Dear All,

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

It's hard to believe that we are already in the thick (and the heat!) of summer! This time of year takes me back to summers on the farm growing up, when we would always hope that the corn would be knee-high by the fourth of July. Reflecting on my life, those were my days of heaviest labor. My brother and I worked as the farmhands for Pappy, my grandfather. Throughout the summer we built fences, chopped down thistles, cleaned the manure out of the barn, and, the biggest task of them all, baled hay. Baling hay was the hardest—especially unloading the wagons and loading the barn!—but it was also the best. For, the whole family would come together for baling time. Some would be out in the field, loading the wagon. Others would be in the barn, unloading the wagon. One would be driving the tractor. Others would be bringing water and snacks around. EVERYBODY would be hot and sweaty and messy! I am sure that I grumbled and groaned a lot as a teenager on those summer days, but I wouldn't trade them for anything. They are intricately fused to my sense of home-my foundations, my feeling of belonging no matter what.

I wax poetic about the dog days of summer on the Orem farm because the First Presbyterian Church of Highland, Indiana, carries a similar sense of home for me now, as I know is the case for so many of you who are reading this. In so many ways, we engage in the labors of the Kingdom together, creating spaces in which everyone can belong, no matter what, and to which everyone can contribute their various gifts of service. Over the years I have spent with you all, I have been consistently amazed by the energy and love you pour into this place, into this community, into each other, and into our shared worship of God. We truly live into Paul's description of the body of Christ, with each body part needed, each body part contributing, and each body part honored. If we were down on the farm, I think we would make a darn good baling team!

Back to this idea of home and belonging, I want to lift up the work that we all have been doing to make FPCH feel like a home where people can belong even if it is not the home where they grew up. I am heartened every time I notice somebody being welcomed in person or online. I am excited when people make it clear that they feel loved here. I am grateful, because I know that every single one of you is intentional in making this a home where all feel welcomed, loved, and safe in the fullness of who they are. We always have room for growth and improvement, as is the case for everybody everywhere, and I hope that we will continue to explore ways that we can include those who are excluded by society and by other parts of the body of Christ. AND I want to celebrate the work we are already doing!

As you read this edition of the Larger View, I invite you to do so through the lens of this vital work of the Kingdom. Take a look at the ways that we are reaching out and reaching within, the ways that we are sharing God's love, and the ways that we are experiencing God's presence.

I close with these words from Paul's letter to the Galatians:

"So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up. So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all!"—Galatians 6:9-10a

Let us get out into the fields! Let us load up the barn! Let us distribute water and snacks! Let us make hay! Let us make home!

As a reminder, this section of the Larger View is here to highlight our embodiment of the *Matthew* 25 initiative to which we have committed. This initiative is focused on the following:

- **Building congregational vitality** by challenging people and congregations to deepen their faith and get actively and joyfully engaged with their community and the world.
- **Dismantling structural racism** by advocating and acting to break down the systems, practices and thinking that underlie discrimination, bias, prejudice and oppression of people of color.
- **Eradicating systemic poverty** by working to change laws, policies, plans and structures in our society that perpetuate economic exploitation of people who are poor.

- Session approved the writing of a technology grant to upgrade the technology in the sanctuary.
- Various fundraisers were discussed and approved.
 - Ministry of Mission's Fourth of July parking lot fundraiser is taking place June 30-July 4.
 - There will be a salad sale after worship on July 17th. The first salad sale was very successful.
 - Butter Braid coffee cake sale will take place in October with delivery before Thanksgiving.
 - We are exploring possible participation in a craft fair in November, with congregation members making various holiday crafts to sell.
 - Another possible restaurant fundraiser is in the works, similar to the one we did at Culver's last year.

- The Trustees have been working on several projects, and Rev. Orem thanked Jeff Savage for always being available to work on whatever needs repair. Some of their work this month has included:
 - Contacting vendors to get permits and repair the boilers, sanctuary lift and water heater in the fellowship hall bathroom
 - Getting new battery for the AED which must be replaced every 5 years
 - Helping with the outdoor gardening and grounds
- Thanks to the garden crew for the weeding and maintaining of the garden and parking lot area!
- A Youth-led service will take place on July 10th. Everyone is encouraged to attend and support the youth.
- We revisited our BOLD IDEAS. We have made some progress on several ideas which are included in our Matthew 25 initiative by reaching out: to immigrants by donating to the Welcome Network through Ministry of Mission, by being a welcoming and inclusive congregation to all, including those who are virtual members and homebound, and by upgrading our technology.




Youth Connections is taking a break from regular meetings for the summer, and gathering occasionally for fun!


All youth (entering 6th grade through recently graduated high school) and friends are always welcome to all Youth Connections events and gatherings!
