
#### **SESSION**

- The Nominating Committee for electing officers for the boards and committees will begin meeting soon. The members of the Nominating Committee are: Charlotte Abernethy, Anettia Holmes (both are members elected from the congregation), Elder Lois Fozkos, Trustee Jeffery Savage, and Deacons Pam Porter/Barb Morton.
- Session voted to hold a called Congregational meeting on December 10<sup>th</sup> after worship for elections and amendments to the Endowment Guidelines.
- Session approved the 2024 Budget Schedule.
- Rev. Tyler and the elders then went over the calendar of events for the remaining Sundays of this year. Here are some of the significant dates to remember:
  - NOV 5 Communion and All Saints' Day
  - NOV 12 Stewardship Sunday
  - NOV 19 Commitment Sunday (return pledge cards), lunch after worship, Mission Bake sale
  - NOV 26 Hanging of the Greens
  - DEC 3 First Sunday of Advent and Communion
  - DEC 10 Choral Cantata, Congregational Meeting, Cookies and Caroling
  - <u>DEC 24</u> Christmas Eve morning and evening services
- A Spirit Wear fundraiser was discussed. Elder Tracy Oprea is organizing this sale, and there is be an online store where items can be purchased. T-shirts will be \$27, and Hooded Sweatshirts will be \$40.
- We are participating in a craft fair on Nov. 4<sup>th</sup> at St. James the Lesser Catholic Church in Highland from 9 am 3 pm. Come support our crazy crafters and our church!

#### **TRUSTEES**

- The funding for the heating/cooling furnace for the Fellowship Hall has been secured from an Endowment Grant and Endowment General Fund money. This project is to be completed by the end of the year.
- The second phase involves installation of new air conditioning units in the sanctuary and should begin in the spring. To help with funding for this, we received a \$30,000 grant from the Smock Foundation, thanks to Pastor Tyler's grant writing abilities. Also, we just received a generous gift of \$14,000 from the Hammond First Presbyterian Church to help with some of the cost of this project. Session will be discussing additional ways to be raise money to cover the entire cost.

- Prayers and concerns were offered for those in our congregation experiencing times of grief and illness.
- The prayer list was updated and a sunshine bag is being prepared to deliver.
- The prayer shawl ministry will meet on October 24<sup>th</sup>. Two shawls were dedicated in September during worship.
- Gladys' Table lasagna meals were prepared on October 21st to be delivered to homebound members of our congregation.
- The Blessing Box continues to be monitored by the Deacons. The congregation is encouraged to bring non-perishable items for the box.
- Kiwanis prepared 40 bag lunches for Sackurday on September 30th.

# Generosity of Spirit Spirit of Generosity: ".....making sure everyone is well....."

In 1847 the US agent for the Choctaw nation spoke to tribal members about the Irish hunger crisis known as the "potato famine." He outlined the poor living conditions and abject poverty endured by those working in the land tenure system. When the potato crop failed and government assistance failed, over a million farmers and their families perished. Two million more were forced to leave Ireland to survive. The Choctaw listeners were moved by this. Ten years before, they had been forced from their land to follow the "Trail of Tears" to Oklahoma where they, too, became dispossessed, impoverished immigrants. And yet, after the meeting, they raised between \$174 and \$710 (actual amount lost to history) to help. The funds were used to purchase food for those impacted in Ireland. When asked about this history, Waylon Gary White Deer, a Choctaw artist, replied "We heard about another people who were suffering much as we had suffered and so we must help them." He continued, "Compassion, giving, making sure everyone is well...is what being Choctaw is all about."

The Irish remembered this act of generosity. In 2018 The Irish Prime Minister visited the Choctaw Nation in Oklahoma. While there he recounted Ireland's gratitude for that gift from many years ago and announced the establishment of a scholarship program for Choctaw students to study in Ireland. In 2020, when many Native Americans were particularly hard hit by Covid, the Irish donated nearly \$2,000,000 for their relief. When donors were asked to comment, they said: "it's only fair", "repaying an Irish debt", "for kindness shown to Ireland", "we remember"...

This is but another example of acts of compassion, generosity and kindness taking on lives of their own and growing beyond imagination! Never underestimate the power of the "Generosity of Spirit" and the "Spirit of Generosity." (A summary of an article by Richard Grant from the September-October issue of the "Smithsonian")


