By the way, I want to again lift up the extraordinary accomplishment of the completion of our temperature control project! This mustard seed of a congregation keeps amazing me! Our faith is indeed extraordinary!

# **Trustees:**

- The air-conditioning sanctuary project is completed. Great job, Trustees!
- If items are brought in for the Karing Kitchen, please let someone know about them.
- The Trustees are looking into repairing/repainting our signage as well as that of the Blessing Box.

# **Deacons:**

- **Prayers and Concerns:** Prayers and concerns were lifted up for members of our congregation who are in need.
- **Blessing Box:** Deacons continue to check and stock the box daily, removing perishable and outdated items.
- **Gladys' Table:** Gladys' Table meals were prepared and delivered on 5/18/24. Krissy LaFlech and volunteers prepared the meal, and it was delivered by the deacons.
- Sackurday: On 4/27/24, 40 lunches were prepared and distributed.
- **Prayer Shawls**: Two prayer shawls were designated for two members recovering from recent hospital stays.
- **Gift Cards for Graduates:** Gift cards were purchased for our high school graduates.

# **Session:**

- With the sanctuary air-conditioning project complete, we celebrated that \$55,429.37 of the \$57,500 was raised with grants, a gift from the Hammond church and our own capital campaign. To fund the remaining, Session authorized \$2,070.63 to be sent from the Endowment Fund General Fund monies available.
- Session also authorized \$500 to be sent from the Endowment Fund General Fund monies to replenish the \$500 already spent for AED training.
- The gardeners need additional volunteers. Also, dirt is needed. Thanks to Elder Cheryl Steen, we can get some student volunteers to help. Session discussed the need for a budget item for gardening.



- A garden workday was discussed and will be announced during worship on Sundays.
- There was also discussion about having an attic clean-up day in the fall.
- Fundraisers:
  - We will continue salad sales on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of each month. Our last salad sale made \$165.
  - There were many interested in a craft fair again in the fall. They will be meeting on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Wednesdays of each month beginning in July.
  - Other ideas for fundraising were discussed.
- Rev. Tyler gave a report from the Presbytery meeting which occurred on May 21<sup>st</sup>. At that meeting, Heather Casiano was recommissioned to be able to do communion for churches in the Presbytery in the pastor's absence.
- Our outdoor worship services will occur on the third Sunday of each month, beginning in June.

You must understand this, my beloved brothers and sisters: let everyone be quick to listen, slow to speak, and slow to anger.—James 1:19






#### **SUMMER HIATUS**

## **SPRING READ-A-LONG AND BOOK DISCUSSION**

On **Wednesday**, **June 12**, **at 6:30 pm**, there will be an in-person book discussion at the church. We'll meet in Fellowship Hall, and talk about the second half of the book (chapter 6-10). We encourage everyone to join us, regardless of how much you've read or not read in the book. Our first book discussion generated some great conversation about faith, politics and our relationships with one another. The book we're reading is "Thou Shalt Not Be A Jerk: A Christian's Guide to Engaging Politics" by Eugene Cho. This book, published in 2020, and our discussions, will not endorse any candidates or political parties, so no matter where you may find yourself on the vast spectrum of thought, there is room for all voices.



Here is a summary from the publisher, David C Cook: According to Eugene Cho, Christians should never profess blind loyalty to a party. Any party. But they should engage with politics, because politics inform policies which impact people. Cho encourages readers to remember that hope arrived—not in a politician, system, or great nation—but in the person of Jesus Christ. With determination and heart, Cho urges readers to stop vilifying those they disagree with—especially the vulnerable—and asks Christians to follow Jesus and reflect His teachings.

We have copies of this book at the church that can be checked out to read in the library room across from the church office. Please sign the check-out sheet when you take a book, and sign it back in when you are finished so more people may enjoy the book. "Thou Shalt Not Be A Jerk" is also available in paperback and as an e-book (Kindle) through many retailers and bookstores. If you have any questions, contact Heather Casiano.

#### Purpose:


Coordinate Love INC Clearinghouse activities.

#### Responsibilities:

- Recruit, train, and supervise intake volunteers to:
  - Answer incoming calls and listen compassionately to callers.
  - Gather and record vital information regarding clients expressed needs and root causes
  - Verify all information relevant to meeting the client need.
  - Conduct follow-up calls to clients.
  - Maintain client confidentiality.
  - Keep volunteer time records.
- 2. Review information gathered by volunteers during the intake and analyze.
- 3. Determine how to resource client needs and ensure needs to be referred are manageable and specific.
- 4. Maintain accurate client records.
- Maintain accurate records of agency services and maintain referral relationships.
- 6. Maintain accurate records of church ministries and volunteer individual resource inventories.
- Maintain referral relationships with Love INC partner churches, church ministries, and support Church Ministry Coordinators / Love INC Ministry Coordinators.
- 8. Produce Clearinghouse activity reports.
- 9. Conduct Intakes as needed.
