
Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

Somehow September is already upon us. Traditionally, this is a very busy time for our congregation. September marks our kickoff of a flurry of activities following Summer break. Although things may take very different forms, this year is no exception! We may not hear our choir singing, but we will hear the ringing music of a reinstated bell choir. We may not have in-person fellowship activities, but we will have new opportunities for group discussion online. We may not have many worship services in our building-based sanctuary, but we will continue to worship God in the sanctuary of our garden and the sanctuaries of our homes. Our boards, ministries, and committees have been hard at work making sure that we continue as a faithful congregation full of faithful people in creative ways!

We recently made the journey from *Genesis* into *Exodus* in our explorations of Scripture on Sunday mornings. As we move through *Exodus*, we will encounter people who are experiencing the worst of what the world has to offer and the best of what God has to offer. We will hear of their struggles to break free from slavery, their struggles to find their way in disorienting landscapes and mindscapes, their struggles to trust each other in community, and their struggles to decolonize their hearts and minds. We will also hear of God's actions to liberate, God's actions to guide, God's actions to build community, and God's actions to enlighten.

We certainly are not in the same situation as the Hebrews in the story of *Exodus*, but we are indeed in a season of great struggle. Pandemics of COVID-19 and racial injustice plague us like the plagues of Egypt. Human-made disasters and human-influenced natural disasters reflect the terrors of violence, flood, and fire that persist throughout the stories of the Old Testament. Bitter divisions based on national and party loyalty evoke the bitter factions that formed as the Israelites wandered through the wilderness. As we continue to make our way through these struggles, I urge us as a congregation to pay attention to the particular ways in which God is acting for our welfare and for the good of all Creation. I urge us to grasp onto those actions when we identify them and to share them with each other and with all whom we encounter.

As an example, I invite everyone to consider God's actions in guiding us to worship safely over the past couple of months. As we have felt the breeze blowing across our skin, as we have heard the birds' chirps ringing through our ears, as we have smelled the aromas of flowers filling our noses, and as we have seen eyes smiling above masks, it has become undeniably clear that God is holding us in a loving embrace along with all of Creation in this season!

Behind the Scenes

You probably know and expect that the ministries at First Presbyterian Church of Highland have been very active in responding to managing our financial resources during the last 6 months of this Covoid pandemic. Costs have been managed by the ministries to the most effective level by either reducing or eliminating non-essential costs, recognizing the need to be good stewards of the church's finances.

What you probably are not aware of is that during the pandemic we identified a few programs that we had to proactively enlist into by understanding the possibilities of the benefits and conditions of the programs. The three programs that we investigated, applied for and were approved to access the benefits were:

Dues Relief offered by the Presbytery of Wabash Valley

Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) element of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act) offered by the U. S. Government, administered by the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA)

Connect Through Tech Grant offered by the Center for Congregations

Summary of these programs:

- Dues Relief- Saved cost of approximately \$3,300-Our Presbytery waived the need for FPCH to disburse approximately \$1,100 per month for 3 months for our required payments to the Presbyterian Board of Pensions.
- Under the Paycheck Protection Program, our bank loaned FPCH \$11,500 to cover payroll and utility cost during the crisis. At some point, we are accountable to document to the bank that this amount properly was expended according to the program. Satisfaction by the bank will result in the forgiveness of the loan which results in our cash reserves being increased by the \$11,500 forgiveness of the loan.
- Connect Through Tech Grant-Received \$5,000 based on the use of these funds to purchase new technology resources to provide on-line worship services. FPCH purchased a new computer, camera and miscellaneous equipment for playback of church services, moving us toward live streaming. We were required to come up with 10% of the project cost.

We will continue to monitor future possibilities that might be offered due to the continuing pandemic and look for other ways to reduce or eliminate cost or availability of unexpected funds that may be made available to us.

Your church still counts on its members to stay current in their giving. May God continue to hear our prayers and provide us the financial sustenance to continue our ministry.

This online gathering is open to all who are interested in participating, so feel free to invite friends even if they have no current affiliation with this church. Children and youth are welcome to participate as well but must have a parent/guardian present online with them.

After all their hard work in the mornings, the youth enjoyed themselves by playing games in the park on Thursday and being treated to lunch and pool time at the home of Jay and Jean Smith on Friday.
