

Dear All,

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ! 2020 is already well underway. We have had our first Session meeting with our new class. We have had our annual meeting. We have had an intergenerational meal and a youth campout. We have had Sunday school classes and worship services. We have served meals and supported mission partners. We have had Sunday school classes and youth group gatherings. We have worshipped well. It has been a great start! God has clearly been present with us, as is always the case.

One of the things I have been most excited about so far is the increased participation and leadership of our young disciples in worship. As God's timing would have it, our young disciples' increased involvement parallels our current cycle of Gospel readings about the early movements and ministry of Jesus and the first disciples. If you yourself or somebody in your family would likewise like to become more involved in worship leadership by being a liturgist, reading scripture, leading the children's sermon, serving communion, or ushering, please do let me or one of our Worship and Music Ministry members know!

We will continue to journey through the life and public ministry of Jesus as we move through February, culminating in the beginning of Lent on Ash Wednesday, February 26. We Christians are often tempted to focus most on the bookends of Jesus' life—his birth, death, and resurrection. While these events are indeed worthy of our intense attention and devotion, I encourage us to apply the same attention and devotion to Jesus' life and public ministry. I encourage us to dig into the things he did and said as he moved throughout Galilee and made his way ultimately to Jerusalem. I encourage us to pay attention to the people he spent time with and spoke with. I encourage us to gaze upon his miracles with awe and to explore the deep significance behind them. I encourage us to get to know the context of the land, the people, the cultural norms, and the time period that formed his context. For, all of this forms the basis of our ethics as Christians, the example of how we are to live and move and breathe as faithful disciples.

Starting the first Sunday in February we will be diving into Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, largely thought of as the magnum opus of his teaching and preaching. Join me in taking the time to take his words to heart and thus to make them the center of how we go about our lives. "You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid. No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven" (*Matthew* 5:14-16).

John Toren, Jesse Casiano, Tyler Orem and Eason Engle met with Tom Kuhn, President, CSK Architects, P.C. We asked Tom to provide a proposal to conduct a feasibility study for inclusion with the request for a Smock Foundation Grant. We plan to apply for a grant to initially develop a feasibility study and secondly to improve handicap access to the north and center buildings along with improving access to the washrooms. The plan is to submit the request to Presbytery for the Foundation's late February 2020 meeting. Tom is placing most building prints on a CD for convenient reference.

The Session meeting room was painted by a group of talented individuals on January 17, 2020. The carpet and chairs were also steam cleaned. Thanks go to Cathy and Ron Toren, John Toren, Dennis O'Donnell, Winnie Owen, Jeff Savage, Jesse Casiano and Jesse Kikkert. A special thank you goes to Hilary Kikkert who volunteered Jesse. We are now seeking appropriate art work for the room.

Springtime is just around the corner and it'll be time to work the garden and refurbish the brick pathway. We ask all members to purchase brick(s) to help fund the rebuilding of the pathway-see Sharon LaFlech to purchase a brick. We also need volunteers able to do gardening work on Monday mornings-see Cheryl Steen for details.

A local contractor repaired a boiler pump on January 19, 2020. A coupling broke shutting down heat to the south building but all is good now.

Jeff Savage is changing electrical switches in the kitchen area and installing new door hardware on several doors in the center building.

After several complaints about cold air in the sanctuary, we inspected the lower and upper area lead glass windows. The unsealed windows do leak but it's most pronounced during windy conditions. The windows are in need of replacing the glazing and the frames need to be painted. This issue is under review.

Tracy Oprea is serving as coordinator for kitchen issues and kitchen oversight. Tracy will contact the Trustees when repairs are necessary and assure the kitchen facilities in the Fellowship Hall and the Session Room are cleaned and organized.


Feb. 16, 2020 – Lunch and a meeting in the Youth Room from noon to 2 pm.

Read-A-Long and Book Discussion



Our church is having a read-a-long this winter. The book is "The God Who Sees: Immigrants, the Bible, and the Journey to Belong" by Karen Gonzalez. Here is a summary from the Presbyterian Outlook:

In "The God Who Sees," Karen Gonzalez reminds us that "immigrant stories always matter, because immigrants are image-bearers of God." In this book the reader will encounter stories, not policy — but those stories will challenge the way we think about immigrants and immigration. Throughout the book Gonzalez takes on the challenges of biblical exposition, autobiography and advocacy. Gonzalez invites the reader to step into the stories of several biblical immigrants: Naomi and Ruth, Abraham, Hagar, Joseph, the Syrophoenician Woman and the Holy Family. Examining the challenges faced by these immigrants, she uses their stories to encourage the reader to think about the unique circumstances immigrants face.

The church has 6 copies of the book to lend out. They are available to check out in the classroom across the hall from the church office. Please sign the check-out sheet when you take a book and sign it back in when you are finished, so more people may enjoy the book.

On Sunday, March 8 at 4 pm, there will be a book discussion at the church for all who would like to attend. We will discuss our impressions of the book, talk about questions we have about the stories, and have a thoughtful time of engagement about immigration in today's world. Children of all ages are welcome, and we will have kid-friendly books and activities for them. This event is open to the public, so please share this opportunity with your friends and neighbors.





Isn't This the Fast I Choose?
2020 Lenten Study and Practice

On five Wednesday mornings throughout Lent, Pastor Tyler will again be leading a series of devotional study and spiritual practice. This year we will be focusing on the spiritual practice of fasting, which many Christian traditions regard as the heart of the Lenten liturgical season. The framework of this season comes from Jesus' fast in the desert for forty days and forty nights prior to being encountered by the Satan. We will be exploring various understandings of this spiritual practice by looking through the lens of major moments of fasting in our scriptures, including readings from *Matthew*, *Esther*, *Daniel*, *Jonah*, and *Isaiah*. We will also be exploring how we ourselves can view and implement fasting as a spiritual practice. We will be gathering in the fellowship hall at 9:30 AM on Wednesdays March 4, March 11, March 18, March 25, and April 1. ALL ARE WELCOME!

This time we had a student from Grimmer School come and join us for the cooking and serving. Her name was Mia and she seemed to enjoy the experience. She was in charge of dessert. Her mother Michelle joined us along with her grandmother who wants to come back for another Saturday. I certainly will be taking her up on that offer!

We had the usual cooks, Judy Toren, Jamie Ham and I. We added the Engles to help serve with Jamie, Mia and myself.



2019 Salvation Army Bell Ringing Campaign

2019 was FPCH's 31st year of assisting the Salvation Army in their annual Red Kettle Campaign. For five weeks, Wednesday through Friday, our hardy ringers staffed the kettle at the south door of Strack's. Again this year we rang from 10:00am to 6:00pm and although we had fewer ringers, our spirit was stronger than ever. Over 2/3rds of our ringers rang for multiple shifts which enabled us to easily fulfil our promise to the Salvation Army and to truly be the "heart, hands and feet of Jesus Christ". The Salvation Army Red Kettle Campaign director advised that no other corporate or service organizations in the entire county provided more volunteer effort for this Campaign than the Highland Kiwanis Club and the First Presbyterian Church of Highland. Although this year's calendar resulted in our ringing only 112 hours, FPCH's dedicated ringers still collected \$ 4579.13. Records for the past 16 years show that our ringers have collected a remarkable total of \$86,475.78 for the good work of the Salvation Army. Keep in mind, that that does not include the collections for the prior 15 years under George Griner's project leadership. So, to every ringer who volunteered their time this year, and throughout the years to help those in need, the Ministry of Mission, the Salvation Army, George Griner and I offer a sincere "Well Done!" and a heartfelt "Thank You!"

It's not an extremely large box, but is stocked with blessings. It sits on the south side of the old sanctuary where it is accessible from the parking spaces.

These are some of the items most commonly donated and used to stock the Blessing Boxes:


- Canned food with ring-pulls
