"What the Church Means to Me" - Bonnie Perryman

Instead we're tackling hunger. Everyone can participate in the SOUPER BOWL by donating cans of soup or other non-perishable food items, or by giving a monetary donation. Youth from our church will collect food items and monetary donations before and after the worship service on Feb. 13 in the narthex. If you'd like to contribute but are unable to come to the church, you can call the church office and arrange to have



someone pick up your donation from you. The Youth will vote on where locally to donate the food and money received; some past recipients have included our church's Blessing Box, Food Pantry, and Veterans' Life Changing Services.




Read-A-Long and Book Discussion



Faith Development is sponsoring a read-a-long during the first few months of this year. The book is "Be The Bridge: Pursuing God's Heart for Racial Reconciliation" by Latasha Morrison.

Here is a summary from the back cover of this New York Times Bestseller: In an era where we seem to be increasingly divided along racial lines, many are hesitant to step into the gap, fearful of saying or doing the wrong thing. At times the silence, particularly within the church, seems deafening. But change begins with an honest conversation among a group of Christians willing to give a voice to unspoken hurts, hidden fears, and mounting tensions... In this perspective-shifting book, Latasha Morrison shows how you can participate in this incredible work and replicate it in your own community. With conviction and grace, she examines the historical complexities of racism. She expertly applies biblical principles, such as lamentation, confession, and forgiveness, to lay the framework for restoration."

You're encouraged to start reading the book during the next few months. A group discussion event about this book is being planned for later this spring, pending Covid conditions. "Be The Bridge" is available through the Lake County Library system, through many retailers and bookstores, and at the church. Our church has 5 copies of this book for people to borrow. They are available to check out in the classroom across the hall from the church office. Please sign the check-out sheet when you take a book, and sign it back in when you are finished so more people may enjoy the book.



Read through the Bible in a Year – Together!

Have you joined in the challenge to read through the Bible in a year? It's not too late to start! The Faith Development ministry encourages everyone to make the Bible a regular part of your daily life no matter when or how much reading you do.

Our Bible reading plan for the year is broken up into smaller passages of the Scriptures to be very manageable each day. This reading plan does not go straight through the Bible from Genesis to Revelation; rather it mixes up readings from the Old and New Testaments each day, and some days also include a Psalm.

We are in need of persons who are interested in serving as liturgists and/or ushers on Sunday mornings. Even if you are a little shy about speaking in public, the role of liturgist is about reading from the bulletin. Rev. Tyler provides the readings early in the week, giving the liturgist ample time to become familiar with the readings. Ushers light the chancel candles at the beginning of the worship service and extinguish them at the end of the service. One usher brings the offering plate forward during the singing of the Doxology and returns it to the narthex immediately afterwards. Since the bulletins are on a table in the narthex for worshippers to pick up, the ushers do not hand them out.
