

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Dear All,

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ! This is a new day, a new month, a new year, a new decade! A blessed aspect of our faith is the good news that we have new life every moment of every day. Ours is a faith of renewal—of grace and forgiveness and resurrection. Many people would probably be surprised to hear that we Presbyterians have a rich history of revival in our tradition, with Presbyterian minister Charles Grandison Finney named the "Father of Modern Revivalism" for his major role in the Second Great Awakening. I encourage you to research him!

"Revival" comes from the Latin *vivere*, to live. It means living again or living anew. I pray that the Church of Jesus Christ focuses on revival this year and decade! Our world is in desperate need of the good news of the love of God, the good news of new life, the good news of resurrection. We Presbyterians are often wary of words like "evangelism" and "revival" because of their association with historical and contemporary movements within Christendom that we may not agree with. Beloved ones, it is time for us to do some reclaiming!

Charles Grandison Finney led revivals based on seeking pure love of God and pure love of other people. He lived revival in his life through his activism for the abolition of slavery, promotion of the Underground Railroad, and advocacy for the equality of women in the 1800s. Let us also be evangelists and revivalists! Let us boldly love our God. Let us boldly love others. Let us boldly give new life to the world by seeking to create a just society on the principles of the Kingdom of Jesus, God's beloved. Let us commit to these things in this new season.

This month we are learning about the baptism of Jesus, when God claimed him as the Son, the beloved. The Holy Spirit descended as a dove and alighted upon him. This was the beginning of his public ministry—the period of his proclaiming, teaching, miracle working, healing, exorcising, meal sharing, table flipping, hierarchy shattering, world changing activities that we know so much about. These are the ways that Jesus evange-lized and revived. These are the ways that Jesus brought good news to the poor, proclaimed release for the imprisoned, recovered sight for the blind, and let the oppressed go free.

Evangelism. Revival. Spreading love. Giving new life. Let's do this!

- Trustee President Eason Engle reported on projects that are in the works: a new elevator door has been ordered, the window on the north side of the south building has been replaced, and painting of the meeting room and stairway will begin in January.
- Session approved a request from Trustees to send a letter to the Smock Foundation Grant investigating possibilities to improve accessibility to the different levels of the church building.
- Treasurer Vince Catania presented the proposed deficit budget for 2020 and Session approved it, with plans to update the income portion as more pledges are received through mid-January.
- Session voted to fund the new Faith Development position (Family and Children Program Coordinator) through a distribution from Vanguard fund in 2020.
- Session thanked Vince Catania for his detailed work and explanation of the budget and the current state of our finances.
- Elder Peter Churitch presented the newly revised church brochure available to visitors and also in the narthex. Session commended the Hospitality Ministry for their work on this.
- Elder Charlotte Abernethy reported on upcoming Faith Development activities: December 22nd Cookie Bake and Caroling, January 18th Quirky Quarters:
- Intergenerational Winter Campout meal and activities at 4pm followed by a youth overnight, and March 8th Book discussion with possible speaker open to all.
- Clerk Jean Smith presented an update to the church rolls, which Session approved.
- Rev. Orem thanked those who are rotating off of Session this year: Peter Churitch, Jean Smith and Cheryl Steen. He also thanked Charlotte Abernethy who will be returning on Session.

Read-A-Long and Book Discussion

Our church is having a read-a-long during the first few months of this year. The book is "The God Who Sees: Immigrants, the Bible, and the Journey to Belong" by Karen Gonzalez. Here is a summary from the Presbyterian Outlook:

In "The God Who Sees," Karen Gonzalez reminds us that "immigrant stories always matter, because immigrants are image-bearers of God." In this book the reader will encounter stories, not policy — but those stories will challenge the way we think about immigrants and immigration. Throughout the book Gonzalez takes on the challenges of biblical exposition, autobiography and advocacy. Gonzalez invites the reader to step into the stories of several biblical immigrants: Naomi and Ruth, Abraham, Hagar,

Joseph, the Syrophoenician Woman and the Holy Family. Examining the challenges faced by these immigrants, she uses their stories to encourage the reader to think about the unique circumstances immigrants face.

You're encouraged to start reading the book as soon as you can. If you cannot get a copy of your own to read, the church has 6 copies of the book to lend out. They are available to check out in the classroom across the hall from the church office. Please sign the check-out sheet when you take a book, and sign it back in when you are finished so more people may enjoy the book.

On Sunday, March 8 at 4 pm, there will be a book discussion for all who would like to attend here at the church. We will discuss our impressions of the book, talk about questions we have about the stories, and have a thoughtful time of engagement about immigration in today's world. For any children that attend, we will have kid-friendly books and activities for them. Please share this opportunity with your friends and neighbors, as we would love to have the community involved.


