Update regarding investigation into death of Nantwich teenager

Following their enquiries into the circumstances surrounding the death of Nantwich teenager Jonty Evans, detectives have now confirmed that they eliminated two 16-year-old boys from the investigation.

The teenagers from Crewe, who cannot be named for legal reasons, were initially arrested on Thursday 5 September on suspicion of section 47 assault. Officers' enquiries remain ongoing and they are asking anyone who may have seen Jonty between 12.30am and 2.30am on Saturday 31 August in the Waterlode area of Nantwich to contact police. The same goes for any members of the public who may have captured Jonty on CCTV, dashcam and ring doorbell footage during the same timeframe and to submit it directly via [MIPP](#). Warrington cleaner jailed for stealing money from vulnerable pensioner

Alison Lavell has been jailed for nine months after admitting to stealing £40 from a 92-year-old woman whom she cleaned for.

Alison Lavell, 59, appeared at Liverpool Crown Court on Tuesday 10 September where she was sentenced to nine months imprisonment after previously pleading guilty to two counts of theft. The court heard that on Friday 12 January 2024, Cheshire Police received a report from the victim's son, who suspected that Lavell had been stealing money from his 91-year-old mother that was supposed to be given to her carers.



The caller reported that around £500 had gone missing by the time the family had been made aware and they later provided Cheshire Police with video footage from a hidden camera from inside the elderly woman's home that showed Lavell, who was her personal cleaner at the time, taking what they believed was £20 from her purse on 2 January 2024. A second piece of video footage taken a week later showed Lavell again reaching into the purse of the victim and taking a further £20.

Lavell was subsequently arrested on suspicion of theft but denied any knowledge of the 92-year-olds money going missing. Despite claiming she was innocent, claiming she had picked up a prescription for the woman from her purse and not cash, Lavell was charged with two counts of theft and went to trial. After initially pleading not guilty, she would later change her plea to guilty after CCTV footage was shown to her in court. Alison Lavell, of Alexandra Street, Warrington, then appeared at Liverpool Crown Court on Tuesday 10 September where she was jailed for nine months on each count, with the sentences to be served concurrently.

Police Constable Stephen Wolstenholme, of the Warrington Area Investigation Team, said: *"Alison Lavell abused her position of trust and stole the money of a vulnerable person who considered her a friend; I hope that her sentencing today provides the victim with a sense of closure from this distressing incident. Regardless of how small they may seem, we will always take matters such as this with the utmost seriousness and our officers will relentlessly do everything they can to get you the justice you deserve."*

Man sentenced following fail to stop pursuit in Cheshire

A motorcyclist who led officers on a pursuit across Cheshire has now been sentenced.

Philip Hunter appeared at Warrington Magistrates on Thursday 12 September where he was sentenced to 26 weeks in prison suspended for 2 years. The 25-year-old, of Beswick Road, Northwich, had previously pleaded guilty to dangerous driving. He was also banned from driving for 12 months and ordered to undertake an extended retest.

The court heard how at around 4.30pm on Wednesday 17 July, officers from the Cheshire Police Motorcycle Unit attempted to stop two motorcyclists near to junction 12 of the M56 near Hapsford. Both of the riders failed to stop and drove off onto the A56 travelling towards Frodsham. Officers lost sight of one of the bikes, but they continued to follow the second bike ridden by Philip Hunter as he led police on a pursuit into the Weaverham area of Northwich. As the Police Motorcycle officers were travelling towards Weaverham, they were joined by several other officers from the Roads and Crime Unit and the Police helicopter, who helped support the pursuit. Upon entering the Weaverham area the Hunter abandoned his bike and attempted to make off on foot but was quickly located by the police helicopter and arrested.

Following the sentencing Chief Inspector John Forshaw, of the Roads and Crime Unit, said: *"Hunter is clearly a dangerous individual, who put the lives of officers and innocent members of the public at risk for no apparent reason whatsoever. His reckless behaviour led officers on a pursuit across rural Cheshire, throughout which he showed no regard for those around them. However, despite his repeated attempts to evade officers, there really was nowhere to hide and he has now been held accountable for his actions. As this case demonstrates, no matter what you are driving or riding, we will use all the tactics available to us to ensure that those who break the law in Cheshire are brought to justice."*

Woman jailed for defrauding mother out of more than £200,000

A woman has been jailed after she was found to have stolen more than £200,000 from her own mother.

Luana Dougherty, 50, of Acre Road, Great Sutton, appeared at Chester Crown Court on Monday 9 September where she was jailed for four years. She had previously pleaded guilty to fraud by false representation.

The case began in June 2021, when Dougherty's mother, who is living with dementia, sold her house, the proceeds of which went into her personal bank account. Dougherty was given some of the money by her mother, but she also set up an online banking application for her mother's account and took more money without permission. This continued for another 12 months, during which she spent large sums of money, including on two Staffordshire Bull Terrier dogs, furniture, and setting up a dog breeding business.

In July 2022, family members contacted the victim's bank after raising concerns about how Dougherty came to have so much money available to her. The bank informed them that withdrawals had been made from the account for the past year in various amounts. Dougherty was confronted and admitted taking the money and spending most of it. She transferred £80,000 back but more than £216,000 was unaccounted for. The incident was reported to police and in interview Dougherty admitted to taking the money and taking



advantage of her mother's vulnerability to defraud her. Following enquiries, Dougherty was subsequently charged with the offence.

After the sentencing, DC Chester Ward said: *"Firstly, I would like to highlight our appreciation for the victim's family's patience, not only throughout the investigation into Dougherty's offending, but also in providing evidence to support it. Dougherty completely abused her position. Instead of being someone the victim could trust to take care of her, she stole money from her for her own selfish desires. The lengthy sentence which has been handed down to her by the courts is a credit to all the officers who worked hard to bring her to justice. As this case demonstrates, please can we remind people to be vigilant and check on any vulnerable members of your family. If you believe you have experienced any offences of fraud, these can be reported to Cheshire Police via 101, or through our website."*

Woman pleads guilty to causing death by dangerous driving

A 60-year-old woman from Loggerheads has pleaded guilty to causing death by dangerous driving.

Alison Cooper from Badger Brow Road, in Loggerheads appeared at Chester Crown Court on 12 September and pleaded guilty to the offence. She will appear at Chester Crown Court on 8 November. The collision occurred at around 4.45pm on Thursday 16 June 2022 on the A500 in Barthomley. Mrs Cooper was driving her red Ford Fiesta home from work when she braked harshly causing 29-year-old Chris Parsons to take evasive action. This resulted in his black Renault Clio veering into oncoming traffic and colliding with a blue Seat Ateca travelling in the opposite direction. Sadly, Chris, who was from Mostyn in North Wales died at the scene.

His family said at the time: *"Our beloved Chris sadly passed away on Thursday 16 June 2022 aged 29 years old. Words can't describe the heartache we as a family are going through. He was a wonderful son, brother, uncle, and loving father to his three amazing children who he will be sorely missed by. He was an amazing, kind, caring wonderful person who would go above and beyond for absolutely anyone. We will not be making further comment as we still are yet to find out the conclusion of the investigation to determine exactly what happened and we kindly wish that our privacy as a family is respected at this time. Rest In Peace Shifty, fly high, gone but never forgotten."*

DC Lisa Evans-Hill from the Serious Collision Investigation Unit said: *"This was a dangerous action on a busy road with fatal consequences. This decision to brake, caused not only Chris's family's lives to change forever that day, but Mrs Cooper's as well. I hope it makes people think carefully about their actions behind the wheel. Everyone should be aware that when they get in a vehicle, they have the potential to cause real damage and even take a life. You have not only your life in your hands but other road users and this needs to be remembered every time you make that journey. Please drive carefully and safely for everyone's sake."*

Ten people plead guilty to supplying illegal drugs in Chester

Ten people who were arrested as part of an operation into the supply of illegal drugs in Chester have now pleaded guilty to all of the charges against them.

Operation Showman was launched by detectives at Chester Proactive Policing Team in June 2023 in response to an organised crime gang (OCG) who were supplying class A drugs in Chester and North Wales. The gang were using a number of graft phones to conduct their operation, sending out bulk messages to drug users in the area offering to supply cocaine, ketamine and ecstasy.



Following enquiries officers identified a number of suspects in Chester and Ellesmere Port who were believed to be part of the OCG. After gathering a catalogue of evidence against the gang, officers conducted a series of warrants across the area on Tuesday 30 April leading to the arrest and charge of seven men and three women in relation to a variety of offences. A number of mobile phones were also seized during the raids along with a large quantity of cocaine, ketamine, MDMA and cannabis.



All ten defendants have since pleaded guilty to the charges against them, with the last defendant, Daniel Smith, admitting his guilt at Chester Crown Court on Monday 9 September. Below are the details of the nine defendants who will all now be sentenced at a later date.

- Jordan Cook, aged 20, of Sycamore Drive, Chester – pleaded guilty to conspiracy to supply class B drugs (ketamine)
- Jamie Lee Kelly, aged 37, of Englefield Avenue, Saltney – pleaded guilty to conspiracy to supply class A drugs (cocaine)
- Lucy Pagett, aged 33, of Englefield Avenue, Saltney – pleaded guilty to conspiracy to supply class A drugs (cocaine)
- James Phelan, aged 20, of Montrose Court, Chester – pleaded guilty to conspiracy to supply class A drugs (cocaine)
- Ryan Paul Yates, aged 33, of Roughlyn Crescent, Marslton-cum-Lache, Chester – pleaded guilty to three counts of conspiracy to supply class A & B drugs (cocaine, ketamine, MDMA) and importation of class B drugs (cannabis)
- Edward Chadwick, aged 28, of Oakfield Road, Chester - pleaded guilty to conspiracy to supply class A drugs (cocaine)
- Sian Elisha Tomlin, aged 34, of Stamford Road, Chester – pleaded guilty to being concerned in the supply of class A drugs (cocaine)
- Daniel Smith, aged 38, of Roughlyn Crescent, Marslton-cum-Lache, Chester - pleaded guilty to conspiracy to supply cocaine, ketamine, and MDMA
- Susan Stretton, aged 38, of Roughlyn Crescent, Marslton-cum-Lache, Chester - pleaded guilty to allowing a premises to be used for the supply of class A drugs (cocaine)
- Kai Bradley, aged 20, of Stratford Road, Chester – pleaded guilty to allowing a premises to be used for the supply of class A drugs (cocaine)

Following the guilty pleas Detective Inspector Rupert Morrey said: *“This has been a complex and lengthy investigation and the fact that all the suspects have now admitted their guilt demonstrates the strength of the evidence against them. During the investigation, our officers spent over seven months meticulously gathering evidence and intelligence in relation to the supply of illegal drugs in Chester. Thanks to their dedication, ten people have now pleaded guilty to their involvement in the supply of class A and B drugs in the area. Illegal drugs have a hugely detrimental impact on communities, causing widespread misery. As such, cutting off supplies of illegal drugs and removing drug dealers from our communities is of paramount importance. I have no doubt that these convictions will play a crucial role in disrupting serious and organised crime and send out a very clear message that the supply of illegal drugs will not be tolerated in Cheshire. I also hope that it reassures communities that we are committed to doing all we can to tackle this type of criminality.”*

Chief Inspector Paul Fegan, head of Chester Local Policing unit, added: *“Illegal drugs have a devastating impact on our communities, and although we do extensive work with our partners to break the cycle of serious and organised crime, we cannot achieve this alone. We need the public to be our eyes and ears and to come forward with information regarding drug dealing in their communities. Your support is crucial in the*

ongoing fight against drug dealing and all other forms of serious and organised crime. Together we can help to keep vulnerable people and our communities safe. Man arrested on suspicion of drugs offences in Winsford following warrant

A man has been arrested on suspicion of drugs offences following a warrant in Winsford.

On Tuesday 10 September, officers from the Winsford Beat team executed a warrant at an address in Weaver Street. This was following intelligence received in relation to drugs offences. Officers seized a quantity of class B drugs (cannabis) during the warrant and other drug dealing paraphernalia. A 24-year-old man was arrested on suspicion of possession with intent to supply class B drugs. He has since been released under investigation.

Inspector David Levins said: *“This warrant forms part of our ongoing efforts to tackle illegal drugs offences in Winsford and we hope this will provide reassurance to residents in the area that we are committed to dealing with this problem head-on. Drugs are a huge drain on our communities, so cracking down on those responsible is always one of our priorities. But we cannot solve this problem alone. I would appeal to anyone who has any information about illegal drug activity or any other criminal activity taking place in their communities to contact us on 101, via the website, or anonymously via Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111.”*

Cheshire Constabulary praised in national activism and impartiality report

Cheshire Constabulary has been praised for its good practice in a number of areas following a national inspection into activism and impartiality in policing.

In September 2023, the then Home Secretary commissioned His Majesty's Inspectorate of Constabulary and Fire & Rescue Services (HMICFRS) to inspect the extent to which police involvement in politically contested matters may be having an impact on operational policing, by influencing policing policy, priorities and practice. They explored how the police deal with politicised and contested matters and examined whether forces allow politics or activism to unduly influence them. The inspection took place at 12 police forces in England and Wales, including Cheshire. The full report was published on Tuesday 10 September can be viewed on the [HMICFRS website](#).

Throughout the report there are several references to the positive practice taking place in Cheshire, including the below:

Forces have effective governance of their communications with the public: *“Cheshire Constabulary had a traffic light system for officers and staff to assess whether it was appropriate for them to post a comment themselves or whether they needed the approval or advice of the communications department.”*

Forces can overcome gaps in advisory group representation: *“Forces often find it challenging to recruit young people to external advisory groups. Cheshire Constabulary told us it has responded to that challenge by engaging with the Cheshire Youth Commission to gain insight into the impact of stop and search on local young people.”*

Terms of reference (TOR) for advisory groups are often unclear: *“We found a good example of clear TOR and governance across external advisory groups in Cheshire Constabulary. The force uses a legitimacy framework to map across and bring the various groups together at a strategic level. Therefore, there is a clear route to raise or escalate issues when needed and gather good practice.”*

There are some examples of forces going beyond the nine protected characteristics, but with a rationale or justification for doing so: *“Several forces, including Cheshire Constabulary, went beyond their strict obligations. They considered how the cost of living and financial hardship may have affected their officers and staff. These factors were considered when the forces made decisions about where to post them, for example.”*

Chief Constable Mark Roberts said: *“It’s very pleasing to see the Constabulary highlighted in this report for good practice in a number of areas - this is testament to all the hard work going on across the Force. It is vitally important that in taking operational decisions we always remain independent to keep the public safe, without any undue influence, and this report supports that view. There are also a number of recommendations for all forces which we will now begin working on in order to keep Cheshire even safer.”*

Man charged following pub burglary in Winsford

A man who was arrested at Heathrow Airport in connection to a burglary at a pub in Winsford has now been charged.

At 11.30am on Sunday 8 September officers were made aware of a burglary at the Top House pub on Wharton Road. The victim reported how an unknown offender had forced entry into the premises at around 1.45am that day and stolen a large quantity of cash. Following enquiries, a 37-year-old man from Northwich was arrested at Heathrow Airport in connection to the incident. Following questioning Terence John Adams, 37, of Normans Lane, Whitley, Northwich, has since been charged with one count of burglary other than a dwelling. He has been remanded in custody and is set to appear at Chester Magistrates Court later today, Friday 13 September.

Commercial Vehicle Unit crackdown on dangerous driving in HGV operation

Cheshire Constabulary’s Commercial Vehicle Unit have been tackling dangerous driving as part of an operation focusing on keeping our county’s roads safe.

The operation, known as "Operation Rule", was launched by Sussex Police following the tragic death of an 11-year-old boy named Harry Dennis. Harry suffered fatal injuries after a scaffolding plank went through the windscreen of his family’s car. The plank had been improperly secured to a van travelling in front of Harry and his family. The operation has since been embraced by a number of forces in a bid to improve safety for all road users and identify any offences committed by drivers.





The multi-agency day of action took place on Friday 6 September on the M6 at Sandbach and involved Cheshire Police's Commercial Vehicle Unit, the Roads and Crime Unit, Merseyside Police, Health and Safety Executive, and the DVSA, to monitor motorists on the M6.

As a result of the operation, officers stopped a total of 31 vehicles and issued a number of tickets for a variety of offences which included insecure loads and excess weight – of note this included ladders, wheelbarrows, pipes and cement mixers. The team stopped vehicles registered in the UK and foreign registered HGVs during the day of action, as well as a number of light goods vehicles. 45% of all vehicles stopped were non-compliant with the law. One driver was also arrested on suspicion of drink driving offences.

Chief Inspector John Forshaw of Cheshire's Roads and Crime Unit said: *"This operation was launched on some of Cheshire's busiest motorways with the intention of observing and ensuring drivers travel safely through our Cheshire community. However, it was really disappointing to see how many vehicles were non-compliant with the law, which highlights just how important these days of action are in keeping our roads safe. As we've seen in cases like Harry's, insecure loads can bring utter devastation and this negligence will not be tolerated. We will continue to do all we can to encourage road users to drive safely and I hope the operation sends a strong message that we will not hesitate to act against those individuals set on flouting the rules of the road and who think the law doesn't apply to them."*

Officers crackdown on shoplifting in Crewe and Nantwich

Officers from Crewe Local Policing unit have charged another six people as part of their continued crackdown on shoplifting in both Crewe and Nantwich.

Over recent months officers have been working closely with businesses in the area to help identify offenders and ensure that they are held accountable for their actions. The most recent arrests and charges include:

- Christopher Davies, 39, of no fixed abode, charged with one count of theft from B&M and bailed to appear at Crewe Magistrates' Court on 25 September.
- Christopher Evanson, 35, of no fixed abode, pleaded guilty to three counts of theft from B&M. He was sentenced to two weeks in prison, plus a previous suspended imprisonment of 16 weeks has been implemented, at Chester Magistrates' Court on 5 September. He was sentenced to a total of 18 weeks.
- Thomas Simpson, 34, of no fixed abode, charged and remanded for two thefts from B&M, one theft and one attempted theft from Co-op in Wistaston. He was sentenced to 16 weeks imprisonment at Chester Magistrates' Court on 6 September.

- Gordon-Glyn Roberts, 48, of no fixed abode, charged and remanded with one count of theft from B&M and one count of using threatening/abusive behaviour to cause harassment, alarm or distress against a store worker at B&M. He was sentenced to 12 weeks suspended for 12 months at Chester Magistrates' Court on 6 September.
- Daniel Quinlan, 40, of no fixed abode, charged with six counts of theft from B&M, one from ALDI Nantwich Road, and one from Co-op in Coppenhall. He was also charged with five counts of breach of a CBO. He was sentenced to eight weeks in prison, plus activation of a previous suspended prison sentence at Chester Magistrates' Court on 5 September. He was sentenced to a total of 16 weeks.
- Janine Stanley, 50, of Davenport Avenue, Nantwich, charged with eight counts of theft from Home Bargains, Nantwich and bailed to appear at Crewe Magistrates' Court on 26 September.

Police Constable Justin Taylor said: *"We know that shoplifting has a major impact on the business community and as these arrests demonstrate we are committed to doing all we can to tackle the issue. I hope that these cases act as a warning to those involved in shoplifting and also provide reassurance to businesses in both Crewe and Nantwich."*

Man arrested following reports of a drone at Warrington prison

Officers have arrested a man following reports of a drone flying over a prison in Cheshire.

Shortly before 1am on Tuesday 10 September, officers were called to reports of a drone flying over the Charlie Wing at HMP Risley. Officers were quickly deployed to the scene and following a search of the area they located a man in a black Ford Mondeo on Silver Lane. While searching the vehicle officers discovered a drone in the boot along with a small amount of cannabis. Two knives were also recovered along with a mobile phone. The driver of the car, a 38-year-old man from Manchester, was arrested at the scene on suspicion of possession of Class B drugs, two counts of possession of a knife and conspiracy to convey class A and B items into a prison. The man remains in custody at this time where he is assisting officers with their enquiries.

Following the arrest Detective Inspector David Schofield said: *"While this investigation is in the early stages, we know that drones are often used to convey illegal items into prisons. We work closely with all the prisons in Cheshire, and we are committed to doing all we can to tackle the issue."*

Man fined for hunting with hounds in east Cheshire

A man has been found guilty of hunting wild mammals with hounds in east of Cheshire.

John Finnegan, 39, from Dean Hill, Hayse, Navan, County Meath in Ireland was found guilty of one count of hunting a wild mammal with dogs at Crewe Magistrates Court on 15 August. He was fined £468. The charge relates to an incident in Marbury on 26 November 22 where a fox hunted by hounds during a trail hunt. Finnegan was the huntsman at the time.

Superintendent Gareth Wrigley said: *"This is testament to the hard work and tenacity of the officer in the case and the support and expertise of the prosecutor. I'd like to thank both for their dedication and determination to achieve justice in what is a complicated area of law, and I'd also like to thank those who gave evidence that helped to convict Finnegan. It shows the importance of giving evidence and statements in order to successfully prosecute those who break the law."*

Police and council working in partnership to tackle ASB hotspot in Northwich

Officers from Northwich Local Policing Unit are working in partnership with Cheshire West & Chester Council, and Northwich Town Council, to help tackle ongoing issues at an ASB hotspot.

Over recent months officers have received a number of reports in relation to ongoing criminal damage and ASB at the former Leftwich Green Community Support Centre on Kingsley Drive, Leftwich.

Following the concerns, a joint meeting took place on-site on Wednesday 4 September where officers from Cheshire Police, along with councillors from both Cheshire West & Chester Council, and Northwich Town Council, discussed what was happening with the building and how the site could be made more secure. As a result, a new metal security fence was installed on the site on Friday 6 September to help deter offenders from attempting to access the building. The new fencing has been coated in anti-vandal paint and is also bolted to the existing building.

PCSO Lee Robertson, of Northwich Local Policing Unit, said: *"I understand the frustrations of local residents and I want to reassure the community that we are doing all we can to tackle the ongoing issues at the former support centre and I hope that the new fencing will also act as a further deterrent. In addition, we can confirm that we've also arrested one teenager in relation to an incident at the site and several other youths have also been spoken to. Moving forward, we'll continue to conduct regular patrols of the site and I would urge anyone with any information in relation to any of the damage or ASB at the site to get in touch. Man charged with drug offences in Crewe

A man has been charged with drug offences in Crewe.

Ginola Wallam was arrested on Wednesday 4 September at an address on Bright Street, Crewe. The 18-year-old of Heathfield Road, Birmingham, has subsequently been charged with two counts of possession with intent to supply Class A drugs (heroin, crack cocaine). Wallam has been bailed to appear at Chester Crown Court on Friday 4 October. The charges relate to an investigation into county lines drug dealing in Crewe.

Police investigating death of Nantwich teenager appealing for further information and CCTV footage

Officers investigating the death of Nantwich teenager Jonty Evans are appealing for further information and CCTV footage to aid in their enquiries.

Jonty Evans, 16, was reported missing by his family on Saturday 31 August from the Nantwich area. Sadly, the teenager was later found dead in the river Weaver near Riverside, Nantwich, on Sunday 1 September. Officer's enquiries to establish Jonty's whereabouts in the hours prior to him entering the River Weaver remain ongoing and, as part of their investigation, they are asking anyone who



may have been in the Waterlode area of Nantwich between 12.30am and 2.30am on Saturday 31 August and may have seen Jonty to please get in touch.

Detective Inspector Nigel Parr, of the Major Investigation Team, said: *"Our investigation into how Jonty entered the water remains ongoing and, as part of further enquiries, we are asking anyone who may have seen him in the Waterlode area of Nantwich between 12.30am and 2.30am on Saturday 31 August or has captured him on any CCTV, dashcam or ring doorbell footage to please get in touch. As well as this, I would also like to ask anyone who has any information that may help officers in understanding the circumstances surrounding Jonty's death to please come forward."*

The Constabulary would also like to reiterate the family's request for privacy at this extremely difficult and distressing time for them. We kindly ask that members of the press respect this request.
