This month the *Matthew* 25 spotlight is shining upon our Trustees! The Board of Trustees ensured that we have a group of people able to perform lifesaving CPR and use the AEDs. This is vital for our ability to welcome all and provide a safe space for each other. Thank you, Trustees and all those who were trained, for contributing to our shared congregational vitality! Well done!

As a reminder, this section of the Larger View is here to highlight our embodiment of the *Matthew* 25 initiative to which we have committed. This initiative is focused on the following:

- Building congregational vitality by challenging people and congregations to deepen their faith and get actively and joyfully engaged with their community and the world.
- **Dismantling structural racism** by advocating and acting to break down the systems, practices and thinking that underlie discrimination, bias, prejudice and oppression of people of color.
- Eradicating systemic poverty by working to change laws, policies, plans and structures in our society that perpetuate economic exploitation of people who are poor.

If you notice somebody or somebodies living into the *Matthew* 25 call, please let Pastor Tyler know so that they can be highlighted in this section!



- 1. Session approved the relaxing of our previous protocols:
 - a. Based on current CDC guidelines and several weeks of Lake County being in the blue on Indiana's COVID-19 dashboard, we will now transition from mandated masking in shared spaces to allowing people to decide on an individual basis. We will continue to have some masks on hand for worship services.
 - b. We will keep opening windows during worship in order to facilitate good ventilation.
 - c. We will continue with hybrid worship.
 - d. Fellowship after worship can resume and other events can be planned with food being served. The Hospitality ministry will proceed with the details.
- 2. Soup sales will begin again in the fellowship hall after worship! Mark your calendar for April 3rd and enjoy delicious soup for a free will offering. If there is enough interest, there will be another soup sale at the end of the month.
- 3. AED training went very well on Saturday March 12th. Twelve individuals have been recertified for 2 years with CPR and AED training.



- 4. Rev. Orem and Elder Bonnie Perryman gave a report of the Presbytery assembly that met on Saturday February 26th. The Bell Choir and the Chancel Choir provided the music for the Zoom worship service, and Heather Casiano was commissioned for her work at the First Presbyterian Church of Hammond. Congratulations, Heather!
- 5. We continue to investigate fundraisers to support our church and its projects.
- 6. The Trustees are working on contracts for garden and lawn maintenance as well as work on repair work for the brick pathway through the garden.
- 7. Holy week schedule:
 - a. Palm Sunday Worship 4/10
 - b. Maundy Thursday with communion 4/14 at 7:00 pm
 - c. Easter Sunday 4/17

What My Church Means to Me: Happy to Have Made the Right Decision! By George Griner

Pat and I were married 6-10-50. She was a member of the Congregational church. I belonged to St. Paul's Lutheran. We bought a house in the late 50s and moved to Hammond with no decision which church we were going to attend, despite the fact that there was a Methodist church one block away. By now we were in the 1960s with four kids, so we sent our 6 year old to the Methodist Sunday school but never stayed for services. We knew something had to happen before long. Lenten Study and Practice

The annual Lenten Study and Practice series continues on Wednesday evenings through April 13, and takes place online on Zoom starting at 7 pm.

This year's theme is "The Spiritual Practices of Jesus." We are taking a close look at the spiritual practices enacted by Jesus on his journeys to and through Jerusalem, with a particular focus on Jesus's last days before his crucifixion. As we do so, we are also studying some seminal practitioners of those spiritual practices after Jesus's time for the sake of incorporating them into our own journeys of faith. All are welcome! The link to join will be sent out each week. We will try to make slides and recordings available for those who are unable to join.

BYOB (Bring Your Own Bible): Our weekly online-only Bible study is returning on April 20th and 27th, from 7:00-8:00 PM on Zoom. Each week we discuss a different Scripture passage that is not connected to previous weeks, so there is no way to fall behind. Everyone is welcome! BRIDGE BUILDING BOOK EVENT

On **Sunday, May 1st, at 4 pm,** there will be a book discussion event and time of fellowship, hosted by the ministry of Faith Development. We'll be talking about the book, "Be The Bridge: Pursuing God's Heart for Racial Reconciliation", by Latasha Morrison. We'll meet in the fellowship room, and all ages are invited. We encourage everyone to attend, even if you haven't had a chance to read the book prior to the event. We're inviting some community members as well to enrich our conversations.

Here is a summary from the back cover of this New York Times Bestseller: In an era where we seem to be increasingly divided along racial lines, many are hesitant to step into the gap, fearful of saying or doing the wrong thing. But change begins

with an honest conversation among a group of Christians willing to give a voice to unspoken hurts, hidden fears, and mounting tensions... In this perspective-shifting book, Latasha Morrison shows how you can participate in this incredible work and replicate it in your own community. With conviction and grace, she examines the historical complexities of racism. She expertly applies biblical principles, such as lamentation, confession, and forgiveness, to lay the framework for restoration."

EASTER EGGS!


