A harvest of reminiscing by Sana Forest

As I sat in my garden recently, I could hear the sound of the agricultural machinery working furiously in the field beyond my hedge as the farmer gathered in his crop. That sound caused me to reflect on harvest thanksgiving and what it meant to me as a child. Growing up in a relatively rural area in the late 40s /early 50s harvest was a very important time for schools, churches and community. For the farmers It was a time of celebrating and being thankful for a good harvest. For those people lucky enough to have a garden or allotment they were cheered by all their home produce – always a bit of rivalry over the tomatoes and the cucumbers! As children we looked forward to the school assembly harvest service and the Sunday School harvest thanksgiving. What set them apart from normal services of course was the fact that we all took bundles of our home grown produce to the services, supplemented by tinned and packaged goods, home made jams and jellies all of which were artistically displayed in front of assembled school children or congregations.

So much of what I described, thankfully, has not changed, we still take harvest gifts to church; it's the way that we disperse this cornucopia of goodies that is different in this modern age. In the 50's we school kids would help to make up "goodie-bags" and then set off round the doors of anyone who was on "the list". The list had the names of the elderly, infirm, unemployed, and those who were a bit less well-off financially and who gratefully welcomed our chapping at the door and our cheery greeting of "Happy Thanksgiving".

Fast forward to 2025 and first and foremost safe-guarding of our children prohibits us from turning them loose to knock on doors with bags of food. How do we overcome this? The Foodbank is the answer; the Foodbank is like a huge equivalent of how we made up our goodie bags. It takes the produce in and through their procedure is able to ensure that those less fortunate get what they need. The other thing that has changed is the kind of produce we hand in to the foodbank, Obviously fresh/perishable foods are not ideal so the Foodbank asks for tinned or packaged foods that have a decent shelf-life.
