Intertwine: A Game for Creating Dance Connections

Embark on an immersive journey through dance history to discover intricate threads that connect *Iconic Dance Makers*

Objective: Create an Intertwined list featuring 8 Iconic Dance Makers.

Setup

- Each player receives 2 cards, spotlighting key historical figures from the <u>Iconic Dance Makers card deck</u>.
- <u>Dance Maker Profile Page</u>: a dedicated space to jot down *5 essential facts and answer 6 intriguing* questions about each Iconic Dance Maker. Each player will need their own copy.
- Display Quick Reference Sheet for all to see.
- o <u>Intertwine Ledger</u> serves as an organizational tool. Players utilize it to visually chart and document connections between the Iconic Dance Makers. Each player or team will need one copy.

Gameplay

Step 1: Sorting Threads

The player becomes an "Expert" on the first two Iconic Dance Makers.

Using the **Dance Maker Profile Page**, record information for each of the first two cards.

5 Facts: Discover essential details about each Iconic Dance Maker.

6 Questions: Explore their legacy and significant contributions to dance history.

The 7 Intertwine Connections List

<u>Influencers</u>: Find connections such as mentor-student relationships or shared professional endeavors.

<u>Masterminds</u>: Identify Dance Makers who are founders of dance schools, companies, or festivals.

<u>Innovations and Legacies</u>: Pair Dance Makers who wrote books or pioneered new ways to teach dance.

Common Causes: Connect dancers whose work is based on similar cultural or social interests.

Style Shifters: Link Dance Makers with overlapping experiences in other art forms besides their primary style.

Exact Opposite: Connect two Dance Makers with contrasting viewpoints or styles.

<u>Perfectly Matched</u>: Imagine and create a partnership between Dance Makers based on similar attributes, even if they never met in reality.

Step 2: Intertwine the First Two

Choose from the *Connections List* to create a link between your first two *Iconic Dance Makers* and then record it on your *Intertwine Ledger*.

Step 3: Braid and Weave - Make Connections

Interact with other players and collaborate in small groups or pairs:

- 1. One player at a time should SHARE overviews of their first two **Iconic Dance Makers**.
- 2. Other players should listen carefully to decide how they can connect one of their dance makers to one that is discussed. Discussion will lead to a SWAP of cards to represent the newly made connection.
- 3. Each player should document their new connections on their own Intertwine Ledger.
- 4. Repeat the SHARE and SWAP process with other players.

The game concludes once players successfully <u>Intertwine</u> a network of <u>8 Iconic</u> <u>Dance Makers</u>, showcasing creative connections within the tapestry of dance history.

Presentation Ideas:

- Allow individuals to present their Intertwine Ledgers to the group and lead a discussion related to the choices made.
- Create a gallery of the completed Intertwine Ledger pages and allow players to view, discuss and choose connections that they feel are creative and noteworthy.

Game Play Optional Ideas:

- Monochromatic: Use only 1 of the Intertwine Connections to connect 8 Iconic Dance Makers.
- **Kaleidoscope**: An extended assignment: Find a pair of connected **Dance Makers** as an example for each of the **7 Intertwine Connections**.

Extra Effort Learning Ideas:

- **Upgrade your Info**: With permission, do a web search for additional information about your Iconic Dance Makers and add that to your **Dance Maker Profile** notes.
- Extra Ribbons: You may find that the cards include names of other significant dance artists. Use approved web sources to create your own Iconic Dance Maker card for that person or dance group.





Quick Reference Sheet

Sorting Threads: 5 Facts

Life Span: Dates for birth/ death

Dance Identity: genre(s) of dance for which pioneer is most well-known.

On the Scene: What are the production types where you'd find the work of this Dance Maker?

<u>Talent Stack</u>: What are the significant roles/jobs of this Dance Maker?

Era of Influence: Define timeframe that reflects when this dance maker was most successful and popular. (hint: look at the famous works and then choose a range of years)

Sorting Threads: 6 Questions

Dance Foundation: Who are the teachers, schools, companies, professional associations of this Dance Maker?

Geo-tracking: Where are the significant locations (Countries, Cities) that were important to the career of this person?

<u>Unique Contributions</u>: What are some concepts that this dance pioneer developed ? (use of technology approaches to staging, teaching methods, book writing)

<u>Interactions</u>: List significant collaborations with other artists. They could be teachers, partners, co-stars, students, or collaborators. Also list any significant work in other areas of the performing arts.

<u>More than Movement</u>: Did this person focus on social or cultural issues, work in other fields besides dance? List them.

Iconic Achievements: List several famous works, special awards, founding of dance schools or companies, festivals, or professional associations.

Influencers: Find connections such as mentor-student relationships or shared professional endeavors.

<u>Masterminds</u>: Identify Dance Makers who are founders of dance schools, companies, or festivals.
