Dear All,

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

Happy New Year 2025! Each new year is an opportunity for us to dream and to embody the hope and imagination necessary to bring dreams to fruition. Indeed, each new day is an opportunity for us to do so! Our scriptures are full of dreams, both the aspirational kind and the sleeping kind. The prophets received visions in dreams about the world that could be if the people only changed their hearts, minds, and actions in ways that would bring them closer to God and closer to God's plan. At this turn of the year, I invite us all to consider what we should be dreaming and envisioning as the Church writ large and as the congregation of the First Presbyterian Church of Highland. How should we be changing our hearts, minds and actions? What is God beckoning us towards in this moment?

For insight into this, we can turn to the story that sets in motion the season of Epiphany, the season that we commenced with joy, awe, and wonder on January 5th. The magi followed the brilliant star of Bethlehem to the Christ child. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. Then there is the part that we know so well: "On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother, and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh." Then something else very important happened. They had a dream! In that dream, they were warned not to go to Herod on their way home, for Herod had evil plans to kill the child. By changing their route based on that dream, they saved the life of Jesus and thus played a significant role in saving the world. They chose the life of the child over the command of an earthly king. As the kings of the world continue to take the lives of children at horrifying rates in order to maintain their power, may we follow the example of the magi! May we also dream this dream!

May we be willing to practice disobedience in the face of the powers that be for the sake of children who are suffering because of guns, because of wars, because of genocide, because of climate change, because of hunger, because of poverty, and because of homophobia, transphobia, and xenophobia.

As we dream for the children, we have wonderful opportunities to bring dreams to fruition at FPCH. Our missions to the community and the world seek to address hunger and poverty. Our consistent work of welcoming everyone combats those phobias that break children's spirits. Our support of our siblings in Zambia helps children and families facing the worst drought in decades. We are certainly pursing God's vision! Thank you for being so amazing, loved ones!

We also have our own internal dreaming and working to do in order to sustain our congregation in a new year. Let's dream together about how we can build resources and steward resources in a way that propels us forward and allows us to keep serving God's children. Let's dream together about how we can spread the good news of God's love in creative ways. Let's dream together and listen for the voice of God calling out to us. And yes, let's look to the stars and be overwhelmed with joy!

I leave you with these words from Isaiah:

Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the LORD has risen upon you. For darkness shall cover the earth and thick darkness the peoples, but the LORD will arise upon you, and his glory will appear over you.

- 4. Rev. Tyler and Elder Jean Smith gave a report from the Presbytery meeting on December 3. Pastor Tyler was honored for his service to the Presbytery the past 3 years.
- 5. Fellowship Hosting Schedule was set for January and February.




STAR WORDS for 2025

BIBLE STUDY AND DISCUSSION OPPORTUNITIES

There are two opportunities to join a Bible study or sermon/Scripture discussion group. These opportunities are open to all who are interested, from middle school students to the most mature of adults. You don't have to be a church member to participate, so invite your friends and family to join in the discussions with you.

- "<u>The Bible in Today's World</u>" Bible study group meets on <u>Sunday mornings from 9 to</u> <u>10 am at the church</u>. We're reading through the book "A is for Alabaster" by Anna Carter Florence. The book takes us through the alphabet of both the Old and New Testaments, focusing on one Scripture story per letter. Join us for great conversation and perhaps a new perspective on God's Word. Each week's lesson is independent from the other weeks, so feel free to jump in any time. - "<u>BYOB</u>" (Bring Your Own Bible) discussion group meets on <u>Wednesday evenings from</u> <u>7-8 pm online using Zoom</u>. Each week this group takes a look at the Scriptures and sermon from the previous Sunday's worship service, asking questions, bringing up different perspectives, and encountering the Holy Spirit in a fresh way. The link for the Zoom meetings is emailed out weekly. You can connect to Zoom with a smart phone, tablet or computer. If you're not familiar with how to use Zoom, please contact Pastor Tyler or Heather Casiano for assistance.


Bring in gently used and clean scarves, hats, gloves, and stuffed animals for Pastor Tyler and Abdul to distribute to migrant families in Chicago!
