

When should I call 101?

To report less urgent crime or disorder, to contact the police with general inquiries or to speak to a local officer. For example:

- If your car has been stolen
- If your property has been damaged
- Reporting a minor traffic incident
- Where you suspect drug use or dealing
- Giving police information about crime in your area.

How does it work?

Call 101 to contact Cheshire Police—24 hours a day, seven days a week.

How much does it cost?

Calls to 101 are free of charge.

Online Reporting

You can also use the online reporting service for Cheshire Police to report a crime, get help and advice and read the latest news and appeals through the force website www.cheshire.police.uk

In an emergency always dial 999

Police 999 call handlers strive to answer all calls within ten seconds.

You should dial 999 if:

- There is a danger to life
- Violence is used or threatened
- A serious crime (violent crime/burglary) is in progress or likely to occur
- A suspect for a serious crime is nearby
- There is a road traffic collision involving personal injury or danger to other road users
- A vulnerable person needs urgent attention.

Advice and best practice for Neighbourhood Watch Scheme members

Information sharing

- Before you share local information with others, make sure it is factually correct.
- Do not share information that identified victims, companies, or other personal details.
- Always use blind copy when forwarding emails onto members, and encourage others to do the same.

Passing suspicious information

As your coordinator, I encourage you to report anything you see or hear to the police:

- If it's unusual—note it down.
- Call 101 if you are concerned.
- Never put yourself, or others, at risk.

Let me know after you have made a report to the police.
