Dear All,

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

1) kronos—chronological time as we mark it, and 2) kairos—God's time. Thankfully God is working through kairos time, because it is hard to keep track of the kronos with all of our schedules so radically changed!

Looking at kronos time, though, I recently realized that I have now completed two years as your pastor. What a blessing these two years have been! In the spirit of Thanksgiving, let me say thank you to all of you for being such a blessed community of faith and support during my time here thus far! Because of your passion for the Gospel, your love for God and neighbors, and your generosity of spirit we have persisted through a very difficult time and will continue to do so! I fully trust that in God's Kairos time, all shall be well!

I mentioned above, your generosity of spirit. By that, I mean your willingness to share God's grace and love so freely with all. This month, we are embarking on our yearly stewardship campaign with the theme of *Shining Our Light in These Times*. We decided upon this theme because we see that we, as a congregation, are indeed bearing God's light in times that have been particularly difficult and because we need to keep doing so! I encourage you to consider how your generosity of spirit can translate to a spirit of generosity. Last month, I mentioned that we have chosen to become a *Matthew* 25 congregation, focused on building congregational vitality, dismantling structural racism, and eradicating systemic poverty. I encourage you all to consider how focusing on this call can help us to shine God's light even more brightly in these times. As part of this initiative, you will periodically see *Matthew* 25 spotlights in which various ministries of our congregation or actions taken by our members are recognized and uplifted for the ways in which they are living into the *Matthew* 25 call. If you have witnessed actions or taken actions yourselves that fit into this call, please send me an email or give me a call to let me know about it!

November is a cornucopia of activities in the life of the Church. As we continue in the reality of the pandemic, we will seek to maintain important touchstones as best as possible but will also have to be flexible in how we go about things. In this full month, we will be celebrating All Saints' Day, Reformation Sunday, Thanksgiving, and the beginning of Advent. The first Sunday in November is a particularly packed day with our All Saints' candle lighting memorial, Holy Communion, and a fellowship event after church celebrating the start of the Protestant Reformation just over 500 years ago. If you plan on joining us for the fellowship event, please bring a sack lunch to enjoy! If you are unable to join in person but would like to participate, you can do so! For our candle lighting, please send names of loved ones who have passed away over the past year so that we can memorialize them in the service. For Holy Communion, have elements ready at home to take along with us. For our Reformation celebration, we will send out some of the materials we develop.

Throughout the next several months, we will be keeping an eye on everything happening around us and following any new guidelines or orders that come from local, state, and national authorities. Stay healthy, stay connected, and stay faithful! You all are in my prayers.

I close with these words of thanksgiving from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians: "I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus, for in every way you have been enriched in him, in speech and knowledge of every kind—just as the testimony of Christ has been strengthened among you—so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ" (*I Corinthians* 1:4-7).

## **October Shelter Report**

We are still observing the Covid-19 rules set by the government so we don't get to see the residents. They are doing their own serving and clearing. That means we don't get any of our containers returned for using again. This in turn increases our costs. We also are doing 20 extra box meals for the transient people that are unable to go into the shelter and eat as they were used to doing. I have been fortunate enough to get cases of fruit, etc. from St. Timothy's Church in Griffith to help supplement their diets. A special thank you for their sharing.

We have received two donors that aren't members of our church who have been very generous. Christine Small and Kaz Smailis have donated money just for the purchase of food and supplies for the shelter. A huge thank you to them. It certainly helps our budget from Mission.

The usual 5 were on hand to put the meal together. Jamie Ham, Judy Toren, Sandy Higgins, Sherry Higgins and myself. It is such a blessing to have such a dedicated band of workers show up every second Saturday. We are also thankful for John Toren and Jeff Savage. They are the muscle that does the loading and are our escorts to the shelter every month. Hats off to both of them!!!




# Salvation Army Red Kettle Campaign
