Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

November is a month of many observances in the life and liturgy of First Presbyterian Church of Highland. We will be embarking upon our stewardship campaign, celebrating Thanksgiving, and beginning Advent, our holy season of expectant hope. Generosity, gratitude, and hope are all profoundly powerful spiritual practices at an individual level, and their power is amplified in community. So, let us strive together in our labors of generosity, gratitude, and hope this month! I recognize that these three spiritual practices in particular might be hard for many given the ongoing state of affairs in our pandemic-plagued and violence-riven world. It is those very realities, though, which make it so vital for us to embody these practices. We should be giving joyfully in the midst of a society stuck on scarcity! We should be thanking God and each other effusively in a world where people have so much difficulty recognizing reasons to be grateful! We should be overflowing with hope in the midst of so much despair! For, no matter the season, we are the people of the way of Christ, the people of the Resurrection, the people of Love.

Speaking of spiritual practices, this is also a good time of year for us to recommit to embracing the practice of Sabbath. As cold weather sets in and the earth begins to drift into its Sabbath rest, we should follow suit and take time to snuggle up and rest.

I recently participated in a virtual retreat offered by our denomination, the Presbyterian Church (USA), for pastors still in the early years of our ordained ministry. The goal of this retreat, called *CREDO*, is to provide support and inspiration so that we can continue in our vocation healthily rather than succumb to the very real danger of burnout. Over and over again throughout the retreat, the importance of Sabbath kept coming up. After all, even God rested on the seventh day of Creation and commanded that we keep the Sabbath holy. I must admit that I am usually not the best at keeping Sabbath. Very recently, though, I negotiated with TCA Health—the clinic where I provide therapy services—to reduce my days to four days a week, giving me Fridays off. For the first time in a long time, I will have an actual weekend in which to observe Sabbath rest! I invite you to consider how you, also, can find rest and restoration in this season.

So, generosity, gratitude, hope, and Sabbath. What wonderful practices to give structure and meaning to November and to the rest of the year as a whole! Individually and collectively, these practices will help us to thrive at a time when most think thriving is not possible. We can support each other. We can inspire others. We can give God glory with the intentional actions (and inaction for Sabbath!) of our lives. I invite you to read the pages of this edition of the Larger View with an eye towards how the activities of our church family can be part of these spiritual practices. We would love for you to join in however that might be possible for you.

I close with the following words of gratitude from Paul's first letter to the church in Thessalonika. I feel these words in my heart as I think of all of you. Please know that you can always reach out to me if you need to. We are in this together!

"How can we thank God enough for you in return for all the joy that we feel before our God because of you? Night and day we pray most earnestly that we may see you face to face and restore whatever is lacking in your faith. Now may our God and Father himself and our Lord Jesus direct our way to you. And may the Lord make you increase and abound in love for one another and for all, just as we abound in love for you. And may he so strengthen your hearts in holiness that you may be blameless before our God and Father at the coming of our Lord Jesus with all his saints."—I Thessalonians 3:9-13
