

Dear All,

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ! When I think about October, the overarching theme is change. This is the month in which we most sharply feel the changes of the autumnal season, with temperatures dropping and frost appearing. This is the month in which we most vividly see the changing colors of the trees, with greens becoming reds, oranges, yellows, and browns. This is the month in which we most loudly hear the changing habitats of migratory birds, with their V formations honking overhead. This is the month in which we most potently smell the changing fragrances of the great outdoors, with the smells of freshness giving way to the smells of harvest. I will always be a farm boy at heart, and so no matter where I may be in the world these changes fill my imagination and soul for October.

As I write this letter, I am reminded that exactly one year ago in October I was officially called by you all to be the pastor of this Spirit-filled community of the faithful. Wow! How time flies! This has certainly been a year of change and growth for me, as I have come to know ministry in this specific context for such a time as this. I know that it has also been a year of change for all of you. There is always a process of adjustment, compromise, and challenge when a new pastor comes to town. Not only do you have to get used to a different personality, but you also have to get used to changes in theological teaching, worship design, preaching methods, pastoral care, and leadership style.

Autumnal transformation makes it clear that change processes are not always easy. Along with the beauty mentioned above, this season in our yearly cycle is also marked by death and decay. Fallen leaves and harvested crops have reached the end of their lives, and all the land prepares itself for the dormancy of winter. I am fully aware that the changes we have gone through together likewise have not always been easy. We have navigated loss and grief. We have had difficult conversations about the world today. We have seen congregational trends of membership and stewardship that can feel concerning. I am sure that there have also been some hard truths or questions raised by changes that I am not even aware of.

Through all of this change, both beautiful and painful, I encourage us to remember that the autumnal season lays the foundations for new life, as winter seals in the fertilizing nutrients of the leaves and the chaff. As the people of the Resurrection, may we always live into this truth and take heart!

The trustees would like to introduce Vicky Brann as our church's IT consultant. Vicky has worked in IT for 32 years. She is an independent consultant and is CISCO certified (CCNA) - a highly sought-after certification in the IT industry.

Vicky started consulting for our church in January when Pastor Tyler's computer was running slow. We asked Vicky to determine if we needed to replace the 7-year-old computer. Vicky's analysis was that she could save his computer by wiping it clean and reinstalling the operating system and adding additional memory. By doing this we could get an additional few years out of it instead of replacing the computer at significant cost.

Vicky's next project for us was to do a feasibility study to get WIFI throughout our facility. You might remember an article in the Larger View about this project which was completed earlier this year.

Another big project Vicky tackled was to move our email server from GoDaddy, which hosts our website, to Microsoft Office 365. This move stabilized our email system, gave us access to hundreds of additional email accounts, and allows us to use the cloud to store documents.

Vicky was also consulted in replacing our copier when the lease expired in July and pointed us to a local Office Supply company that could compete in quality with our existing copier while reducing our cost significantly.

Vicky has helped to troubleshoot computer issues as they've occurred. For example, recently Kristen's computer was making a strange sound. Vicky determined the noise was from the fan inside the computer and replaced the fan housing.

We are very happy to have Vicky's expertise to maintain our computer equipment, to be our knowledge base and technical guru for all IT related issues, and to guide us in the continually changing world of IT.

A total of 55 hungry clients dined on Barbecued pork sandwiches. 16 lbs. of meat was supplied by the Episcopal Church of Griffith from their food pantry. The usual sides accompanied the pork: baked beans, Italian pasta salad filled with fresh vegetables, milk, hard boiled eggs, and oatmeal apple crisp. Message of Faith: This is an invitation to become partners with the Deacons in a social responsibility to meet a growing need in our faith community.

Why: Work schedules, non drivers, and limited physical abilities of Deacons cannot meet the needs of a growing community of the elderly or disabled. Volunteers are needed to assist on an as needed basis.

Mission: The mission of this task oriented program is to provide a service for the elderly and disabled who have either limited or no realistic means of transportation to get to the grocery stores, local doctors, dentists, pharmacies, and church within the congregation of FPCH. This can be accomplished with task oriented volunteers.

How: Coordinate and maintain a roster of volunteers willing to transport or aid in the delivery of pharmaceuticals and/or provide needed transportation.

Outcome: The proposed program will allow non-driving seniors of FPCH to have available transportation available to attend to quality of life and medical needs.

"Some day you may need help with transportation. Can you help us to get this service going? If I asked you for a ride, would you help me out? I knew I could count on you."

The Deacons are looking for volunteers to help them with picking up medications and driving members to worship. Sign-up sheets can be found in the Narthex and Fellowship Hall.


