Dear All,

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

Over the past several weeks we have been digging into the stories of Abraham, Sarah, Hagar, Ishmael, Isaac, Rebekah, Esau, Jacob, and Rachel. I never cease to be amazed by how the lives of people thousands upon thousands of years ago ring with so much resonance to our lives today. We humans are remarkable in our consistency! We mess up. We hurt each other. We wallow in guilt. We run away when we don't want to take responsibility for our actions. We worry. We fear. We love. We serve each other. We have incredible resilience. We do miraculous things when working together. We are creative. We survive. In short, we are complicated creatures navigating a complicated world. And things are getting more and more complicated by the day! When I look back at Abraham's big, messy family, though, I see one thing shining through with simple clarity: God's love. God was there for every single member of that family—when they were at their worst, when they were at their most vulnerable, when they were fighting for survival, and when they were at their best. God loved all of them in their complexities. God loved the world in which they lived in all of its complexities. That truth continues to shine today with its simple clarity. God loves all of us in our complexities. God loves the world in which we live in all of its complexities.

It is difficult to understand much of anything right now. A dense fog of uncertainty has settled in, much like the oppressive humidity that has closed in on us this summer. It is easy to get disoriented and lost in this fog, just as the members of Abraham's family seemed so lost so often.

All we have to do is open our eyes to see its brilliance and free our skin to feel its warmth. Look for the light of God's love and feel its warmth. With so much going on around us and within us, these simple things are the most significant things we can do.

Over the past month, I have seen the light and felt the warmth of God's love most strongly in the beautiful family of FPCH! Family members have fed the hungry with "Sackurday" meals and dinners prepared for the shelter. Family members have delivered kitchen supplies to newly housed individuals who have been without housing for years. The Session of FPCH met on July 6th.

We voted to OPEN the church for worship on July 12th with an outdoor service and will have outdoor services whenever weather permits. We are asking you to bring your own masks and chairs. You are also invited to bring a copy of the bulletin with you if you do not want to use the copies we make. If weather does not permit outdoor worship, then we will worship indoors following the protocols set up by the task force on reopening. Virtual and mailed worship options will be maintained.

We voted to allow meetings to be held in the church building, with the provision that the groups follow the guidelines that have been set up for building usage. They are to wear masks, maintain physical distance, and avoid having food products.

We are requesting a grant from the Endowment Fund for \$ 567.03 for our share of the Technology Grant we recently received.

We are reinstating Communion as of our August 2nd worship. This will not be a traditional passing of the elements but will be set up to maximize health.

Barb Dye's Memorial Service for July 18th was postponed until a yet-to-be-determined date.

Remember, to keep OUR church functioning we still need to keep up our pledges.
