Three people arrested and drugs seized following partnership warrant in Macclesfield

Police have arrested three people and seized a quantity of illegal drugs following a partnership drugs warrant

At around 3pm today, Friday 3 March, officers from Cheshire Police and British Transport Police conducted a warrant at an address on on Moss Lane, Macclesfield.

While searching the properties officers discovered a quantity of Class A and B drugs and a large amount of cash.

Two men, aged 41 and 39, and a woman were arrested at the address on suspicion of being concerned in the supply of Class A and B drugs.

Sergeant Matt Bassirat, of Macclesfield Local Policing Unit, said:

"This operation is the result of a joint investigation by Cheshire Police and British Transport Police into county lines drug dealing in the Macclesfield area.

"As a results of our partnership work we've been able to removed a large amount of cannabis and cocaine from the street of Macclesfield.

"Action such as this shows how we are continuing in the fight against illegal drugs in our community and will continue to do all we can to disrupt these criminals."

Man jailed following fatal hit and run in Crewe

A man who left a mother of three to die following a collision in Crewe has been jailed.

Nathan Schultz appeared at Chester Crown Court today where he was sentenced to 10 years in prison.

The 23-year-old of Ellgreave Street, Burslem, was earlier found guilty of causing the death of Agnieszka Pocztowska's by dangerous driving following a four-day trial at Chester Crown Court.

Schultz had previously pleaded guilty to dangerous driving, failing to provide a specimen, driving without insurance, driving without a licence, two counts of failing to stop following a collision and two counts of failing to report a collision.

He also admitted causing Agnieszka's death whilst unlicensed and uninsured.



Following the sentencing Agnieszka's husband said:

"Agnieszka was a loving wife, my best friend of 21 years and a devoted mother to our three children.

"She was a beautiful and caring woman with a big heart, who was an amazing friend and was loved by everyone who ever met her.

"Our lives were torn apart by Agnieszka's death and nothing can ever repair that hole that has now been left.

"The sentence given today does not reflect the pain and heartbreak my family has endured since my loving wife's death.

"That being said I would like to thank the jury for reaching a guilty verdict and for allowing us to achieve some form of justice for the man who killed my wife, my love and my best friend.

"My thanks go to Cheshire Police for all their hard work gathering all the evidence to achieve the guilty verdict - the right result."

During the earlier trial the court heard how on Monday 14 September 2020, Schultz was driving a silver Ford Focus which was involved in two collisions with cyclists in Crewe.

The first incident occurred at 6.55am when he collided with Agnieszka Pocztowska's bicycle on Hungerford Road.

Schultz failed to stop and drove off towards the M6.

Just minutes later, he was involved in a second collision, knocking a cyclist off his bike on Crewe Road, Haslington. Once again, he failed to stop at the scene.

Thankfully, the rider from the second collision, a 53-year-old local man, escaped with just minor injuries.

However, 41-year-old Agnieszka, sustained fatal injuries and was pronounced dead a short time after the collision.

A manhunt was launched to trace the people responsible and following enquiries officers located the vehicle involved abandoned on a road in Trent Vale.

The car had extensive damage to the front windscreen along with three defective tyres.

Schultz was quickly identified as a suspect and arrested later that day. He was subsequently charged in connection with the incident.

Following Schultz's conviction, PC Robin Fisher, of the Serious and Complex Collision investigation unit, said:

"Agnieszka was a loving wife and a devoted mum to her three children."

"She left home that morning and was cycling to work, but as a result of the actions taken by Schultz and Wrench she never arrived.

"The pair are both responsible for her death, Schultz was driving the car that hit her and Wrench was sat in the passenger seat.

"They were both aware that they had hit Agnieszka, but rather than stop at the scene to help her, they purposefully chose to drive off and left her to die at the side of the road.

"Even after the second collision, they continued and thought that they could evade justice."

"But thankfully, after a complex and detailed investigation, we were able to locate and bring both men to justice for their actions that day."


In addition to his prison sentence, Schultz was also banned from driving for ten years. He will also be required to take an extended retest.

Inspector Helen Cooper added:

"It has taken more than two-years to get to this point, but I hope that the conclusion of this case will provide Agnieszka's family with some form of closure.

"The pain and suffering that they have endured is unimaginable and our thoughts are with them at this time.

"This has been one of the most difficult cases that I have ever dealt with in my whole career at Cheshire Constabulary and I would like to thank all of the officers who have been involved in this case and who have all played a role in helping to finally achieve justice for Agnieszka's family."



Drugs and weapons seized following police raid in Crewe

A man has been arrested by officers and a quantity of illegal drugs have been seized following a warrant in Crewe.

At around 12am on Thursday 2 March, officers conducted a drugs warrant at an address Billington Road, Warrington.

A man was found at an address, during a search of the property, officers discovered a large quantity of cannabis and drug paraphernalia as well as a number of weapons.

Following the warrant, the occupant, a 29-year-old man, was arrested on suspicion of being concerned in the supply of class B drugs (Cannabis).

He has since been released on bail, due to return to Middlewich Custody on Wednesday 3 May.

Sergeant Steve Tandy of Crewe Local Policing Unit, said:

"This operation has led to the removal of a sizeable quantity of illegal drugs and weapons from the streets of Crewe.

"Actions such as these shows how we are continuing to take the fight to drug dealers within our local community and across wider Cheshire – doing all we can to disrupt criminals.

"I would urge anyone who spots the signs of this criminal activity to contact us on 101 or via our website. No report is too small or too trivial – each one provides us with vital intelligence that assists us in the fight against this crime type."

Northwich man charged with drug and weapons offences

A man from Northwich has been charged with drugs offences following a raid in the town.

At around 9.25am on Wednesday 1 March, officers executed a warrant at an address on Thornly Green.

A 31-year-old man was arrested at the address on suspicion of drugs offences.

Samuel Watts, of Thornly Green, Northwich, was subsequently charged with being concerned in supply of class A (cocaine), being concerned in the supply of Class B drugs (cannabis) and possession of offensive weapon.

Watts appeared at Chester Magistrates Court on Thursday 3 March where he was released on conditional bail.

He is next set to appear at Chester Crown Court on Thursday 30 March.

Man charged in connection to Northwich cannabis farm

Officers investigating a cannabis farm in Northwich have charged a man in connection to the discovery.

Eduard Miceli was arrested at around 12.45pm on Thursday 2 March following after officers found a cannabis farm at an address on Walker Road, Winnington.

The 20-year-old, of Walker Road, Winnington, has since been charged with production of class B drugs (Cannabis).

Miceli appeared at Warrington Magistrates' Court on Saturday 4 March where he was remanded in custody.

He is next set to appear at Chester Crown Court on Monday 3 April.

Man banned from Chester city centre for five years following Criminal Behaviour Order



A man has been banned from Chester city centre for the next five years after being ordered to adhere to a Criminal Behaviour Order.

David Hill, of no fixed address but of Ellesmere Port, was handed the order at Chester Magistrates' Court on Tuesday 28 February.

His offences include drunk and disorderly, driving offences and theft of a motor vehicle.

The 55-year-old is now forbidden from entering Chester city centre.

The CBO, which was applied for by Chester City Beat Team, prohibits Hill from entering the city centre, bound by the attached map, except for attending any pre-arranged medical appointments on a specific route, and from having any open container of alcohol in a public place.



If Hill fails to follow the order, he is committing a criminal offence and could result in a recall to prison or a fine.

Inspector James Wilson said: "Hill is a prolific offender who has brought misery to Chester city centre so I thank the courts for granting us this order against him.

"A Criminal Behaviour Order is just one of the tools that we can use to further protect communities from harm, and we will continue to use everything we can to protect those who live, work and visit the city.

"Hill will be under the CBO until 28 February 2028 and if he fails to comply with any of the conditions, he could face up to five years behind bars."

Convicted murderer sentenced after absconding from prison

A convicted murderer who absconded from a prison in Lancashire has been jailed after he was captured in Scotland by officers from Cheshire Police.

Paul Gerrard sentenced to life in prison in 2009 after he was convicted of the murder of David Argent, in Runcorn.

The court heard how the 40-year-old absconded from HMP Kirkham, Lancashire, in December 2022.

Following, initial enquiries Lancashire police the case was passed over to Cheshire police.

An investigation was launched by detectives from the Serious and Organised Crime Unit, and after following extensive enquiries officers discovered intelligence suggesting that Gerrard had travelled to Scotland.

Officers from the unit were immediately deployed to the area and on Tuesday 17 January they located Gerrard hiding in a bed and breakfast in Irvine, Scotland.

He was immediately arrested and taken back to Lancashire where he was subsequently charged with escaping from lawful custody.

Gerrard appeared at Carlisle Crown Court on Thursday 16 February where he was sentenced to an additional 14 months in prison.

Detective Inspector Nick Henderson, of Cheshire Constabulary's Serious and Organised Crime Unit, said: "I welcome this sentence handed to Gerrard who is back behind bars where he belongs.

"This case demonstrates our determination to ensure that offenders are held accountable for their actions, with officers going well beyond the boundaries of Cheshire to keep our communities safe."



Officers out in force this weekend ahead of Chester FC fixture with Banbury United



Officers will be out in force this weekend ahead of Chester Football Club's clash against Banbury United.

For the upcoming Chester FC fixture on Saturday 4 March against Banbury United, fans will see a considerable policing presence to ensure that those attending the game can do so safely.

A dispersal order will be in place banning anyone from the city for up to 48 hours to tackle any disorder that may arise.

The dispersal order has been imposed under Section 35 of the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014, dispersal orders make it an offence for anyone to return to a specific area for up to 48 hours.

The area covered by the order is indicated by the highlighted mapped area which will be provided to anyone issued with a direction to leave.

Officers on the ground will also have extra stop and search powers, granted temporarily under Section 60 of the Criminal Justice and Public Order Act (1994).

The order means that officers can stop and search any person or vehicle they believe may be carrying weapons or causing serious violence in a particular area, whether or not they have any grounds of suspicion.

There will also be a Section 60 AA order in place which gives officers the power to request the removal and/or seize facial coverings or masks that are being used to conceal an identity and failure to do this could result in arrest.

These additional powers will be in place from 11am on Saturday 4 March and will expire at 6pm the same day.

Superintendent Andy Blizard, who is leading the operation this weekend, said: "These measures have been put in place to better protect fans from any disorder that may arise surrounding the fixture.

"It goes without saying but I want to remind fans to attend and watch the game peaceably and with consideration for those around them.

"We will not stand for any disorder and our officers will be on the look out for anyone intent on causing harm and ensure that they are dealt with appropriately.

"Those in and around the area will see an increase of officers and I would urge anyone with any concerns to please speak with them and they will do all they can to assist."

Drugs and weapons seized following police raid in Crewe

Two men and a boy have been arrested by officers and a quantity of illegal drugs have been seized following a warrant in Crewe.

At around 9am on Wednesday 1 March, officers conducted a drugs warrant at an address on Darlington Avenue, Crewe.

Two men and a boy were found at the address and during a search of the property officers discovered a large quantity of cannabis, psychoactive substances along with other drug paraphernalia and a number of weapons – including a "zombie" style knife.

Following the warrant, a 17-year-old boy was arrested on suspicion of being concerned in the supply class A and B drugs, while a 22-year-old man was arrested on suspicion of being concerned in the supply of class B drugs (cannabis). Both were later released on bail.

A 26-year-old-man was also arrested being concerned in the supply of class B drugs, he was later released under investigation.

"This operation has led to successfully removing a quantity of illegal drugs and weapons from the streets of Crewe.

"Actions such as this shows how we are continuing the fight against illegal drugs within our local community and across wider Cheshire – doing all we can to disrupt these criminals.

Prolific offender from Macclesfield handed two-year Criminal Behaviour Order



A prolific offender from Macclesfield has been ordered to adhere to a strict Criminal Behaviour Order (CBO) following his release from prison.

Tom Cole, of no fixed address but of Macclesfield, was sentenced to eight weeks for theft from motor vehicle at Chester Magistrates' Court on 30 January 2023 after pleading guilty to the offence.

Following his release from prison, he must adhere to a two-year CBO which expires on 28 February 2025.

Under the terms of the order, which was successfully applied for by Macclesfield South Beat Team, the 36-year-old is prohibited from entering the town centre of Macclesfield as defined by the map unless on a train which is passing through the area.



Sergeant Matt Bassirat said: "Cole is a prolific offender who has brought misery to Macclesfield over recent years.

"This is a fantastic result which shows the lengths we will go to stop offenders such as Cole in their tracks to bring harmony back to the town.

"Orders such as CBOs are just another tool that allows officers to further protect communities from harm caused by offenders.

"If Cole fails to comply with any of the conditions of the order, he could receive a final penalty of five years imprisonment."

Anyone who encounters Cole breaching any of the above restrictions is urged to contact Cheshire Police via the website or call 101, to report it.

Closure order secured against troubled Warrington address

Beat Management Officers have successfully secured a closure order following reports of drug dealing and animal breeding at a property in Warrington.

The property that has caused year-long anguish for a community in Great Sankey, Warrington, has been shut down by officers following the securing of a closure order.

The closure order for the address on Mildenhall Close was granted at Crewe Magistrates Court on Monday 27 February.

Officers received numerous reports from concerned residents regarding drug-related activity and animal mistreatment at the property.

These reports included frequent vehicle and foot traffic gathering at the property, thought to be related to drug dealing, as well several Rottweilers owned by the occupant being frequently left loose on the estate – causing fear and panic amongst some residents.

Following the concern officers encouraged residents to get in touch regarding issues at the address so they could apply for a closure order.

Thanks to the fantastic support from the community, officers from the Warrington West Beat Team, were able to gather an overwhelming amount of evidence that lead to them securing a three-month closure order against their disruptive neighbour.

The occupant of the address has been ordered to leave the property and find alternative accommodation.

However, thanks to the great community policing by the Warrington West Beat Team, an overwhelming amount of evidence was gathered that lead to the residents securing a three-month closure order against their disruptive neighbour.

The occupant of the address, a 28-year-old woman, has been ordered to leave the property and find alternative accommodation.

All windows and doors will now be boarded up for a period of three months. Anyone who enters the address during that time is committing an offence and can be arrested.

Sergeant Neil Bradley of Warrington West Beat Team, said:

"Officers at Warrington West Beat Team made a promise to keep this neighbourhood and its residents safe, and by removing this resident that has caused them nothing but anguish for the past 12 months, we have kept that promise.

James Cotterill of Warrington LPU said:

"The residents have been incredibly supportive and are extremely grateful for the closure.

"Without communication with our residents we would not have secured this result that we have today.

"I want to urge anyone with concerns about ASB or other criminality in their community to please contact local officers and we will do everything we can to address issues and achieve justice."

Anyone with concerns about anti-social or suspicious behaviour in their area is asked to report it to Cheshire Police via the Cheshire Police website or call 101.

Three men charged following theft in Stretton

Three men have been charged in connection with the theft of cooking oil from a public house in Warrington.

At 5am on Wednesday 1 March officers spotted a transit van on the A49 in Stretton.

Officers stopped and searched the vehicle and the three occupants were arrested on suspicion of theft.

Mitko Asenov, 27, Asen Asenov, 32, of Turnpike Lane, London, and Bozhidar Andreev, 35, of Lordship Lane, London, were all subsequently charged with theft.

The trio are all set to appear at Warrington Magistrates Court on Wednesday 19 April for sentencing.

New beat manager for Hoole and Newton donates bicycles to local charity

PC Will Morgan-Griffiths got off to a flying start as beat manager for Hoole and Newton by donating more than 20 bicycles to a local charity.

On Monday 27 February PC Morgan-Griffiths delivered the bikes, which had been stored by Chester Local Policing Unit's property office, to the Bren Project.

The Bren Project is a small independent charity offering people with learning disabilities and autism the opportunity to experience supported, bespoke work placements in Chester and the surrounding area. The aim being to create a more inclusive workplace.



The bikes were either lost property or recovered stolen bikes which had never been claimed and some were damaged, giving the team at the Bren Project the perfect opportunity to get stuck in to renovating the cycles, learning new skills, and importantly the confidence in themselves and their abilities.

PC Morgan-Griffiths said:

"As the new beat manager for Hoole and Newton I am responsible for reducing crime and antisocial behaviour in the local area as well as increasing public confidence in the police service. In the coming weeks, months, and years I will work with local stakeholders and members of the public to prioritise and address issues that affect our community.

"In my effort to introduce myself to the local communities, I made a beeline for the Bren Project which is committed to supporting people with disabilities and creating a diverse work place. It was great to see the work they do and see people learning new skills and creating opportunities.

"I will be of course holding surgeries in the community so that anyone with any policing concerns can have their voice and feel supported by their local officers. You can also follow us Facebook to to keep up to date with your local policing."

Man jailed for stalking and assaulting former partner



A man from Ellesmere Port has been jailed after he admitted assaulting and harassing his former partner.

Michael Duncan appeared at Chester Magistrates Court on Monday 27 February where he pleaded guilty to section 39 assault and stalking.

The 38-year-old, Jacks Wood Avenue, Ellesmere Port, was sentenced to 24 weeks in prison and handed a five-year restraining order against his former partner.

During the hearing the court was told how Duncan has a number of previous convictions relating to domestic incidents.

In this case, he had known his victim for several years, although the woman was not aware of his previous convictions.

The pair became involved in a relationship in 2022 and initially everything was good.

However, as their relationship developed Duncan became jealous and controlling.

He repeatedly accused his partner of being unfaithful and would monitor her social media accounts, even forcing her to delete other men from her friends lists.

Duncan's behaviour was not just limited to social media, he would also phone and text his partners friends and family in order to isolate the woman.

His behaviour escalated after he discovered that his victim had been in contact with a former partner, after which he started to call the woman abusive names – including a 'tramp' and a 'slag'.

During one incident, Duncan followed the woman when she was out with friends. When she asked him to stop, he spat in her face.

After sustaining months of abuse, his victim ended the relationship after 11 months, after which Duncan's behaviour escalated further.

He would park his van outside the woman's home and bombarded her with hundreds of abusive messages, videos, and phone calls.

On Christmas Eve 2022, Duncan phoned the woman over 100 times, then on Christmas Day he sent her a message telling her to kill herself.

Thankfully, his victim eventually sought the courage to report Duncan to Police in January 2023 and he was swiftly arrested and charged.

Following his sentencing Detective Constable Luke Bailey said:

"This was an extremely traumatising experience for the victim in this case and I hope that Duncan's sentencing, along with his five-year restraining order, will provide her with some reassurance.

"Domestic abuse is not acceptable and will not be tolerated, and we want to send out a clear message that nobody should have so have to suffer in silence.

"If you are a victim of domestic abuse, or if you know someone who is a victim, please get in touch.

"We treat all reports of domestic abuse extremely seriously and will use all the powers available to us to ensure that those responsible are held accountable. This is demonstrated by the fact that the charge rate for domestic abuse offences in Cheshire has increased by 30 per cent in the past 12 months."

To report any incidents of domestic abuse contact Cheshire police on 101, or <u>report online</u>, in an emergency call 999.

DC Bailey added:

"Help is also available through the National Domestic Violence Helpline, on 0808 2000 247.

"In addition, if you have concerns about your current or ex-partner, because you're worried they may have a history of abuse and are a risk to you, then you can submit a Domestic Violence Disclosure Scheme (DVDS) application.

"The scheme, also known as Clare's law, enables the police to release information about any previous history of violence or abuse that a person might have."

Officers issue dispersal order following anti-social behaviour in Chester City Centre

Officers in Chester have issued a dispersal order following reports of a group causing anti-social behaviour in the city centre.

Police will be using dispersal orders banning anyone from the city for up to 48 hours to prevent disorder.

The dispersal order has been imposed under Section 34 of the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014, dispersal orders make it an offence for anyone to return to a specific area for up to 48 hours.

The highlighted mapped area will be provided to anyone issued with a direction to leave. If you are ordered to leave the dispersal order area and come back, you are likely to be arrested.

The powers are in place now and will run until 2pm on Thursday 2 March.


Inspector James Wilson said: "Due to ongoing anti-social behaviour here in Chester by a small minority of people, we have had to impose a dispersal order in the city centre.

"This type of behaviour will not be tolerated here in Chester.

"Anti-social behaviour can have a devastating impact on our communities and residents have every right to feel safe in their neighbourhoods.

"I would urge anyone who witnesses or who has been a victim of anti-social behaviour to report this to us by calling 101 or reporting it via our website so that we can investigate further."

Officers charge woman in connection with theft offences in Macclesfield

Officers from Macclesfield South Beat Team have charged a woman in connection with theft offences.

Lauren Wilson, 26, of no fixed address but of Macclesfield, was arrested and charged with two counts of theft from a shop, one count of theft in a dwelling, public order and two counts of fraud by false representation.

She has been remanded into custody to appear at Chester Magistrates' Court on Wednesday 1 March.

The charge follows an arrest by Macclesfield response officers in the early hours of Tuesday 28 February on Hope Street.

Woman charged in relation to burglary in Warrington

Officers investigating a burglary in Warrington have charged a woman in connection to the incident.

Ornela Borisova, of Clough Lane, Huddersfield, was arrested on Friday 24 February in relation to the burglary of an address on Loushers Lane, Warrington.

The 22-year-old appeared at Crewe Magistrates Court on Saturday 25 February where she pleaded guilty to burglary and theft and theft from a person.

Borisova will be remanded in custody until she is set to appear at Chester Crown Court for sentencing on Monday March 20.

Detectives charge man with drug offences following warrant in Blacon

Detectives from Chester Proactive Team have charged a man with drug offences following a warrant in Blacon.

Alessandro Esposito, 27, of Graham Road, Blacon, was arrested and subsequently charged with two counts of possession with intent to supply Class A (cocaine and MDMA) and B drugs (Cannabis).

He was remanded to appear at Crewe Magistrates' Court on 25 February where he was further remanded to appear at Chester Crown Court on 27 March.

The charges follow a warrant at an address in Blacon on Friday 24 February.

Officers enforce dispersal order in Winsford to crackdown on increased reports of ASB

As part of continued efforts to tackle anti-social behaviour in the Winsford area officers have authorised a dispersal order covering the town centre area.

The order came into force at 3.30pm today, Saturday 25 February, and will remain in place for the next 48-hours.

Dispersal orders are implemented under the Anti-Social Behaviour Act 2003, they provide police with the extra powers to break up groups of two or more people, where they believe their behaviour is causing a nuisance, harassment or distress.

Officers can move individuals out of the specified area and stop them from returning for up to 24 hours.

If you are ordered to leave the Dispersal Order area and come back into the areas marked on the map, you are likely to be arrested.

Inspector Scott Fletcher said:

"Due to ongoing anti-social behaviour by a small minority of young people in the Winsford area, we have taken the decision to put these extra measures in place to deter this behaviour and reassure people that we are taking this seriously.


"This type of behaviour will not be tolerated; our communities should not be disrupted by antisocial behaviour. Every resident has the right to feel safe in their neighbourhoods yet a small minority are disrupting this.

The Order has been implemented under the Anti-Social Behaviour Act 2003. An Order is in currently in place until 6am Saturday morning and another Order will then be in place from 4pm that afternoon. This will run for 48 hours.

The Order provides the police with the extra powers to break up groups of two or more people, where they believe their behaviour is causing a nuisance, harassment or distress.

The police can move individuals out of the specified area and stop them from returning for up to 24 hours.

If you are aged under 16 and in the dispersal area without the supervision of an adult, the police may take you home if it is appropriate to do so.

If you are ordered to leave the Dispersal Order area and come back into the areas marked on the map, you are likely to be arrested.

Sgt Paul Cundy said:

"Last night a number of wheelie bins were set on fire and this follows on from other recent antisocial behaviour which we will not tolerate. We will continue to use these powers to deter antisocial behaviour along with longer term solutions which we are working on with our partners at Cheshire West and Chester Council and the local schools."

Sexual predator jailed for 10 years for attacking a woman in Warrington

A man who sexually assaulted a woman as she was walking home in Warrington has been jailed.

Gyulhan Hyusein pleaded guilty to two counts of sexual assault by digital penetration.

The 25-year-old was sentenced at Liverpool Crown Court on Thursday 23 February. He was jailed for 10 years.

The court heard that the victim, a woman in her late teens, was walking to her partner's home at around 3am on Sunday 16 October 2022 following a night out with friends.

As the woman walked along Orford Lane, she was approached by Hyusein, who put his arm around her and his hand down her back.

The victim pushed him away and told him 'no'.

However, Hyusein continued his attack, putting his hand down her trousers and touching her inappropriately.

Once again, the woman pushed him away and told him 'no'. She then attempted to walk away from him.

Hyusein followed the woman, and as she entered Orford Avenue he again put his hands down her trousers and touched her inappropriately.

As the woman screamed for help, he dragged her into an alleyway and pushed her against a wall, where he continued to touch the woman inappropriately with his fingers.

The victim continued to push Hyusein away and attempted to call for help, but he grabbed her phone and threw it away.

Hyusein eventually retreated, and the victim sought refuge at a nearby house while police were called to the scene.

Hyusein was arrested just hours after the attack – officers reviewing CCTV footage in a control room spotted him on live CCTV cameras in Warrington town centre.

Following sentencing, Detective Constable Laura Sandbach, who led the investigation at Warrington CID, said:

"Gyulhan Hyusein is a sexual predator. He attacked an innocent woman who was simply walking home, despite repeatedly being told to stop.

"This was an absolutely terrifying experience for the victim, and I would like to praise her for the courage and bravery that she has shown.

"While she will never be able to forget what Hyusein did to her that night, I hope the fact that he is now behind bars where he belongs will provide her with some closure.

"I would also like to thank the eagle-eyed officer who spotted Hyusein walking in Warrington town centre on live CCTV cameras as they were reviewing the footage from the attack.

"Thanks to their diligence, we were able to remove Hyusein from the streets of Warrington, and he is now facing the consequences of his actions in the form of a 10-year prison sentence."

In addition to his custodial sentence, Hyusein, of Longford Street, Warrington, has also been ordered to sign the sex offenders' register for life and handed a lifetime restraining order preventing him from contacting the victim.

Detective Sergeant Joe Davies added:


"I would like to commend DC Sandbach for her dedication and commitment throughout this investigation.

"No-one should have to experience what Gyulhan Hyusein's victim has gone through, and I hope this case and the sentence that he has received encourages other victims of sexual offences to come forward and report what has happened to them.

"We treat all reports of sexual offences extremely seriously, and any allegation will be thoroughly investigated, with the wishes and needs of the victim as our main priority."

Winsford officers working to tackle anti-social behaviour

Officers are working to tackle anti-social behaviour in Winsford following a spate of incidents in the town.

On Monday 20 February, police received four reports of anti-social behaviour in Winsford involving groups of youths.

On each occasion officers attended quickly, and had cause to stop and search some who were reported to be in possession of weapons.

No weapons were found during any of these searches, and nobody that subsequently spoke to police actually confirmed seeing any weapons.

It is believed that these reports followed an under-18 disco that was held at a venue in the town on the same evening.

Sergeant Paul Cundy said:

"We're aware of rumours circulating in the community about a number of youths carrying knives and we have received a number of calls relating to the matter.

"However, I want to make it clear that on each report we received that evening, officers responded quickly and no weapons were located.

"In Cheshire, we have one of the lowest knife crime rates in the country and we have a strong approach in tackling those who are carrying knives in our communities.

"We frequently visit schools and community groups to educate teens on the dangers of carrying knives and the horrific consequences – not only for themselves but those around them.

"That being said, I want to reassure the community that anyone who is found to be intent on causing harm or found to be causing anti-social behaviour will be robustly dealt with."

Sgt Cundy continued:

"We are also working with the owners of the venue and the local authority to address the reports we have received in order to see what can be done to prevent this behaviour from occurring in the future.

"I would also urge anyone who has children in the town to educate them on the dangers of carrying knives and committing anti-social behaviour – the consequences of this behaviour won't just affect them but also their families.

"I am also grateful to the public for raising their concerns and would urge you to continue to report any information that they have to us so that we can act and also build a picture of the activity that is going on in our neighbourhoods.

"This allows us to take appropriate action to address these issues swiftly and effectively if and when they arise."

Police partner up with local bus company to tackle antisocial behaviour in Runcorn

Police in Runcorn are working alongside local bus company Arriva to crackdown on anti-social behaviour (ASB) on bus routes in the town.

The initiative, led by Cheshire Police, aims to deter anti-social behaviour and criminal damage being committed while also providing reassurance to local residents.

The action comes in response to reports of 17 incidents on the transport network this year so far.

Some of the incidents have included windows being smashed, seats being burnt, and even an assault on a passenger.

The incidents have resulted in key bus services being curtailed and more than £4000 worth of damage.

In a bid to tackle the issues, plain clothed officers will be patrolling key routes that have been identified as ASB hotspots to keep passengers and drivers safe as well as taking necessary action against those causing the disruption.

Three people have already been arrested on suspicion of various offences as part of the ongoing crackdown.

Officers will also be applying Selecta DNA to items such as glass hammers and emergency stop buttons on routes which have previously been targeted by offenders.

Selecta DNA is a unique DNA Identifier that will enable officers to identify those who attempt to cause criminal damage on the buses swiftly and effectively.

Inspector Daniel Haddock, of Runcorn Local Policing Unit (LPU), said: "Our aim is to reassure the public that officers are out and about regularly patrolling the bus routes in Runcorn, with a particular focus on services within the Murdishaw area.

"Our officers will be hidden in plain sight and will be ready to act if anyone intent on causing harm to the public and ensure that they are removed and robustly dealt with.

"Although you may not be aware of their presence, they will be ready to disrupt any issues that arise on the routes that have been impacted by incidents of anti-social or nuisance behaviour in the past."

Inspector Haddock added: "I know there are members of the community who rely on buses as an essential form of transport, and they deserve to feel safe on their journey.

"While we are committed to doing all we can to tackle these incidents, it's essential that the community play their part, as they are the ones who will suffer the most if the bus routes are cancelled.

"I would urge parents in the local area to check where your children are and ensure that they understand how greatly this behaviour could impact those who rely on bus services most and the wider impact on not only themselves but their families if they were to be causing the trouble.

"I would also like to ask anyone who has witnessed any of the behaviour, or anyone who knows the people responsible, to contact us on 101 or report it via our website so that we can ensure they are held accountable for their actions."

Peter Sass, Head of Operations at Arriva Buses said: "In recent weeks, we have experienced a number of antisocial incidents across our Runcorn service routes and these have led to difficult but necessary decisions being made on some services being temporarily removed from the area.

"Furthermore, our on-board CCTV has been downloaded to aid the Police in their investigations and subsequent prosecutions of antisocial behaviour perpetrators.

"We're proudly working in partnership with Cheshire Police, to seek a resolution to issues as quickly as possible, for the benefit of our staff, our customers and our communities."

Mike Amesbury, MP for Weaver Vale, whose constituency includes East Runcorn, said: "I'm deeply concerned to hear about anti-social and criminal behaviour on and around buses in the Murdishaw area of Runcorn.

"This is completely unacceptable and, in some cases, highly dangerous and illegal. Drivers and passengers should not have to tolerate such conduct, which also puts the future of our vital bus services in jeopardy.

"This issue involves a small minority. I would like to make a plea to families and the community to help keep our young people on the right track. That is a collective responsibility we all share."

Ellesmere Port officers enforce dispersal order to crackdown on increased reports of ASB

Officers in Ellesmere Port have introduced a dispersal order following an increase in reports of antisocial behaviour (ASB) in the town.


Over the past week officers have received reports of a large group of youths who have been committing ASB in the town centre and Whitby Park areas.

The group are also believed to be involved in two assaults which both occurred on Tuesday 21 February.

The first incident occurred in Ellesmere Port town centre at around 6.30pm where a 13-year-old boy was assaulted. A short time later, at 7.23pm another 13-year-old boy was assaulted at Whitby Park. Both boys sustained minor injuries.

The order, which came into force at 5.30pm on Wednesday 22 February and ends at 00.01 on Friday 24 February, covers Ellesmere Port Town centre, Whitby Park and the Westminster area.

The dispersal order has been imposed under



Section 34 of the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014, allows officers to order people to leave a specific area and make it an offence for anyone to return to a specific area for up to 48 hours.

Chief Inspector Paul Fegan, head of Ellesmere Port Local Policing Unit, said:

"Due to ongoing anti-social behaviour here in Ellesmere Port by a small minority of young people, we have had we have put in these extra measures in place to deter this behaviour and reassure people that we are taking this seriously.

"This type of behaviour will not be tolerated; our communities should not be disrupted by antisocial behaviour. Every resident has the right to feel safe in their neighbourhoods yet a small minority are disrupting this.

"I would urge anyone who witnesses or feels that they have been subjected to anti-social behaviour to report this to us by calling 101 or reporting it via our website so that we can investigate further."

Two men arrested following pursuit on M56

The two occupants, two men 27 and 29, were successfully removed from the vehicle and subsequently arrested on suspicion of driving while disqualified, theft of a motor vehicle and driving under false plates.

Following the arrest, Josh Rimmer of the Area Investigation Team North, said:

"Thanks to the work of our quick-thinking officers, two disqualified drivers have been taken off the road and will be held accountable for their actions.

"I also hope that this acts as a clear indication toward any criminals who intend target Lymm as well as wider Cheshire.

"It is a warning, a promise, that our officers will be watching the roads for you and that we will catch you."

Man charged following serious assault in Sandbach.

Detectives investigating the serious assault of a man in Sandbach have charged a man in relation to the incident.

Thomas Dunn was arrested on Monday 20 February following an incident at an address in the Cecil Rugby Close area of Sandbach.

The 84-year-old of Oakdene Court, Cecil Rugby Close, Sandbach, has since been charged with section 18 assault, wounding with intent.

Dunn appeared at Chester Magistrates' Court on Wednesday 22 February where he was remanded in custody, he is next set to appear at Chester Crown Court on Wednesday 22 March.

The victim in the case, a 60-year-old local man, was taken to the Royal Stoke Hospital, where his condition is described as critical.

Cheshire Constabulary urge night time economy workers to complete bystander intervention training to help keep people safe

Cheshire Constabulary is urging those who work in the night time economy to complete a free bystander intervention training session to help keep people safe across the county.

The course, which is being delivered by sexual harassment specialists – Purple Leaf – aims to empower those who work in the night time economy to better identify sexual harassment and learn how to intervene safely and effectively.

The training, which is free of charge to complete, is being offered to those who work in a bar, pub or club in Cheshire – including security who work the doors. Anyone who drives a taxi around the night time economy can also book themselves onto the informative and inspiring sessions.

Operational Lead for the Constabulary's Safer Streets initiative, Inspector Cliff Goodwin, said: "We are setting the standard that we do not accept sexual harassment, abuse and violence in Cheshire and neither should anyone else.

"We all must play our part in ending violence against women and girls and we are upskilling those who work in the night time economy to help them identify sexual harassment and empower them to intervene safely and effectively. The sessions are virtual and will only take up two hours of your time - but the benefits are unparalleled - and I strongly encourage night time economy workers to take up our bystander intervention training offering.

"Violence against women and girls is an issue that police and partners take very seriously, and we will continue working hard to make Cheshire even safer for everyone."

Kerry Best, from West Mercia Rape and Sexual Abuse Support Centre, said: "Sexual Violence impacts one in four women, one in 20 men and one in six children and we are pleased to be supporting Cheshire Constabulary with this vital piece of work. All of us can play our part in safely challenging inappropriate behaviour when we witness it.

"The Bystander training provides delegates with a framework for ensuring that the actions they choose to take are led by the wishes of the victim, keep everyone safe, and most importantly, do not collude with or minimise harmful sexual behaviours."

Police and Crime Commissioner for Cheshire, John Dwyer said: "Everyone in society needs to stand up and work together to tackle violence against women and girls. By empowering people with knowledge about what sort of incidents they could encounter and how to step in, we can take a step towards making the change.

"I would encourage those in the night time economy to take up this offer of free training and help make Cheshire even safer."

Two teenagers charged with drug offences in Macclesfield

All of the abuse occurred when the victim was aged between 13 and 16 years old.

Jones, who worked as a firefighter, pleaded guilty to all of the offences, which were committed up until Monday 19 September 2022.

Detective Constable Michaela Flynn, who led the investigation, said: "The incident has had a major impact on the victim, and I would like to thank her for the courage and resilience she has shown that has enabled us to secure this guilty plea.

"Kevin Jones is a very dangerous individual and the extent of the abuse he subjected the victim to is nothing short of horrific.

"I welcome his conviction and I hope that the victim and her family gain some closure.

"We are committed to tackling sexual violence and our officers support victims of this type of crime. I hope that the conviction provides some solace and closure to the victim and also gives others who may have suffered in silence the courage to come forward."

Jones has been remanded in custody and will be sentenced on Thursday 6 April.

Appeal for information after cyclist sustains serious injuries

"We're particularly keen to hear from anyone with any dashcam or CCTV footage of the woman.

Appeal for information after objects thrown from bridges in Runcorn

Police are appealing for information after three incidents where objects were thrown off bridges in Runcorn overnight.

"This is a serious offence which could have potentially fatal consequences and we are doing all we can to locate those responsible.

"It is also Important to realise the repercussions that this incident could bring, not only to the offenders, to those around them if they are found to be involved in this.

"As a result, we will be upping the number of officers in the area, and anyone found to be causing harm in our communities will be dealt with robustly.

"I would urge anyone who has information or knows who is responsible to please get in touch with us and we will do the rest."

Police make new appeal for information regarding fatal collision in Warrington



Police are making a fresh appeal for information regarding a collision that left one dead, and another seriously injured.

In particular, officers are keen to hear from the owner of a red motorcycle, who was seen just prior to collision, and may be key to understanding the exact circumstances of the incident.

Sue, Ben's mum, said:

"I am struggling to come to terms with the loss of my Son at such a young age, I know that this will not bring Ben back but any help from the rider or other witnesses will help me and the Police investigation into the collision".
