Mentorship 102

Our June class was a blast. We created a few kusamono (weeds in a tray), played with formal displays and mossed our trees in anticipation of the club show. We also worked on a few trees, probably for the last time this summer. Because our trees are in the development stage, we want to keep their foliage to generate trunk caliper and develop lots of roots. The saying goes, "roots mean shoots and shoots mean roots."

Our group decided to take a one month vacation. Not much work is happening in our bonsai collections. Japanese Black Pines are dropping their 3rd year needles. This is another indication that the new needles have hardened off. The juniper are beginning to move into their summer dormancy. We will need to watch their water needs carefully because of their fine roots. Not to wet, not to dry. A tricky dance that reminds me of the Hokey Pokey. Fertilizing is tapering off until the heat of summer passes.

We will meet the first Saturday in August from 10-2 at John's.

Display of the Month

We updated our Display of the Month agenda item in June. We wanted to incorporate more discussion and feedback around the display. Every month we will have a judge who will score the display and provide their reasoning to the group.

This month Zach Kent put up the display and Owen Reich did the judging. The tree was a cork oak and scored an 82 of 100. Owen suggested a few branches that could be removed to create a more open canopy. He also gave some ideas on how to drastically improve the design of the apex, which is the least developed portion of the tree.



We also looked at some alternative accents and one smaller tree. The general consensus was that a grass type accent may have been a more suitable choice, this would have created a little more variety in the display.

Notes for July

The heat is ON...

Summer Work

Over the years, I've noticed that I tended to do major work on the trees in the wintertime, but during the summertime, I wasn't advancing the trees as they grew. I am working on a Zelkova that I cut back to 15" from a 48" "finished" tree a few years ago. I let the branches go for several summers, cutting it back hard in the winter, and looked back to see that I really hadn't gotten anywhere. This year, I decided to stay on top of it; pinching every shoot from 5 leaves back to 2 leaves. Anytime a shoot stretched out to 5 leaves, I nipped it back to one or two. This year, the tree has responded with growth so rampant, that every day it needs a little attention, and it's getting quite full. It's still a few years away from a "finished" state, but had I worked on it this way a couple years ago, the tree would be further along.

Summertime work is just as important as the major operations that are carried out in the wintertime. Usually it's as simple keeping a pair of scissors on the bench and tidying up the trees as part of daily watering.

Here are some July tips:

- 1. Feed well, using plenty of Nitrogen and supplement with foliage drenches of fish or kelp fertilizer, add new cakes if necessary.
- 2. Watering becomes a twice-daily chore now, and you'll want to move tender trees into more sheltered locations. Beeches, hornbeams and azaleas that appreciated lots of sun up until now will start to wither in our heat.
- 3. Pines candles are mostly open by now, candle-cutting starts at the beginning of the month for Black Pines by removing ALL weak candles...found on lower and interior branches. Those branches get a head start putting out the second flush of growth before removing medium-strength candles 10 days later. Watch water needs now, we want them on the dry side as new growth emerges. 20 days after removing weak candles, remove the remaining, strong candles. Feed well and watch the tree put on a new flush of tiny needles!
