

Dear All,

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ! I am one of the lucky ones who has always loved school, and I am one of the privileged ones for whom school has always worked in content and context. August has thus always carried a bittersweet taste for me—and the aftertaste is still there for me even though I am no longer in school! There is sweetness in the waning days of summer break. There is bitterness in that those days will soon come an end. There is sweetness in the excitement of a new school year. There is bitterness in that days and weeks get packed with busy-ness once more. To all of those going back to school this month—students, staff, and teachers—God bless you!

This is a good time of year to remember that the word *disciple* comes from the Latin word for STUDENT: *discipulus*. The relationship between Jesus and his followers can be described in many ways, but the most prominent description is that of teacher (*rabbi* in Hebrew) and students. In the days that Jesus walked the earth, there were not school buildings like we use today. Rather, there were itinerant philosophers who wandered around outside, with students joining them based on the merits of their teaching. Their classrooms were under trees, on plains, and on mountainsides. They formed communities together, and those communities would become known as schools.

While I was in college I wrote a paper on the teaching methods of Jesus during the Sermon on the Mount. I wish I had a copy handy that I could share with you, but alas! It is buried in a box among boxes in a closet among closets somewhere. I may not remember all of the content, but I certainly remember the awe I felt in coming to realize just how brilliant of a teacher Jesus was. I know that brilliance well, as I come from a long line of brilliant teachers!

What I didn't pay as much attention to, though, was how the disciples received that teaching. They were a motley crew of fishers and laborers and tax collectors and idlers. They would not have been among the privileged for whom school works so well in content and context. And yet, in a few short years they learned enough to carry the message and the movement forward in a way that spread like wildfire. Of course the very nature of the message of radical love had something to do with that, but so did the people who spread that message! The more I study the disciples, the more I see them as students who thirsted for knowledge, students who had different ways of learning, students who were genuinely curious, students who were not afraid to challenge their teacher, and students who were not afraid to be challenged by their teacher. And of course, they were students who had the benefit of having the best teacher who ever was and ever will be!

As you read through this edition of the *Larger View* and as you join us in worship and devotional study throughout August, I invite you to do so with similar thirst, curiosity, and challenge. Read and listen for ways that you can also spread the message of radical love like wildfire. That's the heart of being a disciple, dear ones: Listen, Learn, and LOVE!

When Jesus saw the crowds, he went up the mountain, and after he sat down, his disciples came to him. And he began to speak and taught them, saying: "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted. Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth. Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled. Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy. Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God. Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God. Blessed are those who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are you when people revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you."—Matthew 5:1-12

Building congregational vitality by challenging people and congregations to deepen their faith and get actively and joyfully engaged with their community and the world. **Dismantling structural racism** by advocating and acting to break down the systems, practices and thinking that underlie discrimination, bias, prejudice and oppression of people of color.

Eradicating systemic poverty by working to change laws, policies, plans and structures in our society that perpetuate economic exploitation of people who are poor.

- Rev. Orem reviewed the initiatives from the General Assembly and these initiatives were also printed in the bulletin on July 24th. He mentioned that we are connected to this greater church body and need to be aware of the policies that have been enacted.
- The Trustees continue to work on improving the condition of our church building and grounds.



- Several fundraisers were discussed:
 - The salad sale was a great success in July, so Session decided to go ahead with another salad sale after the August 21st outdoor service.
 - The Butter Braid sale is being planned for October.
 - Got Sneakers collection of used sneakers continues to bring in some revenue each month.
 - The crafters are busy at work planning for a craft sale in November. Anyone interested should contact Jean Smith. They are meeting and crafting on August 3rd at 1 pm in the Fellowship Hall.
 - The Fourth of July Parking Lot Fundraiser was a huge success making \$1500 for Mission.
- Elder Bonnie Perryman, our commissioner, gave a report on the last Presbytery meeting on May 26th where Heather Casiano was introduced as a new member from the Hammond church. The next assembly will be on September 24th.
- Session will be sending a letter of support and concern to the Highland Park Presbyterian Church in response to the July 4th shootings that occurred there. Rev. Quincy Worthington is pastor there and was our moderator of Session for the time prior to our calling of Rev. Tyler.

This is usually the place in the Larger View where a member tells what our church means to them. For the next four months, we will be focusing on: Faith, Prayer, Community, and Hope, as related to stewardship at FPCH.

Stewardship is living out our Faith through giving, to carry out God's work.

Faith is shown as a farmer plants seeds in the soil. These seeds can be real seeds, ideas, and maybe a project that requires some extra hands.

In our church, just look at the opportunities to use our heart, head and hands. Yes, we do this faithfully.

Faithful stewardship is found in all of us; sometimes we need to hear it calling to our senses. Yes, let faith guide your projects and be amazed at what can happen. God will lead the way! Stay faithful!

Needed school supplies include:



GOT SNEAKERS? OUR USED SNEAKER DRIVE CONTINUES!!! Thanks to all who have contributed. The sneakers that we collect help raise money to support our church's mission AND help our environment by keeping sneakers out of landfills. So far we have sent 9 bags with 10-15 pairs of gently worn, used, and new sneakers in each bag. We are doing great, but we still need your help! Please take a moment to look through your closets and to ask your relatives, neighbors and friends to do the same. We are counting on you! Bring the sneakers (athletic shoes) to the church and put in one of the blue bins...either by Door D (inside and outside) or in the church narthex. (Athletic shoes only) You can also call the office (219-838-6850) or Jean Smith (219-322-4896), and we will come and pick them up from you!

Now that the 2022 General Assembly has ended – the first-ever hybrid assembly – the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) will try to live into the commitments made and the work ahead. Ruth Santana-Grace and Shavon Starling-Louis, the new co-moderators, stood for election using the theme "Unbounded We Thrive," and the assembly spoke its mind on issues affecting the church and the world.



Israel/Palestine. The assembly voted 266-116 to approve one of the most controversial items before it — INT-02, declaring that the PC(USA) recognize the laws, policies and practices of the Israeli government regarding the Palestinian people "fulfill the international legal definition of apartheid." Some have criticized the PC(USA) stance towards Israel as antisemitic, saying it hurts interfaith relations. Others say the assembly spoke courageously in supporting human rights for the Palestinian people.

Climate change. Voting 340-41, the assembly directed PC(USA) entities to divest from five oil and gas companies it concluded are not moving quickly enough to try to slow global warming — Chevron, ExxonMobil, Marathon Petroleum, Phillips 66, and Valero Energy. The vote reflected continued support for the Committee on Mission Responsibility Through Investment (MRTI)'s strategy of corporate engagement and selective divestment. Action on another item, ENV-09, also affirmed "that working in the fossil fuel industry is a necessity for many" and assured Presbyterians that "divestment is not a condemnation or judgment of their choice of employment."

Litany of repentance. One of the assembly's most powerful emotional moments came when White Presbyterians recited a litany of repentance from RGJ-08, offering an apology to African Americans for the sin of slavery and its legacy. One assembly committee focused exclusively on issues of race and gender justice — including violence against Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders, disparities experienced by Black women and girls, and racial disparities in health care. Other concerns: confronting White supremacy in the PC(USA) and working for reparative justice.

Gun violence. With recent mass shootings still echoing, the assembly approved VIOL-07, declaring 2022-2032 a "Decade to End Gun Violence" — asking the Presbyterian Mission Agency (PMA) to develop tools for faith-based advocacy against gun violence and for studying "the intersection of white supremacy culture, Christian nationalism, and gender with gun violence." It also approved VIOL-11,







directing MRTI to begin a process of corporate engagement with Walmart, Dick's Sporting Goods, and Kroger, three publicly-traded companies included in the investment portfolios of either the Board of Pensions or Presbyterian Foundation, and which sell guns not classified as semi-automatic and assault-based weapons. (Those weapons previously mentioned are already on the divestment list.)

Family leave. The assembly approved a proposed amendment to the PC(USA) constitution to say a minister's terms of call shall include at least 12 weeks of paid family medical leave (covering the birth, fostering or adoption of a child; care for ill or disabled family members; and healing following a loss or tragic event). To take effect, the proposed change needs approval from a majority of the presbyteries.

Immigration. The assembly voted 340-25 to declare the PC(USA) a "sanctuary and accompaniment church" — saying the denomination stands with immigrants and asylum-seekers and is committed to working for justice in U.S. immigration policy. That work often involves Presbyterians accompanying immigrants by offering housing and legal assistance, going with them to immigration hearings and other appointments and trying to get people released from detention.

Restructuring. Supporting recommendations from a special committee, the assembly voted to create a commission with the power to act and the responsibility for unifying the PMA and the Office of the General Assembly — basically, to restructure the top level of the PC(USA). Citing financial stress on congregations and presbyteries, the assembly also created a team to develop experimental models as alternatives to the current per capita funding system.

Reproductive justice. In the wake of the U.S. Supreme Court decision overturning Roe v. Wade, the assembly approved a resolution on reproductive justice — saying the PC(USA) rejects "attempts at all levels of government to reduce, limit, or eliminate access to contraceptive and abortion care."

LGBTQIA+ equity. The assembly created a new LGBTQIA+ Equity Advocacy Committee as a permanent committee of the General Assembly — equivalent in access and accountability to the Advocacy Committee for Women and Gender Justice and the Racial Equity Advocacy Committee.

Per capita. The assembly set the new General Assembly per capita assessment at \$9.85 per member for 2023 and \$9.80 per member for 2024. That compares to the current per capita rate of \$8.98 per member.

2024 General Assembly. Presented with four options, the assembly opted for a hybrid approach again for the 2024 assembly — choosing Plan Omega with online committee meetings and in-person plenary sessions in Salt Lake City, Utah.


A Friend gave me a heart shape plaque with the following written message on it:
