Dec. 24 and 31. We will resume BYOB on Jan. 7, 2026. Each week this group takes a look at the scriptures from our Sunday worship services, asking questions, bringing up different perspectives, and hopefully encountering the Holy Spirit in a fresh way.
