Dear All,

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

We find ourselves in the season of Advent, the holy observance of expectant hope. During this time, we await the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God and Mary, the Word made flesh. In the beautiful mystery of our faith, we at once await the celebration of the birth of Jesus of Nazareth *and* the second coming of Jesus our King in glory. And so we expectantly hope for a beginning and an end and then a new beginning. This holy observance of expectant hope strikes me as especially significant in the world of right now! In such a difficult season in the history of the world, I imagine that many of us are longing for an end to suffering and a new beginning—not a return to "normal," but a brand new thing.

Perhaps the most important lesson we can learn from Advent, though, is that there is this season of waiting before the new beginning. And that season of waiting is not always an easy one! For some it is filled with grief and loneliness. For others it is filled with worry and anxiety. For yet others it is filled with disquietude and uncertainty. All of these feelings seem perfectly understandable to me given all that we are coping with in the here and now of 2020! And yet, the mystery of the season of Advent reminds us that these challenging feelings can be held along with and in tension with HOPE! In the fullness of time, Jesus was born to Mary, and in the fullness of time, Jesus will come back!

I recognize that the extraordinary difficulties of life right now are compounded by our need to suspend in-person worship and other gatherings at the church building. Although it is necessary to do so for our collective health, a consequence is that we find ourselves once again observing one of our holiest seasons physically apart from each other. Therefore, I urge all of you to be extra intentional about reaching out to God and to each other. I urge you to create designated times and spaces for prayer and reflection. I urge you to make use of materials sent out or posted by the church. I urge you to dive into the Word like never before. I urge you to join us for virtual studies and virtual fellowship. And I urge you to tune in at 10:30 every Sunday morning and at 7:00 PM Christmas Eve on your computers, phones, or mailed paper. Oh, and as often as you can, sing in the safety of your own homes! Sing the Advent songs you find most meaningful! Sing the Christmas carols that give you the most life! These are the ways that we can practice spiritual togetherness with each other and with God, and so these are the ways that we can keep our hope in this difficult time of waiting!

I close with words from one of those meaningful Advent songs: "O come, Thou Dayspring, from on high, and cheer us by Thy drawing nigh. Disperse the gloomy clouds of night, and death's dark shadows put to flight. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel Shall come to thee, O Israel!"

- "An Illustrated Advent Wreath" Instructions and the pieces needed to create a paper Advent wreath complete with 3D paper candles. The pieces of the wreath can be colored in or left black and white, and there are prayers to go along with each of the 5 candles during Advent.

Girl Scout troop 35641 in Lowell was looking for a way to work toward achieving a community service badge and decided to put together bags of food for those in need. The girls collected canned goods and then divided the bags among themselves for distribution to individuals and agencies that could put them to good use. Delaney Toren (daughter of Jake and Sam) chose to give her 3 bags of canned goods to FPCH's food pantry. They were delivered to us on 11/14/20. Additionally, the troop leaders contacted FPCH to see if they could participate in the Salvation Army Bell ringing. Covid restrictions are making that difficult, but FPCH's light is "shining bright" in Lowell, and the Ministry of Mission commends the Lowell troop leaders for instilling these examples of generosity in their scouts.






In mid-August we were serving 72 lunches each week. We increased the amount made during September and October to 100 lunches. Then on Oct. 31 we sacrificed the 7 sandwiches we planned on delivering to congregation members and neighbors. Rev. Tyler helped fill 7 more bags when we saw we would be short. We gave away 107 lunches and still turned away cars. The last car asked for more than we had, as we only had one to give. Behind that car were other cars and a man on a bicycle who visits occasionally. The cars pulled out of line when they saw we were out and the man on the bike just rode past. As we sadly watched as they were leaving after a long wait (the line starts to form around 11:15 and 11;30 and sometimes earlier), we saw the last car to receive a lunch, though short of their request, stop and flag the man on the bike to approach. We saw the last lunch handed to the man on the bike. We witness the hands, heart and feet of Jesus every Sackurday!

Krissy and I decided we needed a plan to avoid this deflating experience again, as this was not the first time we ran short. We also need to be good stewards by avoiding waste. So, on November 1st we decided we would make 120 sandwiches and prepare 100 sacks. We would use the extra if we needed by quickly putting together more bags, or by freezing the sandwiches to be the first used the following week. For the last two weeks we have not run out; we have handed out 120 lunches each week. Donations continue to be greatly appreciated as our needs are growing. We are now providing 3x the lunches from when we started on the last Saturday of March 2020.

This week we were gifted with decorated lunch bags. Veronica LaPage the art teacher at Lowell High School gave her students the opportunity to share their talent with uplifting messages. They were uplifting and beautiful in appearance and sentiment. See a sampling below.
