

This month the *Matthew* 25 spotlight is shining upon the Presbytery of Wabash Valley and our Ministry of Faith Development as we participate in a virtual summer book club that seeks to be an entry point into understanding our own internalized biases and addressing them in order to be good-ish people! This book club is an initiative to engage in conversation and inspire action for the *Matthew* 25 call to dismantle structural racism. Find out more about the book club and how you can join as you read on!



- The Session discussed at length the guidelines and protocols for in-person worship and made the following decisions:
 - ~ The use of masks will still be welcomed but not required, given the widespread access to vaccines, low rates of transmission in Lake County and updated CDC guidelines.
 - $\sim\,$ Those who are unvaccinated or feel uncomfortable without a mask, are encouraged to keep masking up. Masks will continue to be provided.
 - \sim Physical distancing measures will be continued, and the sanctuary will be as ventilated as possible with fans, open doors and windows.
 - \sim After worship, fellowship will begin to meet downstairs in Fellowship Hall, observing more physical distancing and as ventilated as possible.
 - \sim Hymns are to continue being sung gently, but all verses (rather than just one) may now be sung.
 - \sim Meetings and groups are asked to observe the same guidelines when meeting in the building.
- Trustees and Faith Development reported that the two pews on the north side have been removed (Zandstra's were able to use the pews), and the area will be for families with young children as well as accommodating people with walkers or wheelchairs.
- Session approved a grant from the Endowment Fund to purchase a laptop for use by the Faith Development Ministry and Heather Casiano, the Family and Children Program Coordinator.
- Session approved a church fundraiser to support our programs and projects. It is entitled GotSneakers. More information will follow soon....but start collecting your family's used gym shoes.

IN THE CHURCH LIBRARY THIS MONTH

As we read through the Bible, there are many geographic places named. Do you ever wonder about those places, where they are or were? What did these places look like, and what kinds of features did they have? You can learn about Biblical places – many of which are still current villages, towns and cities – in our library's collection of Biblical atlases:

Atlas of the Bible Lands Atlas of World History The Golden Bible Atlas Atlas of the Bible

These atlases have a mix of black & white and color maps, images and diagrams of many places named in the Bible, from Egypt to Babylon/Persia and rom Israel/Palestine to the ancient Greek and Roman world. These books are appropriate for all ages, so kids may be interested to see the lands where Moses lived or where Jesus walked, too.







The church library is located in the room across the hall from the church office. Library materials can be accessed during regular church office hours, Monday-Thursday from 8 am to noon. There is a sign-out sheet in the library to fill out each time you borrow an item. Returned items can be put back on the shelf or left on the table in the center of the room. NEW IN THE PEWS!

In our worship lately, we've been speaking of planting seeds and honoring the potential of those who are often overlooked. You may notice a change in the sanctuary as you enter for worship. The Session recently decided to remove two pews near the back of the sanctuary in order to create a space that is more welcoming and inclusive of our youngest disciples and more welcoming and inclusive of worshipers who use wheelchairs or other mobility devices. When we preach that everyone should have a place at the table, we want to mean it! Hopefully as time progresses and we hear more noises



of life in the sanctuary, we will hear the voice of the Holy Spirit in our midst! Thank you to the Trustees for their great work in finding a home for the pews and helping with their removal. Thank you to the Faith Development team who has furnished the area with child-friendly activities.

We invite families with young children to use this area in the back of the sanctuary (opposite the sound booth), as well as those needing a little more space because of a wheelchair, walker, or other needs. We also ask that you would honor this space for those whom it was designed, and if you don't have small children with you or don't need a bigger space for mobility needs, to leave it open for those who do. Let us all worship the Lord together!!



SUMMER READ-A-LONG WITH PRESBYTERY OF WABASH VALLEY

Have you been searching for an opportunity to more fully engage our Matthew 25 call? Have you been longing for a brave space to learn about and discuss internalized racial oppression and internalized white supremacy? Have you been feeling a desire to connect with the broader beloved community of our Presbytery? We have good news for you!

Our presbytery's Committee on Representation will be facilitating a summer reading group on Dolly Chugh's *The Person You Mean to Be: How Good People Fight Bias.* There will be a rolling discussion on Facebook throughout the summer and then a final conversation via Zoom at the end of the summer. Join us as we prepare ourselves for the Matthew 25 work of dismantling structural racism. A single book is by no means comprehensive, but it is a great way to get this vital conversation started!

The Faith Development team invites everyone to participate in this worthwhile reading group. If there is enough interest, we may look at having our own congregational book discussion, in addition to the presbytery discussion opportunities. Be sure to order a copy of the book as soon as possible.

INTERACTIVE PRAYER STATION



During the month of July, Faith Development will be hosting an interactive prayer station for both the congregation and the public. We would love to have you participate and to invite friends and neighbors to participate as well!

Starting July 1st, on the metal stair railing leading up to the main sanctuary entrance, there will be a plastic container with items inside. You will find various colored strips of plastic fabric, and a few markers. The idea is to take out a ribbon or two, write a word or phrase on the ribbon that reflects a prayer you want lifted up, and then tie the ribbon somewhere on the metal railings and put the marker back in the container for others. These ribbons will remain outside for the month as a visual representation of our prayers, so please do not write anything too personal that you wouldn't want anyone to see. We also encourage you to lift up a prayer for all the other ribbons you see tied on the railings (but please don't remove them).

This can be done as many times as you wish, by any age, any time of day throughout July. The container will be refilled with new ribbons as the supply dwindles down. If you have any questions about this project, contact Heather Casiano.

Let's see what a beautiful thing God can do through prayer and how the Holy Spirit can move through something as simple as a ribbon!

I have been told that the shelter is now open and that we are permitted inside, but we as a group have decided to continue menu planning, shopping, cooking, and just dropping off the food. I was told the residents have been taught to serve the food and are very capable. We have dropped our outside meals from 20 to 10 because the shelter is open for non-residents but not all are aware of that. We continue to cook for the 50 on the inside, and if there is food left over, they will put it to good use the following day.

They now have a new scheduling person who is in charge, and I have had lengthy conversations with him regarding how we should handle things going forward. Knowing our limited personnel, he was very grateful that we would just continue to supply the meal on the second Saturday of every month!

I am very blessed to have such a committed group that comes every second Saturday. I truly thank them from the bottom of my heart. Our regulars are:

- Jamie Ham-- without him the chickens wouldn't get cut up or the venison stripped from its casing!
