
We have enough in the bank to remain solvent until our lives return to some kind of new-normal and our meetings and activities can safely resume. Until then...

	<u>Tree Talk</u>	How to Respond
Coldest Month Avg. Low 28° Avg. High 46° Record Low 17° Record High 78°	Trees are dormant and using very little water. Some buds are beginning to swell. Pines are semi-dormant.	Most conifers and larger trees that are mulched in, protected from wind and have been outside all winter can tolerate 14°-18° temperatures by now. Check once a week for water needs. This is a great time to treat for overwintering pests and diseases. January is also a good month to repot healthy pines.
