Dear All,

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

O come, O come, Emmanuel, and ransom captive Israel that mourns in lonely exile here until the Son of God appear. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to you, O Israel. So begins perhaps the best known of all Advent hymns. The haunting tune and weighty words capture the longing of our hearts in this season of expectant hope. We call out for God to be with us, we name the struggles of our current situation, and we rejoice at the coming of the one who is to save us from those struggles. This is such a sacred season for us precisely because it gives us the space to hold all of these things in holy tension—longing, vulnerability, and hope. During this time we intentionally allow the rhythms of our lives to wrap around reflective practices. We reflect backwards upon the Hebrew prophets longing for the coming of the messiah. We reflect backwards upon the vulnerability of a young couple making their way to Bethlehem. We reflect backwards upon a community of people held captive by the Roman empire, full of hope for liberation. AND we reflect forwards with expectation. We reflect upon our own longing for God's embodied intervention in a broken world. We reflect upon the particular vulnerabilities of that broken world. We reflect upon our hope for healing and wholeness that can only come from Christ our King who lives within us and who promised to come back for us.

BY-LAW PROPOSALS

FIRST BY-LAW CHANGE PROPOSAL

4.101 Composition and General Powers

The Pastor and Elders elected by the congregation shall constitute the Session of the Church. A class of three Elders shall be elected annually to serve a term of three years. The powers and duties.....

The Pastor and Ruling Elders elected by the congregation shall constitute the Session of the Church. A class of two Ruling Elders shall be elected annually to serve a term of three years. The powers and duties.....

Elections of offices of Elder, Deacon, Trustee, First Presbyterian Church of Highland Endowment Fund, the Nominating Committee and the Financial Review Committee will take place in November immediately following worship.

Elections of offices of Ruling Elder, Deacon, Trustee, First Presbyterian Church of Highland Endowment Fund, the Nominating Committee and the Financial Review Committee will take place in November or December at a called congregational meeting.


TREE OF WARMTH
