#### A NOTE FROM VOXLAB

"You follow the same paths of thought as before. Only, they appear strewn with roses."

-Walter Benjamin

We're back again in Hanover for the 10<sup>th</sup> annual VoxLab. Back in the Bentley, back on the green, back in the same office in Shakespeare Alley where I first interviewed for Acting 1 my freshman fall. It's a very comforting cycle to repeat, if a little poignant this year knowing that the Hop will soon close for renovations.

For alumni artists, VoxLab offers the escape that any residency offers: step away from your life for a little bit, and focus solely on your art. But what makes it unique is the chance to come back to where we were young, where we started out as artists, before we had as many cares or responsibilities. There's something in the air here, the sense-memory of prop storage and the echo of the stage in the Bentley. I have a theory that it breeds a certain *kind* of creativity: maybe we can access a little bit of that "beginner's mind" if we return to where we might not have known any better.

For students, VoxLab is a chance to not just see, but help *make* brand new theater, and make it with people who were—not too long ago just like them. The alumni artists worked in the same spaces, ate at the same dining halls, slept in the same dorms. In fact, this year, almost all of the alumni artists worked with Vox when they were themselves sophomores. It's important that an '05 and a '24 can sit in the rehearsal room and talk about the shows they've done in the Bentley. It gives the '24 a chance to see how their artistic life might unfold, and that a life in the arts filled with exciting, new theater, is possible. I've always appreciated the poetic aspect to the residency: Alumni come back to an old place to develop something new, and in doing so, show current students a way forward. Perhaps it's just me, but historical cycles feel more present these days, and the three pieces at VoxLab this year feel scarily relevant. An adaptation of a 100-year-old play, shot through with Jewish mysticism, shows us our new death in the time of COVID. A surrealist comedy enlists the Cat in the Hat to dramatize our eternal return. And a musical about a mid-century abortionist gives a preview of the coming decades. Go back to look forwards.

We could never have made it to 10 years without the unflagging support of the Dartmouth Theater Department, and the wonderful professors and employees that have made this place a home-away-fromhome. Brianna Parry, Scott Henkels, Janine Thoma, Sharonna Henderson, and Lila Hovey '23 have all been enormously helpful this summer. And a special thanks to Laura Edmondson, Jamie Horton, and community members Ellen Bald and Fiona Heaney, for providing housing to our small group of artists. We truly couldn't have done it without you.

And finally, to close the summer, they spend several weeks in August with the leading actors, playwrights, and directors of the renowned New York Theatre Workshop during its annual Dartmouth residency, a beloved tradition now in its 31st season that has brought dozens of Pulitzer and Tony Award-winning artists to campus over the years.

We call this collection of adventures the 'Summer Theater Lab,' and we are so pleased to be able to share it with you in person again this year (we will never again take that statement for granted) despite the ongoing challenges of COVID. We would also like to acknowledge at this time the remarkable contributions of everyone in this department – students, staff, and faculty. Their patience, tireless inventiveness, and truly exceptional work in the face of adversity over the past few years has made all the difference.

The Department of Theater is grateful for the generous support of President Phil Hanlon, the Office of the Provost, Associate Dean Sam Levey and the Dean of Faculty Office, the Jack and Dorothy Byrne Foundation, and the Monahon Family Theater Fund, all of whom have helped make the 10th season of VoxLab possible. Kate Mulley '05 (book, lyrics, direction) is an internationally acclaimed playwright, librettist/lyricist, producer, and dramaturg whose work explores gender, power, place and desire through a feminist, and often historical, lens. Her musical Razorhurst, written with Andy Peterson, was commissioned by and had its world premiere at Luna Stage (New Jersey) and its Australian

premiere at the Hayes Theatre in Sydney. Kate has been an Artist in Residence at Soaring Gardens Artist Retreat (Pennsylvania), Corsicana Artist and Writer Residency (Texas), Arteles Creative Center (Finland), Catwalk Institute (New York) and Nantucket Island School of Design and the Arts (Massachusetts). Kate has been a Guest Artist at Dartmouth, Montclair State University, Studio Tisch, and New York Film Academy and a Playwriting Fellow at Shanghai Theatre Academy where her play The Tutor was produced and published in Mandarin. Kate is a writing mentor with Girls Write Now and the PEN Prison Writing mentorship program. She graduated from Dartmouth with a degree in Theater and History, received an MA in Writing for Performance at Goldsmiths College, London, and an MFA in Playwriting from Columbia. Kate cofounded Vox Theater with Matthew Cohn and Thom Pasculli in 2012.



Tina deVaron (music, lyrics) is a jazz performer-composer and fixture on the NYC scene with performances at the Carlyle, Waldorf-Astoria, Russian Tea Room, Rainbow Room, etc. Her songs have charted #1 on Billboard's Gospel charts and #2 on Club/Dance. Her musical PERFECT MOTHERS was named one of NYMF's Top Ten Shows to See. Under direction

of Gretchen Cryer, she's writing an autobiographical solo piece, FINGERNAILS IN THE SIDE OF THE CLIFF. She has won both Catwalk and Soaring Gardens residencies to work on "Female Complaints," the musical she and collaborator Kate Mulley are bringing to VoxLab, about the life of notorious San Francisco abortionist Inez Burns. Albums: IF MAMA AIN'T HAPPY, WATER OVER STONES, and TUCKERMAN'S RAVINE. Her work has garnered raves from The New York Times, Anne LaMott, Lisa Belkin, Sandy Kenyon, Tulis McCall, and CBS-TV.
