Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

I have just returned from my trip to Cuba, and what a learning experience it was! I look forward to sharing my experiences and learnings with you over the next several months. I will start with the primary lesson, which is the power of community. While in Cuba I encountered inspiring communities of people who have come together to seek liberation and transformation. All the while, I was reminded of what an inspiring community FPCH is! You came together in my absence to make sure our shared ministry would thrive. And I have blessed assurance that you will do so again in the next couple of weeks as I embark on the exciting journey of marriage, starting with Vima's and my wedding in Puerto Rico on February 11<sup>th</sup>. Thank you for being such a wonderfully loving community for me, for each other, and for Northwest Indiana!

This coming Sunday you will hear about a process of action, reflection, and new action. This is a process of piety that Jesus practiced and that I witnessed firsthand at the Martin Luther King, Jr. Center in Havanna. With Jesus as the model, it is also a foundational component of developing theology—of developing ways of better understanding God and God's will for Creation. Lent starts with Ash Wednesday on February 14<sup>th</sup>, and throughout this holy season we will have our annual Lenten Study and Practice on the following Wednesday evenings. This year we will be exploring liberation theologies.

As the suffering of our world continues to mount at such an alarming speed, it is vitally important that we learn how to study God's Word and put it into practice in ways that liberate and transform. Liberation theologies start with the premise that God pays special attention to those who are suffering most in the world and calls us to act in ways that physically and spiritually relieve that suffering. Each week we will engage in the action of reading God's word and learning from people who come from those communities that are suffering most. Each week we will engage in communal reflection by discussing together. Each week we will consider actions we can take in our own community based on our reflection. I hope that you will consider joining on whichever Wednesday evenings you might have available!

I also hope that you will participate in our other Lenten practices! Our Ash Wednesday service is one of the most meaningful of the year, as it lifts up our own need to repent and seek the liberation of God's grace. Throughout the season we will once again have a Spirituality Center, providing a special place for prayer and other spiritual practices. We of course will also have our weekly Sunday worship services and opportunities for education, fellowship, and mission. Lent is a great time to engage in these activities with deeper intention! As we journey towards the cross with Jesus, let us act, reflect, and act again!

I close with these words from *Psalm* 51:

Create in me a clean heart, O God, and put a new and right spirit within me. Do not cast me away from your presence, and do not take your holy spirit from me. Restore to me the joy of your salvation, and sustain in me a willing spirit.

#### Trustees

- Jeffery Savage, President of the Trustees, reported that many projects have just finished up. The main project this spring will be the installation of air-conditioning for the sanctuary.
- The AED certifications will expire in March. A training will need to be set up to certify individuals on the AED.
- Rev. Orem and the Session asked about getting a new dishwasher for the kitchen. The present one is not reliable. The Trustees will be investigating this project.

#### Deacons

- Pam Porter volunteered to be moderator of the Deacons this year.
- One sunshine bag was given out in December.
- The Deacons continue to check and stock the Blessing Box daily, removing perishable and outdated items. Thank you to those persons and to the individual deacons who have contributed donations for the box.
- It was suggested that it would help to have a sign in the ground by the Blessing Box asking that items should only be placed in the box and that they should be non-perishable items only.
- Gladys' Table meals were prepared by Munster High School students and delivered by the Deacons on 12/16/2023. The next meal is scheduled for 1/20/2024.
  - Sackurday: On 12/30/2023, 40 lunches were prepared and distributed. The next Sackurday will be on 1/27/24.
- The Board of Deacons requested that the congregation elect an additional deacon to help with the workload, and that was done at our annual meeting on January 14, 2024.

#### Session

- Jean Smith was re-appointed as clerk for 2024.
- Pam Porter was re-appointed as Treasurer for 2024.
- The yearly communion schedule was approved.
- The Clerk's 2023 Statistical report for Presbytery was approved.
- The capital campaign letter was approved and sent out. Our goal is to raise \$8500 to complete the funding of the sanctuary air-conditioning project.



- We discussed goals for 2024. Among those goals were:
  - completing the capital campaign
  - welcoming newcomers
  - getting more youth involved
  - expanding on what we are already doing to draw others to our church
  - having welcome banners and signs
  - advertising our events and projects
  - providing intergenerational activities such as game nights, book reviews, etc.
- In celebration of Pastor Tyler and Vima's wedding, we decided to have a reception for them after church on April 14<sup>th</sup>. Volunteers are needed to help coordinate this happy celebration. If you are interested in helping, please contact Jean Smith.



After updating the heating in the fellowship hall, we are now ready to have dual air conditioning and heating units installed in the sanctuary! As was written in the letter that went out:

The installation of the units in the sanctuary, will allow us to worship comfortably in the hot summer months and will give us necessary backup heat if anything happens to our aging boiler system. This will improve our collective experience in the sanctuary and will make our space more inviting for those who visit seeking to encounter God and maybe even to find a new Church home!

There is a thermometer in the narthex showing our progress, and we look forward to seeing the mercury rise as we get closer to our goal of \$8,500! Please consider contributing in whatever way you can, putting into practice that spirit of generosity and generosity of spirit!




#### "LOCAL PILGRIM" LENT DEVOTIONAL

This year's Lent devotional comes to us from The Presbyterian Outlook. The daily devotional, called "Local Pilgrim" invites you to explore and observe new and familiar places in your community. What will God reveal to you when you pause, ponder and reflect? In "Local Pilgrim," a variety of writers explore what God might reveal to us if we intentionally explore our communities. Who do we see? What do we hear? God reveals God's self when we look.

Lent is the perfect season for a pilgrimage such as this, leading to meaningful contemplation and sacred discoveries. As you make your way through this devotional, you might find yourself inspired to go somewhere new; or somewhere familiar with a notebook in hand; pause, ponder and pray. Each daily reflection, beginning with Ash Wednesday and culminating on Easter Sunday, will combine personal reflection, Scripture and prayer.

This Lent devotional will be emailed out before Ash Wednesday (Feb. 14), and mailed to those who don't use email. A limited number of printed copies will also be available in the narthex after Ash Wednesday.





Once again, the ministry of Faith Development is putting together a Spirituality Center during Lent. It will be located in the library room across from the church office, available Feb. 18 – April 14. There will be a variety of prayer and reflection stations to go through at your leisure. The stations will be different than last year, so you are invited to check out the Spirituality Center as you're able to help your journey and reflections through the Lent season. An at-home guide for some Lent spiritual practices will also be available for those not able to come to the church. 
