## Youth Connections

### Too Many Cooks... Makes for a Fun Afternoon!

On Dec. 12, 2020, 7 of our youth and friends joined Cheryl Steen and her faithful kitchen crew to help prepare a meal for the Hammond homeless shelter. Each adult was paired with one or two youth, and they worked on their part of the meal. By the end, the youth had helped clean, season and stuff chickens; chop fruit and veggies; make cake; add bacon to beans; put sandwiches together; and fill up boxes for grab-and-go lunches. At a previous gathering, the youth had put together treat bags and decorated Christmas cards that were delivered to the shelter with the meals they helped cook. The youth also helped put away 3 totes worth of donated food from local Girl Scouts so we now have a well-stocked food pantry. The youth said they enjoyed working in the kitchen and would like to do it again in the future, and it looked like the adults all had a good time as well.

### **RESOURCES FOR YOU**

Did you know our church has a library? It may not look fancy, and you don't need a library card to use it. Our church library is located in the room across the hall from the Church Office. If you are interested in borrowing anything from the library, you can come into the church during regular office hours, Monday-Thursday from 8 - 11 am. You can also contact Heather Casiano for a porch drop-off of materials if you can't make it into the church building.

Each month, we'll be highlighting one resource. This month the focus is Audio Bibles. Audio Bibles are great for those who are having trouble reading the smaller print of many Bibles, and for those who would like to hear the Word perhaps while doing other activities at the same time. The long, cold days of staying inside might be a nice time to listen to God's Word.

Our church library has two different types of audio Bibles available: the New Testament on CD and the entire Bible on cassette tape.

The New Testament on CD is a collection of 18 CDs, which can be checked out separately. They are read in a male voice from the King James version. The CDs can be played on any device that is compatible with standard audio CDs.

For any of you who may still have a functional cassette tape player, our library has the entire Bible – Old and New Testaments – available for check out on cassette tape. There are four volumes of twelve tapes each, read from the New International Version.



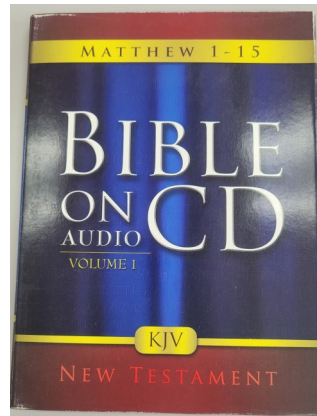
There is a sign out sheet on the table in the Library at the church to fill out each time you borrow an item. Returned items can be put back on the shelf or left on the table in the center of the room.

If CD or cassette audio Bibles don't appeal to you, there are audio Bible options online as well for smart phones, tablets or computers. Here are a few free options:

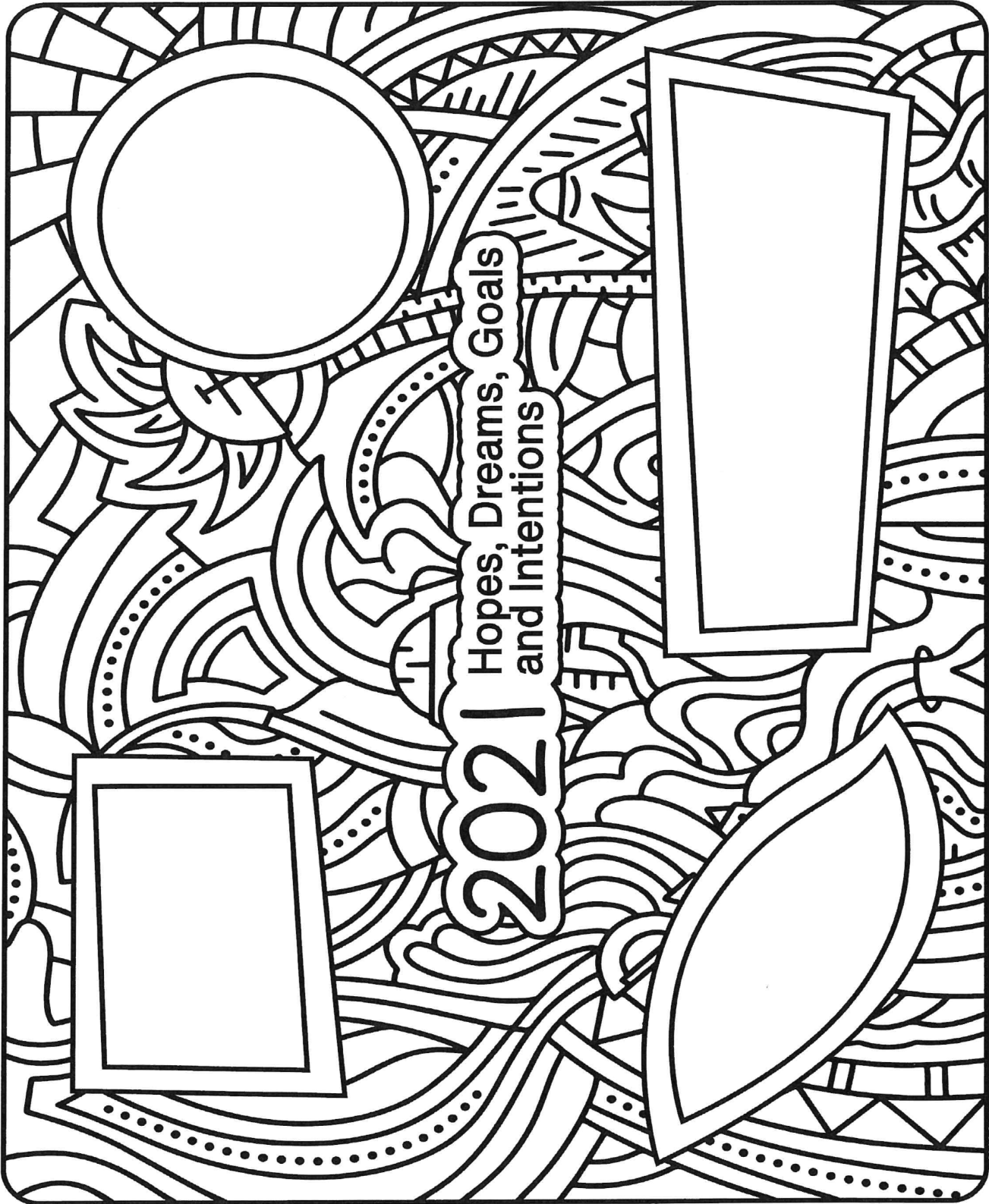


## **LENT DEVOTIONAL**

### December Shelter Report

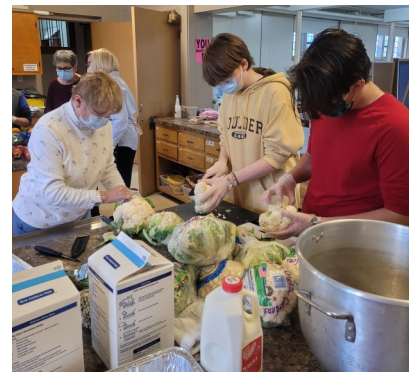

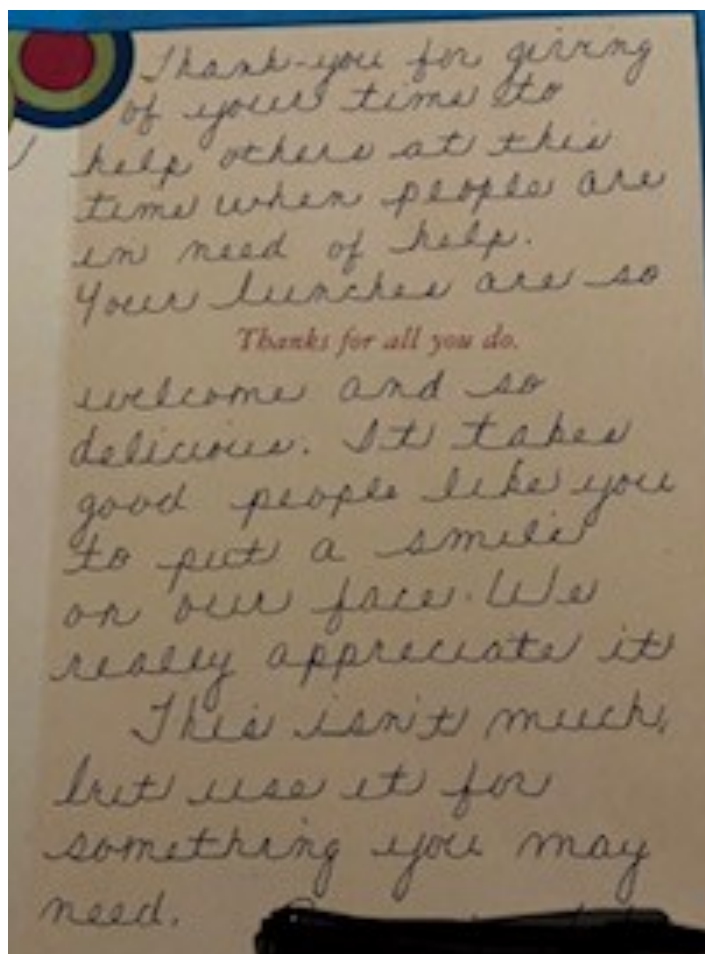
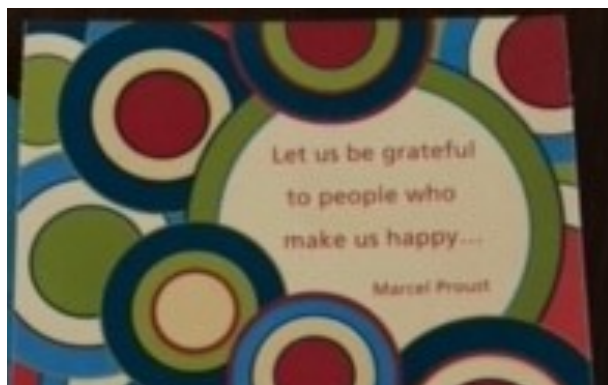
