Let's continue with some important definitions as we build the foundations for our *Matthew 25* mission! Last month we learned about structural racism. This month we are learning about systemic poverty. From the PC(USA)'s website:

What is Congregational Vitality?

A community's vitality is primarily its spiritual strength and its capacity for purposeful mission. Congregational vitality is evident in a worshipping community when its structural systems, finances and discipleship practices are aligned in such a way that the community is actively engaged in the mission of God in their local community and the world, and they are powerfully focused on growing as disciples in the way of Jesus Christ. Faith comes alive when we boldly engage God's mission and share the hope we have in Christ.

We propose that there are seven marks to help you determine your current level of vitality — and then various processes for self-assessment, discernment and renewed commitment to the habits that foster an energetic engagement with the Spirit's work in the world.

Here are the 7 marks:

1. *A commitment to forming disciples over every member's lifetime.* This leads first to personal transformation, as people put on the heart of Christ, and then to social transformation, as people joyfully go forth into the community and tackle the issues facing today's culture.
2. *Embracing the call to evangelism.* We show forth the love of Christ by our actions and our lives even more than by our words. Our relationships are genuine and caring. People know we are Christians by our love.
3. *An outward focus.* Our church is not a place to escape from the world, but rather our gateway to our community where we may be the hands, feet, heart and mouth of Jesus Christ for people who are suffering or marginalized.
4. *Empowering every member to discover their individual calling and the gifts God has given them so they can go forth and serve.*
5. *Spirit-inspired worship that challenges, teaches, transforms, convicts and energizes us so when we are sent out, we have experienced the wonder of God and are changed for the better from when we arrived.*
6. *Caring relationships modeled on God's love.* We open our doors and hearts to all people, and we build relationships modeled on God's love, which leads to genuine reconciliation and peace.
7. *Congregations with healthy systems.* Our mission focuses are clear. There is fiscal responsibility and accountability. We have thoughtful decision-making structures. Our leaders and staff enjoy a sustainable balance of work/rest time.

SESSION SHORTS

- ~ Trustee President Jeffery Savage reported on the following projects:
 - They are recommending the removal of the shed as it is in disrepair and the items that are stored are rarely used.
 - The old sanctuary basement bathrooms have not been functional for several years, and there have been water leakage issues. The recommendation is to demolish those bathrooms and use this area to build shelves to store items for the Karing Kitchen. The bathroom in the upstairs old sanctuary is functional.
 - The Trustees are investigating the removal of the paper recycler in the parking lot as the town already offers recycling that residents can use.

- ~ Session members are exploring various fundraisers for this year. If you have an idea for a potential fundraiser, let someone on Session know about it.

- ~ A visioning session will take place in May with follow-up in August to discuss how to streamline our ministries and work more efficiently and effectively.

- ~ The Lenten schedule was reviewed:
 - April 2nd Palm Sunday worship
 - April 6th Maundy Thursday – 7 pm worship
 - April 9th Easter Sunday with Bake Sale after worship

- ~ The kitchen and refrigerator/freezer usage was discussed. Elder Cheryl Steen is having labels made to label, date and identify items used by ministries and individuals. There will also be a list posted on the outside of each freezer/refrigerator so that the items can be designated for specific uses: Hospitality, Shelter cooking, Deacon cooking, Sackurdays, etc.

- ~ Elder Cheryl Steen has been working with Westminster Presbyterian Church as they receive donations from various places and are willing to share, especially the meat donations which can help with our food ministries.



YOUTH CONNECTIONS

Youth Connections will meet a few times in April:

- April 2 – SUNDAY after worship; we'll eat lunch together and head to the Shrine of Christ's Passion together right away. It will probably take us a few hours at the Shrine, so we will end later than normal. If you need a ride to the Shrine from the church, or a ride home afterwards, please let Heather know.
- April 8 – SATURDAY from 1-3 pm in the church kitchen (enter at Door B); we're going to help the kitchen crew cook for the Hammond men's shelter. Bring a friend! We are also going to create some simple decorations for Easter Sunday.
- April 23 – SUNDAY after worship; lunch together, then we're going to look at Faith and Science and creation of the earth in a variety of ways. Fun games as well!

ADULT CONNECTIONS

- "The Bible in Today's World" class meets each Sunday morning at 9 am in the upstairs meeting room. They are working through a new study, "The Difficult Words of Jesus: A Beginner's Guide to His Most Perplexing Teachings." In this six-session study, Dr. Amy-Jill Levine guides us through the most difficult teachings of Jesus - how they have been understood over time, and how we might interpret them in the context of the Gospel of love and reconciliation. - BYOB (Bring Your Own Bible) will return on Wednesday, April 19, at 7-8 pm online on Zoom. Each week for 6 weeks we'll read and discuss a different Bible passage and the messages we each hear from God through it. LENT 2023 OFFERINGS FROM FAITH DEVELOPMENT

To support you in your reflections and journey this Lenten season, the ministry of Faith Development is offering several opportunities. You are invited to participate in all the ways that may be meaningful to you.

- **Weekly Devotional** – This year’s Lenten Devotional comes from the *Presbyterian Outlook*, entitled, “Examen: Inward Work for Outward Living.” Weekly themes include examining our fear to live with faith, our pain to live with healing, our dishonesty to live with truth, our joy to live with gratitude, our love to live with heart and our burdens to live with blessing. The devotions are sent weekly via email with the worship packet, mailed to those who receive the bulletin via US mail, and a small number of printed copies are available in the narthex for those who do not have email or access to a printer.
- **Lent Spirituality Center** –The Spirituality Center is located in the classroom across from the church office, with 7 different stations set up to guide you through prayer, meditation and reflection. Please take time on Sundays before and after worship, or weekday mornings Tuesdays through Thursdays, to stop in and enrich your spiritual journey. If you are not able to physically come to the church to participate, there is an “At Home Spirituality Center” packet for you to participate at home. - **Lenten Study and Practice** – Our last study time for this Lenten series is on April 5. Pastor Tyler is leading this annual time of discussion, reflection, and spiritual practice online on Zoom on Wednesdays from 7-8 pm (during our usual BYOB time). This year’s journey takes us through the stages of grief as we witness them being embodied by Jesus and his disciples in their anticipation of what was to come on the cross. During each session we also explore spiritual practices that will give us sustenance and strength for our journey. All are welcome to join in!

Please do not donate homemade or perishable items.


