Dear All,

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

We are only days away from Resurrection Sunday! Alleluia! The Resurrection is the beating heart of our faith. The promise of new life gives us hope for a future beyond death. possibility of new life! As we do so, may we recognize how our congregation is experiencing new life in the midst of all the hardship that we have endured over the past year! For, if we recognize this, we will know that even though we will continue to face challenges that will be hard, we have nothing to fear. We are a Resurrection people! That means that we also have the power to show others the promise and hope of new life. What a blessed, exciting opportunity! Alleluia!

As we look forward to Resurrection Sunday, we do still have a few days of Lent remaining—the crucial days of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday. When we embarked on this Lenten journey, I presented the concept of *AdLent*, encouraging us to think of this season as a time of grief AND a time of hope. In that vein, please do take the time to experience and reflect upon your grief in these last few days of Lent. Consider how your suffering and the suffering of the world is connected to the suffering Jesus experienced on his journey to the cross and on the cross itself. Reflect on the truth that Jesus truly came to know the full depths of human suffering and therefore understands what we experience in the midst of our own depths, however they may manifest. And of course there is hope in that truth! For, in overcoming death, Jesus overcame EVERYTHING that leads to death with full knowledge of what those things are. No matter what we may be going through, Jesus gets it and knows how to get through it! Alleluia!

I look forward to worshiping alongside of you and being in community with you throughout Eastertide, both in person and virtually! Let us remember that the Resurrection is not relegated to just a single day. Liturgically, it is a full season. Spiritually, it is ALWAYS!


I leave you with these words from *Mark*:

## SESSION SHORTS

The Session spent much of the meeting discussing the re-opening of in-person church and other in-person meetings. The following was decided:

- In-person worship will begin on Palm Sunday, March 28, with a virtual service being live-streamed.
- All mitigation will be followed: Masks and social distancing will be required. Sanitizer and masks will be available in the narthex. Bulletins and the offering plate will be on a table in the narthex to pick up as you enter.
- Windows and the main door will be open for air circulation.
- For the time-being, we will not be singing hymns or responses indoors. (But you can hum)
- There will be a time of outdoor fellowship after worship, weather permitting.
- Ministry, committee and outside group meetings can begin meeting in April, with masks and social distancing in place.
- Adult Connections Bible studies: Watch for more information on the day and time the adult Bible study on Sunday mornings will resume. BYOB (Bring your own Bible) Wednesday night study will continue to be virtual.

The Session determined that the Maundy Thursday service will be a virtual service.

## Endowment Fund Donations




Would you like to honor a loved one? Are you celebrating a special anniversary, birthday or maybe the birth of a grandchild? Would you like to make a memorial contribution in lieu of flowers in the sanctuary? The endowment fund is a way to make these contributions and a more lasting gift to the church.

Each year a portion of the fund provides money to help fund mission, the general fund and grants for unbudgeted and non-ongoing projects. In the past the fund has helped with new windows in the classroom wing, fellowship hall carpeting, kitchen and narthex remodeling, youth ministry, support for hurricane victims, parking lot repair and resurfacing, a new boiler to heat our buildings, funding for the Family and Children Coordinator, and technology needs.



### “The Joy of Giving”

There is a story of a young boy walking on the seashore who noticed the beach littered with starfish after a storm. Feeling the need to help in some way, he carefully picked up the one closest to him and returned it to the sea. An old man saw this, approached him and commented that there were far too many so his effort certainly wouldn't make any difference. The boy thought for minute, smiled, and replied “maybe, but it sure made a difference to that one!” He was being a good steward. (By the way, you have probably caught on to the fact that this story is not just about helping starfish). We are the stewards of God's creation. When we think of Stewardship it is good to take a broader view. In following Christ's teachings, our gifts of time, talent and treasure can and absolutely do make a difference. We may sometimes look at giving as a burden, but if we think beyond the perceived cost to ourselves to the positive impact that our generosity may have on others, it becomes a joy! “Everyone should give whatever they have decided in their heart. They shouldn't give with hesitation or because of pressure. God loves a cheerful giver. God has the power to provide you with more than enough of every kind of grace. That way, you will have everything to provide more than enough for every kind of good work.” (2 Corinthians 9:7-8)

### CHILDREN IN WORSHIP

Beginning on Palm Sunday, the church nursery will be available to parents who need to take their young children out of the sanctuary during worship, or who need a place for a quick diaper change or a rock in the rocking chair. However, due to ongoing concerns with the Covid pandemic, we will not be staffing the nursery at this time. Parents cannot leave their children in the nursery unsupervised, and must stay with their children at all times. We will make sure the nursery is cleaned and supplied each week.

Children of all ages are always welcome in the sanctuary during worship as part of our faith family. We provide a weekly packet of children's coloring sheets and activities and crayons, and parents can bring along any toys or books for their children to use during worship as well.

As Covid conditions improve, we are hoping to have more options available for children to be active in the worship service each week, as well as different choices of activities for them. Stay tuned as we move forward faithfully and healthfully!

They had been doing so well with their monthly checks but the disease reared its ugly head and managed to get into the shelter.
