Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

Jesus Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Hallelujah! What profound joy it is to proclaim that truth now and always! During our Lenten study and practice sessions over the last 6 weeks, we learned from and were inspired by various liberation theologies. This season, we are blessed to be reminded over and over again that the greatest liberation of all is liberation from death through the Resurrection! For, if death does not have the final say, then we have freedom to live life without fear, to live and love fiercely and fully. "Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?" There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear!" Jesus Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Hallelujah!

On Easter Sunday we read the story of the Resurrection in *John*. In it we found Mary Magdalene in the garden, weeping outside the tomb. When she turned around, she found a man standing there who, she thought, was the cemetery gardener. Then he spoke her name, and realization flooded her. It was there in his voice. It was there in the way that he said her name. It was there in the way that he simply knew her. This was Jesus of Nazareth, the one who was supposed to be in the tomb! And of course he knew her. For, this gardener had planted a seed in her heart and had nurtured it oh so very well. This gardener was the best gardener who ever was, for he knew how to make the human heart grow!

Throughout the season of Easter, our hearts will be growing in God's garden, in the garden of the greatest gardener, in the garden of new life! As flowers and vegetables grow in the Spring season, as many of us tend our own gardens, let us imagine what it would have been like to be there with Mary and to encounter our risen Lord. Let us reflect on the processes that take place when vegetation dies in the Fall and lies dormant in the Winter. 
We will also be celebrating our graduates with special recognition during one of the worship services in May. Graduates and families will be contacted with more details as it gets closer.



SPRING READ-A-LONG AND BOOK DISCUSSION

Faith Development is sponsoring a spring read-a-long on a timely subject for this year. The book is "Thou Shalt Not Be Jerk: A Christian's Guide to Engaging Politics" by Eugene Cho.

Here is a summary from the publisher, David C Cook:



According to Eugene Cho, Christians should never profess blind loyalty to a party. Any party. But they should engage with politics, because politics inform policies which impact people. In Thou Shalt Not Be a Jerk: A Christian's Guide to Engaging Politics, Cho encourages readers to remember that hope arrived—not in a politician, system, or great nation—but in the person of Jesus Christ.

With determination and heart, Cho urges readers to stop vilifying those they disagree with—especially the vulnerable—and asks Christians to follow Jesus and reflect His teachings. In this book that integrates the pastoral, prophetic, practical, and personal, readers will be inspired to stay engaged, have integrity, listen to the hurting, and vote their convictions.

Author Eugene Cho is the founder and visionary of One Day's Wages, which works to alleviate extreme global poverty; the president and CEO of Bread for the World, a Christian advocacy organization urging U.S. decision makers to do all they can to pursue a world without hunger; and an ordained pastor.

You're encouraged to start reading the book this month. This book, originally published in 2020, and our discussions, will not endorse any candidates or political parties, so no matter where you may find yourself on the vast spectrum of thought, there is room for all voices.

There will be several ways to engage in discussion:

- A private Facebook group for this read-a-long available starting on April 16
- A Zoom discussion on the first half of the book on May 22 at 6:30 pm
- An in-person discussion of last half of the book on June 12 at 6:30 pm

We have 5 copies of this book at the church that can be checked out to read. Please sign the check-out sheet when you take a book, and sign it back in when you are finished so more people may enjoy the book. "Thou Shalt Not Be A Jerk" is also available in paperback and as an e-book (Kindle) through many retailers and bookstores.
