Dear All,

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

We have just celebrated the day of Pentecost, sometimes called the birthday of the Church. As I said in this past Sunday's sermon, we can also think of it as the Church's adoption (gotcha!) day or baptism. This is a fruitful time to reflect upon and reimagine what the Church can be. Perhaps we can think of it as a re-birthday. In this rebirth, we are learning that we are not contained by buildings, that we can be creative and imaginative in how we worship, that we have the Holy Spirit wherever we may be, that the Church is bigger and more diverse than we could ever imagine, and that we are utterly dependent upon each other in community. Just as birth is a painful, beautiful process, so is this rebirth! I pray that all of us can continue to reflect and reimagine, to make the Church that is rebirthed at the end of this pandemic a Church that is wiser, more welcoming, more creative, more expansive, and more loving.

The most exciting part of the day of Pentecost was the way in which the Holy Spirit blew upon all who were gathered, fulfilling Jesus' promise that we would not be left alone. That same dynamic, life-giving Spirit is still with us today. As we feel the fears and anxieties permeating our world, may we reach out to the Holy Spirit and receive her comfort and power. May we embrace her while we cannot embrace others physically. Our Session is certainly seeking the Wisdom of the Holy Spirit as we continue to monitor the situation of pandemic in our community. At our most recent virtual meeting we decided to develop a plan for reopening on Sunday, June 14. A task force was convened to make sure proper preventative measures are implemented prior to reopening and proper mitigation measures upon reopening. As has been the case throughout this season, though, our plans are subject to change if trends in the community indicate that we need to do so for the continued health of everyone in our congregation.

No matter what happens, we will be the Church in its current process of rebirth. We will be wise, welcoming, creative, expansive, and loving! We will worship God in exciting and authentic ways! As part of our worship, we will again be celebrating Communion virtually on June 7. For that Sunday, please have your elements ready. You can use bread, crackers, tortillas, or any grain-based food. You can use juice, wine, or any beverage of your choice. You can partake with fellow residents of your home, or you can partake spiritually connected to the entirety of this big, diverse, global family we call the Church.

Remember Peter's repetition of Joel's words and be empowered: "In the last days, God says, I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your young will see visions, your old will dream dreams" (*Acts* 2:17).

<u> April Shelter Report</u>

As we continue to follow the rules regarding the Coronavirus, it becomes a challenge to feed those that are in need. I have been VERY fortunate that the other two of the three Musketeers have been willing to mask and glove up in the hot kitchen and continue to support this mission with me.

This month, we also gained two nurses I used to work with, Sandy Higgins and Marie Krynicky. They had helped in the past and this time, Sandy even brought her sister Sherry. They have volunteered to come back again in May and we will certainly welcome them with open arms. They even brought their own masks and gloves!!

We have to continue to prepare the food and then just deliver it to the shelter since we don't want to take anything in to the residents. We did have a bit of good news from them. They all had been tested for the virus and all were NEGATIVE! That is quite a feet with 40 men living in such close proximity.

We also have made at least 18 box lunches for the nonresidents that we usually feed and leave those on a table outside the shelter for them to come by and pick-up after we leave.

Since we have to go before they come, I can only hope and pray that we are leaving enough food for them.







CALLING ALL GARDENERS!

Ministry of Mission will once again be selling flower vouchers to be used at Zandstra's Greenhouse. The cost will be \$15.00 per voucher.

In order to make this program work in light of Covid 19 restrictions there are new rules to follow.

- 1. Call Tracy, Cheryl or me and we will arrange a non-contact switch: you put your check or money in an envelope and leave outside your door, one of us will pick up at a prearranged time and leave the vouchers in your envelope.
- 2. Call Zandstra's at 924-1095 and make an appointment for a 45 minute shopping time. This limits the number of people inside the greenhouse and will allow everyone to maintain the 6 foot distancing while shopping. You can also schedule a shopping time on their website.
- 3. Or alternately, you can go to their website to view which plants and flowers they have and call in your order to be picked up at a designated time at curbside.
- 4. Turn in your voucher at the end of your shopping trip or pickup and our church will receive credit for your purchase.

This program has been a very useful tool to start spring off right in past years and with the stay-at-home order this year, will give everyone a chance to beautify your environment to make that stay more pleasant.
