- -Session again discussed pandemic protocols and mitigation measures. We made the following decisions:
 - •We will continue to use social distancing and ventilating the sanctuary and fellowship hall.
 - •Session gave approval for choir to meet sometime in the fall and begin practices which should occur in the sanctuary where there is more space. The final decision will be up to Suzanne Gruoner who will see what the interest and comfort level may be for choir members.
 - °Fellowship time after worship can continue in the fellowship hall with light (wrapped) snacks and beverages. The fellowship ministry is encouraged to seek help with the serving and clean-up from other members of the congregation.
- -We celebrated the success of the parking lot fundraiser where over \$1800 was raised. Thanks to all who helped!
- -The ministry of mission reported on a donation that was given to Chimwemwe Presbyterian Church in Zambia which is experiencing COVID. Members were also encouraged to write letters of support and encouragement to the people there.
- -NOTE THE DATE AND TIME: Session approved a virtual service for August 8th at 9:00 AM. Rev. Orem, Heather Casiano and the youth will be doing mission work from August 5-8th in Decatur, Michigan and will be staying to participate in the worship service on Sunday which will be streamed. Watch your email for more information.
- -Communion was moved from September 5th to September 12th, as we will be participating in an outdoor ecumenical service in the park on the 5th.
- -Session directed the Trustees to seek bids on the purchase of a digital soundboard that would be more compatible with our new streaming equipment. This should improve the sound for our live streaming.
- -Our fundraiser of GotSneakers is underway. Bring your used, gently used and new sneakers (Athletic shoes only please. No dress shoes, sandals, etc) and put in the blue bins provided. These shoes will help us raise funds at the same time as saving the landfills. Be sure to ask your other family members, friends and neighbors also.
- -We will be having a new fundraiser at Culver's on a Sunday in the near future. A portion of every meal sold between 3 8 pm will go to the church, provided our church is mentioned by name. THE DATE WILL BE DETERMINED SOON. Watch for the announcement.

Quiet Generosity—John Toren

On a recent shopping trip our car's onboard computer stopped the engine at a light, and we couldn't restart it. We were blocking the middle of three lanes at a busy tee intersection. By the honks and hand gestures, it became apparent that those behind us were not very sympathetic except for one. A man in a white van came to the window and offered to help. I told him that we had called the dealership for service but couldn't get through. He was unsuccessful in restarting the car but suggested that we call our salesperson. I thanked him, followed his advice and ultimately was connected to roadside assistance. The wait for assistance was estimated to be long—not good in a potentially hazardous situation! A few minutes later another car pulled up behind us; I assumed the driver had not seen our blinkers, so I got out to direct him around. To my surprise, it was a salesman (not ours) from the dealership. Roadside assistance must have called the dealership. He tried multiple tactics and ultimately got the car running again. We were beyond grateful. The next day, I made a trip to the dealership to thank him again for demonstrating the ultimate in kindness and customer service. We discussed possible reasons for the engine stoppage. As I was leaving, I told him I sure was glad roadside assistance had called him. He said, "They didn't...... a guy in a white van came in and said one of our customers was in trouble and gave me your location. I had no customer at the time, so I checked out a loaner to see if I could help." Two instances of quiet generosity. Two instances of opportunities taken that could have easiignored or overlooked. We never know the full impact of our ly been generous, stretch yourself, make that extra effort, share actions, so be your time, talent and treasure. It may be more important than you can ever know. Like the starfish in the first of this series of articles, "It certainly was to 115"!

- Training volunteers to do our live-streaming (Thanks to Robbie Casiano, Peter Churitch, Jamie Ham, Tracy Oprea, Jeffery Savage, and Jean Smith for taking on this challenge.)
- Establishing a new free network in the Fellowship Hall called FPCH Fellowship in addition to FPCH Guest, both of which do not require a password.
- Reworking the video and sound projection in the Fellowship Hall. We can now connect a computer, a DVD player, or go directly to YouTube and the internet using a ROKU.
- Advertising events through the Chamber of Commerce as well as Facebook, Instagram and YouTube.
- Helping connect others with our ministries and programs through the purchase of a Zoom subscription.

We welcome others to join us and bring new ideas and enthusiasm!



KIDS' CONNECTIONS

The Faith Development team has been busy this summer creating some new curriculum for elementary-aged children. Starting September 12, we will have "Kids' Kits" available for families and children to use in two different ways:

- 1. Families can check out a kit to use at home on their own schedule. Most needed materials and supplies are included in the kit. When families are finished, the instructions and remaining parts of the kit not used should be returned to the church.
- 2. If there is enough interest, we can have a kids' class on Sunday mornings at 9 am, using the Kids' Kits materials. Contact Heather Casiano (hcasiano@fpchighland.org) if you're interested in having your children be part of a Sunday morning class.

Each kit focuses on Bible stories about one topic, such as Trees, Birds or Water. There will be 3 Bible stories for the topic, an opening activity, some discussion questions, a craft or game, a song, and an ending prayer. New kits with new topics will be added throughout the year. More details about the checkout process will be available in September.

OUR NEW PRAYGROUND

If you've been in the sanctuary in the last month or so, you may have noticed a change as you enter for worship. A new space that we're calling "The Prayground" has been created that is more welcoming and inclusive of our youngest disciples and of worshipers who use wheelchairs or other mobility devices. When we preach that everyone should have a place at the table, we want to mean it! We invite families with young children to use this area in the back of the sanctuary (opposite the sound booth), as well as those needing a little more space because of a wheelchair, walker, or other needs.

We also ask that everyone please respect and honor this space for those whom it was designed. If you don't have small children with you or don't need a bigger space for mobility needs, please leave the Prayground open for those who do. We want everyone to feel they have a space when then enter the sanctuary to worship.





From August 5-8, our youth will be participating in a Mission Trip. Along with Pastor Tyler and Heather Casiano, the youth will travel to Decatur, Michigan, to partner with the youth group of First Presbyterian Church there for 3 days of service, fun and worship. The main project will be helping build a shed for the Decatur Family Shelter.

As part of this trip, our youth will be participating in the worship service on August 8 at First Presbyterian Church in Decatur. There will be a <u>fully online service for our church on August 8th at 9:00 AM.</u> We will be worshiping fully online so that we can join our youth. Have your communion elements ready at home that day as well. This will be a great Spirit-filled and connectional way to make use of the worship resources we have gained over the past year and a half.

Please keep our youth and adult chaperones in prayer during the mission trip. Pictures and stories will be shared after we've returned!



The Adult Connections class taught by John Toren and Bonnie Perryman, "The Bible in Today's World", will begin meeting on Sunday, Sept. 12, at 9 am. The exact topic of study will be determined by those who participate in the class, so come on Sept. 12 to help choose the book or study you'd like to see.

The Faith Development team is also looking at the possibility of holding a second adult class on Sunday mornings if there is enough interest. If you'd like to lead or attend a second class, please contact Heather Casiano. We have topics and books we can suggest, but we are especially interested in hearing what you want to learn and talk about. A new class can start at any time – we just need people interested in participating.




SUMMER READ-A-LONG WITH PRESBYTERY OF WABASH VALLEY
