Staying Steady in Troubled Times

fortify our determination, and renew our commitment to work diligently for the common good. Fortunately, we have a robust network of fellow Democrats in Clinton County who are similarly focused on regaining balance and moving forward, despite the setbacks of the recent election. Potential Chaos in Lame Duck

By Tim Hughes. For the past two years, Michigan Democrats have enjoyed a "trifecta" of power with Governor Gretchen Whitmer and a Democratic majority in the House and Senate. This made it possible for Democrats to enact their priorities, even

without Republican support. That will change next year after Republicans won a majority in the state House on November 5.

That change of power sets the stage for a potentially lively "Lame Duck" session over the next month or so. "Lame Duck" is the period between the election and the next legislative session, when House Republicans take charge. It is a last chance for Democrats to use their control of the legislative process to enact their priorities.

Some of the potential topics under consideration include reproductive health privacy, banning firearms at polling places, police reform, charter school transparency, legislative ethics reform, expanding the state's hate crime law, unemployment and worker compensation issues, and a proposal from Governor Whitmer to create a new innovation fund with a research development tax credit. Republicans want to take action to change a court-ordered hike in the minimum wage and worker friendly changes to the state's sick leave law, but prospects for that are dim.

A key factor in the consideration of the Democratic agenda may be attendance. The Democratic majorities are tenuous. 56 votes are needed to pass a bill in the House and 20 in the Senate and the Democrats hold exactly that many seats. If one person is missing, they won't be able to pass anything on a party line vote. One Democratic legislator was elected to a Congressional seat and is shuttling between Washington DC and Lansing. A couple of House Democrats are saying they might not attend session if their priorities are not addressed.

"Lame Duck" sessions are frequently characterized by rapid consideration of complex subjects, late night sessions, and frequent flare-ups and hot tempers. The 2024 session may well follow that path. The legislature is currently scheduled to meet for 8 days in December. The Republican-controlled House will start session on January 8, 2025.



A Deep Dive into Clinton County's Election Results: What Can We Learn?

The results from this year's Presidential election were not what we were expecting and alerted us to the fact that there is still much work to be done to inform voters of the Democratic Party's message and goals. With that being said, analyzing the results of the election will be key in the months ahead. Let's take a dive into Clinton County's official, canvassed election results.

 Regarding overall voter turnout, there were roughly 2,100 more voters in 2024 than 2020 in Clinton County, but the 2024 turnout represented

а smaller percentage (roughly 1%) of total registered voters than in 2020. ∎ In 2024, Kamala Harris received roughly 500 more votes than Biden did in 2020, but she still received а smaller percentage of the voter turnout than Biden did (roughly 1%). In 2024, Elissa Slotkin performed 0.3% better than

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Peters did in 2020. In 2024, Curtis Hertel received roughly 5% less votes than Slotkin did in 2022 (keep in mind, this was а Presidential election year VS а Midterm election). Analyzing the data between 2024 and 2020 would be difficult, as redistricting had not yet taken place. While our non-

incumbent Democratic County Commission candidates did not overcome their challengers, we maintained our two Democratic seats with Commissioners John Andrews and Dwight Washington getting reelected, which keeps our county board Republican majority at 5-2. Dwight's Republican opponent, however, has requested а recount, which will take place in early December.
