Dear All,

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

Advent is upon us, and I am so very excited about it! It's time for some of our favorite hymns, some of our dearest scripture stories, and some of our most meaningful missions. It's time for our Christmas Cantata, our caroling, our candle lighting! So, let's hold up the candles of hope, peace, joy, love, and Christ for the world to see and be inspired. This year we are going to pay particular attention to peace! With such horrific violence happening in Palestine, Israel, Ukraine, and Sudan as well as saber rattling in so many other places, I am sure that peace is a deep desire we all share. With gun violence and acts of hate plaguing this country, I am sure that peace is in the forefront of many of our minds. With all of the anxiety and grief of the past few years still fresh in our memories, I am sure that peace is needed in all of our souls and spirits.

Heather Casiano and I have been hard at work planning liturgical and missional elements based on the theme "Circles of Peace." The Advent wreath is our guiding image. It is a circle that holds within it the lights of our faith, the lights of the promise of the Messiah. We invite you to imagine concentric circles (wreaths!) representing expanding realms of peace—inner peace, interpersonal peace, world peace, and peace with God. Very soon you will notice new and creative components of worship, peacemaking mission opportunities, and spiritual practices. I urge and encourage you to have open hearts and open minds, for as Jesus says, "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called the children of God." So, children of God, let's commit ourselves to making peace! In preparation, let us start being intentional with prayers of peace in all of those wreathy realms mentioned above. Also, let us get this little earworm stuck in our heads:

I've got peace like a river, I've got peace like a river, I've got peace like a river in my soul!

As we prepare ourselves for the coming of Mary's child, the coming of our King, the coming of our Christ, may we remember that as children of God we are called to prepare the world for him to come back and to usher in the Kingdom of peace.

I leave you with the following words from *Isaiah* 9. I pray that you will read them and be inspired!

For a child has been born for us, a son given to us; authority rests upon his shoulders, and he is named Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, **Prince of Peace**. Great will be his authority, **and there shall be endless peace** for the throne of David and his kingdom. He will establish and uphold it with justice and with righteousness from this time onward and forevermore. The zeal of the Lord of hosts will do this.

TRUSTEES

- The bricks above Doors B and I have been repaired where the old awnings had been removed.
- The outside garden area on the south side of the old sanctuary has been built up away from the building, the old sidewalk removed, and new rock has been installed.
- The furnace for the fellowship hall has been installed!
- A programmable switch for the light above door B has been added to provide better lighting.
- Rev. Tyler and the Session thanked President Jeffery Savage and the Trustees for their work.

DEACONS

- Prayers and concerns were offered for members of our congregation and community.
- Prayer shawl ministry meets on the 4th Tuesday of each month.
- Deacons continue to check the Blessing Box daily for perishable and outdated items and stock it.
- Gladys' Table meals of lasagna, bean salad, garlic bread and cookie bars were prepared and delivered on October 21st and November 18th to members of our church who are homebound. The meal was prepared by Munster High School students with Krissy LaFlech and delivered by the deacons.
- October 28th Sackurday (sack lunches for the community) was cancelled due to unavailability of workers. The next Sackurday was on November 25th. Elder Lois Fozkos shopped and was assisted by the deacons. Forty-two lunches were served to the community.
- December 3rd Fellowship/Coffee hour: Deacons will provide sweets, fruit and cheese and crackers, and all will serve and clean up.
- December 17th Deacons will extend a welcome to our Hammond First Presbyterian Church neighbors who will be attending the Cantata.

SESSION

- The Session voted to approve an amendment change to the Endowment Guidelines to allow an elected congregational member to serve two terms of 3 years each (instead of just one term) on the Endowment Committee, making this more consistent with the other boards. We also voted to allow any Trustee to be on the committee, rather than just the President or Secretary of the Trustees. This will be voted on at the congregational meeting on December 10th.
- The Session voted to amend the Bylaws of the Presbyterian Church of Highland to allow more flexibility in the number of Trustees elected each year. Instead of the current number of 6 being elected with 2 per year, we voted to use the wording "at least 4" being elected with 1 or 2 per year. This will also be brought up for a congregational vote at our December 10th congregational meeting.



- Session voted to hold our annual Congregational meeting on January 14, 2024.
- Our fundraisers were discussed. The T-shirts and Sweatshirts will again be offered for sale at the beginning of next year, with a modified design and in heather gray, instead of white. The craft fair has already raised over \$700 and will hold a holiday craft sale on December 3 after worship.
- Beginning in 2024, ministries/committees/ boards will be assigned to host fellowship hour after worship on a rotating basis.
- The Nominating Committee has a slate of officers and committee members ready for the upcoming congregational meeting on December 10th. Thank you to all those who answered the call to service.
- Clerk Jean Smith attended the Presbytery Clerk Review meeting and reported that our 2022 minutes were reviewed and approved. She also reported on other information regarding old Session minutes. Session decided to send 7 books of old minutes to the Presbyterian Historical Society which will store those minutes in a climate-controlled environment. We will be able to access those minutes should information from them be needed.
- Rev. Orem reported on the Advent theme this year, which will be "Circles of Peace". Our worship and activities will focus on this theme.
- Session meetings will tentatively change to the third Tuesday (instead of Monday) evenings at 6:30 pm beginning in 2024. This will allow for hybrid meetings.
- The last Presbytery Assembly meeting of 2024 was on Tuesday, November 28th. This is the last meeting where Rev. Tyler was the moderator. Elder Bonnie Perryman commended Pastor Tyler for his excellent leadership as moderator this past year. He will be moderating the coordinating council next year.

"CIRCLES OF PEACE" THIS ADVENT

The Faith Development team is providing a variety of ways for everyone to experience and get involved in the worship and life of our congregation this Advent season, through our theme of "Circles of Peace". There will be creative ways of weaving our prayers and hopes together; we'll learn a few words in different languages in worship; we'll offer several ways to take the message of peace out into our world through simple mission projects; everyone can participate in the annual Cookies & Caroling event (see below for details); and there will be a unique Christmas pageant that all can participate in (without any rehearsals). For those who worship online or those who are homebound, we will have ways for you to participate, and all activities are appropriate for all ages to participate. We would love to have your children, grandchildren, nieces and nephews, etc. be an active part of the Circles of Peace this Advent!





ADVENT DEVOTIONS

If you enjoy a daily devotional to help you walk through the days of Advent, look no further! Advent begins on Dec. 3rd and continues through Dec. 24th. The Faith Development team has compiled a list of several free online Advent devotionals. You can bookmark the one(s) you like on your device and read from it daily, or print a copy out. Choose whichever options make your Advent experience meaningful.

- There are 24 chapters in the gospel according to Luke. Start on Dec. 1st and read one chapter a day to get you through Christmas Eve. The author of Luke's gospel gives us a pretty thorough view of Jesus' life and ministry from birth to death-resurrection-ascension.
- Pittsburgh Theological Seminary offers a free Advent devotional each year, which can be found online at https://www.pts.edu/devotional_1. You can download a PDF of the devotion, or visit the webpage each day. There are also audio recordings for each day's Scripture reading and devotion that you can listen to.
- Presbyterians for Earth Care, a national eco-justice network that cares for God's creation by encouraging Presbyterians to make creation care a central concern of the church organization, offers both a print and web version of their Advent Devotional: <u>https://presbyearthcare.org/devotional-and-worship-aids/</u>

- Another option for an Advent devotional is to read the writings of Pastor Tyler, who will once again be sharing his daily thoughts and reflections during Advent, as he has done in past years. He generally posts these writings online on Facebook. If you aren't on Facebook, we are going to compile his Advent writings and email them out weekly. We will also have a limited number of printed copies of the weekly email at the church.





COOKIES AND CAROLING DEC. 10

This annual tradition of the Youth Connections group will take place on Sunday, Dec. 10, after worship. <u>Everyone is invited to join</u> the youth this year! If you like to bake and/or decorate Christmas cookies, or have kids/grandkids that like to do so, we will start baking about 12:30 pm in the church kitchen. If you like to sing Christmas carols, you can meet us at the church at 3 pm. We'll hand out maps of our caroling route, make sure everyone has a ride, and head out to sing and deliver cookies with Christmas joy. We should finish up by 5 pm.

<u>For all youth</u>: we will start with lunch at the church after worship, then dive into baking and decorating until 3 pm, when we'll head out to go caroling. Your friends are welcome to come with you! Bring jackets/coats/winter gear appropriate for caroling outside for whatever the weather will be that day. Please let Heather know ahead of time if you are planning on coming so we have enough food for lunch.

We're trying to plan a New Year's Eve Lock-In at our church for all youth. There will be fireworks across the street at Main Square Park, lots of food, games, movies, and other activities (and very little sleeping). <u>PLEASE RSVP TO HEATHER CASIANO IF YOU WOULD BE INTERESTED AND ABLE TO</u> <u>ATTEND NO LATER THAN DECEMBER 15</u>. We need to have a minimum of 5 youth (including friends) to make it work, as well as 1 or 2 additional adult chaperones.





These classes are open to all youth and adults of all ages. Friends are always encouraged to join in as well - you do not have to be a member of this congregation to participate.

- "<u>The Bible in Today's World</u>" class meets in person on <u>Sunday mornings from 9-10 am</u>, in the upstairs meeting room. They are making their way through the book, "The Difficult Words of Jesus" by Amy-Jill Levine. In class they discuss the Scriptures and essential issues each chapter is based on, and watch short videos by the author to better understand some of Jesus' most confusing teachings. <u>There will be no class on Dec. 24 or 31, and class will resume on Jan. 7, 2024.</u> Contact John Toren or Heather Casiano with any questions.
- The Wednesday evening "<u>BYOB</u>" (Bring Your Own Bible) discussion group meets on <u>Wednesday</u> <u>evenings from 7-8 pm</u> online on Zoom. In December they will be taking a deeper look at the Advent Scriptures from each worship service, and seeing where any connections might be to our theme of "Circles of Peace." <u>There will be no BYOB on Dec. 27 or Jan. 3, and will resume on Jan. 10, 2024.</u> The link to join the Zoom meetings is emailed out weekly. 
