Dear All,

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

On recent Sunday afternoons I have been spending some time in our church's garden. Its beauty and peacefulness are testaments to God's masterful work and to the ongoing dedication of our garden people--in short to the constant partnership between God and humans in the dance of creation. God creates, and we take care of that creation. The garden inspires me to worship and to fulfill my part in taking care of God's creation with the gifts God has given me (unfortunately not including a green thumb). By the way, we are always looking for more garden people if you would like to join! As we approach our planned reopening on July 12, we are considering the possibility of worshiping outside near that very garden or in another space on the church's grounds. Public health guidelines indcate that gathering outside is much safer than doing so inside. If weather prohibits outdoor worship, then we will have extensive measures in place to make sure that our sanctuary is as safe as possible for worship. We have all been experiencing a lot of change and uncertainty over the past several months. My prayer is that the results have been and will continue to be personal and communal transformation as well as increased faith. I certainly have hope in the transformation of our society and of the Church. Faithful people have taken to the streets to proclaim the truth that Black lives matter and to dismantle our national sin of white supremacy with power and grace. Faithful people have created policy platforms, organized at grassroots levels, and built new coalitions to build up something more akin to the Kingdom of God for which we strive. Our denomination has elected an Indigenous American woman (Elona Street-Stewart) and Black American man (Gregory Bentley) as the co-moderators of our 224th General Assembly. There are so many reasons for us to continue to have hope!

I myself have been experiencing change and uncertainty as well. I recently discerned that it was time for me to resign my position as a mental health therapist in the shelter I have been working at in Chicago. The environment changed drastically with the pandemic, and there was a sharp drop in the number of children being served. I was sitting in an empty office rather than putting my gifts to use, so I decided that the time had come. My plan is to take a bit of time to recuperate and discern what is next in my bi-vocational life. I ask for your prayers in this discernment season. I will certainly keep you updated.

Remember, we can do all things through Christ who strengthens us!

- Session extended our opening date to July 12, 2020. We have asked our Deacons to call their clusters. We have listened to the concerns of the congregation about when they would feel safe in returning to Worship.
- Masks and spacing have become part of our normal lifestyles, as have washing hands and avoiding large confined places. We will make these things part of the church's lifestyle during this pandemic as well. We will explore the possibility of worshiping outside as weather permits. If weather does not permit, then we will follow strict mitigation measures inside. We will be providing hand sanitizer and requiring those attending worship to wear their masks. We ask that you bring your own masks. We also ask that you donate cleaning wipes and other sanitation supplies.
