This month the *Matthew* 25 spotlight is shining upon our Ministry of Mission! They have been diligently raising funds and identifying ways to make use of resources to help those most in need in our community and across the world. They also continue to address hunger locally by preparing meals for the shelter and distributing food from the pantry. Thank you for all that you do to serve those in need and to respond to our *Matthew* 25 call to eradicate systemic poverty!

As a reminder, this section of the Larger View is here to highlight our embodiment of the *Matthew* 25 initiative to which we have committed. This initiative is focused on the following:

- **Building congregational vitality** by challenging people and congregations to deepen their faith and get actively and joyfully engaged with their community and the world.
- **Dismantling structural racism** by advocating and acting to break down the systems, practices and thinking that underlie discrimination, bias, prejudice and oppression of people of color.
- **Eradicating systemic poverty** by working to change laws, policies, plans and structures in our society that perpetuate economic exploitation of people who are poor.

If you notice somebody or somebodies living into the *Matthew* 25 call, please let Pastor Tyler know so that they can be highlighted in this section!



Trustees report:

- Outdoor work completed: A lawn service was hired to do garden cleanup, fertilizing and weed control, and lawn maintenance. The tree in garden has been trimmed.
- Air Conditioners: Many of the air conditioners for the sanctuary are not working. Estimates are being gathered to determine how to proceed with either repair (if possible) or replacement.
- There are building use forms available for members and non-members for use of the building. A new fee schedule for usage has also been created.

COVID mitigations and protocols:

Session determined that present protocols should remain the same as determined last month with mask-wearing up to the individual. The sanctuary will remain ventilated and communion/ offering plates will not be passed. Passing of the peace will remain socially distanced. Fellowship after worship will continue.

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Technology in the fellowship hall:

The technology in the fellowship hall is being upgraded as the projector is no longer working with our newer devices, so Session agreed that a flat screen TV will be purchased and wall-mounted to connect with YouTube, DVDs, and computers. This can be used for programs for the entire congregation and youth.

Fundraisers:

- Soup sales have been successful and will continue May 8 and May 22.
- Our sneaker campaign continues to bring in some money each month. Thanks to everyone who has brought used tennis shoes. Let your family and friends know that we are still collecting those old sneakers.
- We are thinking of participating in a community craft fair in Highland in November. If you are a crafter and interested in making items for the craft fair, let Jean Smith know.

Outdoor worship service:

Outdoor worship services this summer will take place on the third Sundays of June, July, and August.

Welcome Network

Elder Cheryl Steen and Rev. Orem attended a brunch for the Welcome Network, a local organization welcoming immigrants and providing support and housing for them. Ways that our church can help be a support for those families is being investigated.

Bold Ideas

What the Church Means to Me

Church has been an integral part of my life from the time I was dedicated as an infant in a Baptist church in Chicago. When my parents moved our family to Indiana, we attended the Methodist Church in Chesterton where I was baptized and went through confirmation class. When I went to Purdue to pursue my degree in elementary education, one of the first things I did was to find a church. For 4 years I occupied a pew on Sunday mornings but did little else; classes and extracurricular activities consumed my time. Fred and I were married in the Methodist Church where I grew up and eventually we began attending First Presbyterian Church of Highland. Fred's parents were members and we decided to join as well. Both of our children were baptized as infants and we attended services and activities together, both as a couple (Young Marrieds) and as a family (Synod School).

I have always felt welcomed in this church. It brings me great comfort to feel the presence of the Holy Spirit in this place. Psalm 100 tells us to "Worship the Lord with gladness" and that is exactly how I feel when I walk through the doors on Sunday mornings. This is where I feel safe participating in discussions whether on Session or in a Bible study group; where I meet fellow music-lovers to rehearse anthems and other music; where I am refueled for the week with scripture, prayers, hymns, and words of inspiration; and where I can participate in opportunities to be the heart, hands, and feet of Jesus Christ.

As a congregation we are blessed with many shared gifts and talents, with people who have stepped up and said "yes" to serving on committees, boards, and ministries, with a beautiful building and outdoor space in which to worship, and a future that is bright with promise. I cannot imagine belonging anywhere else.

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BYOB

BYOB, or Bring Your Own Bible, is taking a short break from the usual format in May. Instead of discussing Scripture passages from the worship service, we will be taking a more in-depth look at the chapters in the book "Be the Bridge" by Latasha Morrison. Everyone is welcome to join us on Wednesday evenings online on Zoom, from 7-8 pm. You do not have to have read the book to participate in these discussions.

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BRIDGE BUILDING BOOK EVENT

On **Sunday**, **May 1st**, **at 4 pm**, there will be a book discussion event and time of fellowship, hosted by the ministry of Faith Development. We'll be talking about the book, <u>"Be The Bridge: Pursuing God's Heart for Racial Reconciliation"</u>, by Latasha Morrison. We'll meet in the fellowship room, and light refreshments will be served. All ages are invited. We encourage everyone to attend, even if you haven't had a chance to read the book prior to the event. This book discussion is open to the public, so please bring your friends and neighbors!

Latasha Morrison's book explores the historical complexities of racism and what racial reconciliation can look like in our communities today. She expertly applies biblical principles, such as lamentation,



confession, and forgiveness, to lay the framework for restoration and help shift perspectives. The author believes that change begins with an honest conversation among a group of Christians willing to give a voice to unspoken hurts, hidden fears, and mounting tensions. We'd love for you to be part of this conversation.



Each Wednesday evening in May we'll take a more in -depth look at specific chapters and sections of the book, and discuss possible steps forward in the important work of racial reconciliation.
